

LANE SAWMILLS ADJUST WORKING HOURS TO CODE

All Lane county sawmills are operating under the 30-hour week plan as provided for during the month of September under the lumbermen's code of the NRA, and while they have been operating on this basis for only two days, the order having gone into effect September 4, the plan is working out very satisfactorily, according to H. J. Cox, secretary of the Willamette Valley Lumbermen's association.

The 30-hour week plan will throw no men out of work in Lane county, neither will it provide more jobs unless some mill has a rush order and is compelled to put on more men to enable it to get it out in time.

All Lane county sawmills that have been operating since the lumber business began to pick up several weeks ago, are operating at practically full capacity. Quite a number are still down.

Under the code, any person desiring to operate a mill in this division during the month of October who has not previously notified the West Coast Lumbermen's association of his intention to operate, must file written notice with the association with a statement of the mill or mills to be operated not later than September 11, Mr. Cox points out.

The committee on control of production will on that date determine and publish in the West Coast Lumber Code Bulletin the allotments of production to eligible persons for the month of October, in hours of allowable operation for the month.

The code prohibits the production of lumber in excess of the allotment unless the committee on control production shall have authorized an exception, change, addition or transfer under the provisions of the code.

ment of marines was ready at Quantico, Va., for service if necessary.

The battleships New Mexico and Wyoming are stationed at Philadelphia and Newport, R. I., respectively, but they have not been ordered to Cuba.

The next step, it was said at the White House, is contingent upon conditions in Cuba. President Roosevelt is watching the situation closely through Secretary Hull and Ambassador Welles at Havana.

DISORDERS FEARED

HAVANA, Sept. 6.—(AP)—Cuba's day old revolutionary government, confronted with the possibility that the rank and file of the army to which it owes its life might get out of hand, attacked the problem of setting up the new state today by promising full representation for every revolutionary faction.

The work of establishing the new state got under way within range of the guns of an American destroyer lying in the harbor.

In Cienfuegos revolutionary demonstrators sacked hardware stores, stealing firearms. Trade was at a standstill. Army and navy detachments protected foreigners.

American residents of the Isle of Pines sent a delegation to United States Ambassador Sumner Welles. The purpose of this action was not officially revealed but it was reported that the delegation asked that a destroyer be sent to the island, as they feared an uprising among the 3000 inmates of the model prison there.

as persecution in behalf of a technicality.

Johnson said the only penalty was that Ford would not get the Blue Eagle, that the government would buy no equipment from a concern which did not come under the Eagle, and that he believed the public would feel the same way.

Difficulty of disciplining Ford arises out of the fact that there is no complaint against his wages and hours. Chiefly at stake is the principle of whether he shall be forced to sign on the dotted line and thus come into the co-operative administration enterprise. Johnson insists it is just as important that an employer sign up and join in the co-operative movement as it is that he individually maintain decent working conditions.

Officials feel that if public pressure works in the Ford case, they will have won a major engagement in their drive for recovery.
