

DEATH TOLL FROM HURRICANE MOUNTS

HARLINGEN, Tex., Sept. 7.—(AP)—Army ambulance detachments today began a systematic search through the hitherto inaccessible sections of the hurricane-devastated lower Rio Grande valley for injured refugees.

It was considered likely additional fatalities would be discovered in remote communities unheard from since the disastrous storm abated.

A preliminary survey by the Red Cross, covering that part of the stricken area linked by paved highways, accounted for 24 deaths and hundreds of persons injured. There were found to be 3,750 families destitute, 4,000 homes destroyed and 8,000 damaged.

Four persons lost their lives at Harlingen, two at San Benito, seven at Rio Hondo, one at Port Isabel, two in rural communities and eight at Matamoros, Mexican resort city across the Rio Grande from Brownsville.

Clearing weather yesterday allowed telephone and telegraph company repair crews to restore communication lines put out of commission by the destructive winds which ripped and tore at the rich agricultural section from Monday night until past noon Tuesday. Highways were being opened to traffic again as water standing on them slowly receded.

The storm denuded citrus groves of their ripening crop, valued at around \$3,000,000 and leveled cotton all over the fertile valley. The damage to property was expected to run into the millions.

That slope is a snow wall immediately beneath the pinnacle of Mount Jefferson, on the east side.

"More men and food are urgently needed," he said, "as we have food only through today. Weather today is promising. Send in experienced men, fully equipped for difficult mountain climbing."

Today we are searching White-water glacier with two parties, one high, making for the summit, and one on the lower part of the glacier."

Didn't Reach Top

James Mount, who with two others left the park two hours after McCann, Thomas and Burkhardt left, presumably for the summit, disclosed today that they found evidence the three that preceded them had arrived safely within 800 feet of the summit.

They found a small cairn of rocks on the top of which was a tin can, still shiny, indicating it had but recently been placed. Burkhardt, Mount pointed out, is in the habit of leaving markers of that kind. When Mount and his companion reached the summit, however, they found the other Portlanders had not signed the register, indicating they did not reach the summit.

OBSEDIANS OFFER AID

Assistance in searching for the three lost youths on Mt. Jefferson was offered the Portland Masama outing club in a telegram sent by Ed Johnson, president of the Eugene Obsidian club, Thursday.

The telegram urged the Portland group to suggest any help that the Eugene organization might be able to give.

Local Obsidians pointed out Thursday that they were familiar with the southern side of the mountain and although the boys are thought lost on the north side, they might have strayed over to this side in their wanderings.

Local mountaineers are not familiar with the north slopes of this mountain, but could, of course, aid in connection with other parties who know conditions there. No reply to the telegram had been received Thursday afternoon.

Boy Starts Fire With Polish, Dies

PORTLAND, Ore., Sept. 7.—(AP)—Martin Fendler, 9, was dead today of burns sustained when he attempted to start a kitchen stove fire with furniture polish.

In the explosion which ensued, in addition to Martin, burns were sustained by his small brother, Richard, 6, who was the first to attempt to save Martin; his parents, and fireman Dave Gallagher who responded to the alarm. None of the others was seriously burned.

Eugene Views Ford Stand On Code

Walter P. Fell—It appears to me that it would be to the best interests of Henry Ford himself and to his numerous agencies for him to sign up for the Blue Eagle. He should make his position clear as a business proposition if nothing else. His rivals in the automobile business, I should think, would make capital out of his refusal to sign.

Harry F. Gordon—I think Mr. Ford is wrong in refusing to cooperate with a movement that is universally popular in this country today. If he is holding out for selfish reasons, such as the advertising his action will bring him and his product, he is just as much in the wrong as though he failed in the end to abide by the agreement. I think he will find that his attitude is hurting his business.

T. M. B. Hicks, Jr.—We are about to find out if rugged individualism is going to work in this country. The matter is one for the public to decide, not the NRA officials. If public opinion backs up the attitude of the administration in the Ford issue there will be no question as to the ultimate success of the NRA program.

F. L. Beard—I believe the influence Mr. Ford is exerting at this time is derogatory to the welfare of the NRA. Even if he is planning to put into effect a better schedule, he should definitely define his position regarding the administration's policy for national recovery. He is acting unwisely in withholding his counsel in the face of the present crisis. We should know the status of every large employer.

Rev. Ernest M. Whittemith—I have always felt Henry Ford was behind the times in his social attitude. In the matter of old pensions, for instance, he has not kept pace with the rest of the world. Indeed, most of the good things ascribed to the Ford Institution are not results of Ford's wishes, but rather, should be credited to his partner, Senator Couzens, who has always maintained an entirely different social attitude. I feel that his present attitude is altogether in line with his past philosophy.

ask that representatives of both retail and wholesale fish dealers meet with the striking fishermen at Newport next Sunday.

Morris Beck, a wholesale fish dealer, Thursday informed the local NRA headquarters that the fishermen were asking an exorbitant price for their fish, one that no dealer could pay and keep in business. The entire strike, he said, was originally started by radicals.

Wholesale dealers and fishermen have been asked by the local NRA directorate to submit their case to arbitration and representatives of both factions have agreed. Some of each group, however, have appeared cold to the suggestion. It was said here.

Rapid progress in the women's campaign for support of the NRA program here was reported Thursday. The Home Science club was announced as the first to sign 100 per cent in its division. Other groups are expected to register 100 per cent in the near future. The women's campaign closes Saturday night.

there were guarded closely, but it was understood the administration would not hesitate a moment in putting armed men ashore to guard Americans and their property.

If a government capable of protecting life and property—including the billion of American investments—is established by the Cuban people, nothing hinting of intervention will be invoked.

RUMORS STIR HAVANA

HAVANA, Sept. 7.—(AP)—Soldiers set up machine guns in uptown parks this afternoon as Havana was stirred by many confusing rumors, including an insistent report that the United States would ask the two-day-old radical government to surrender power.

A widely circulated rumor was that Washington would ask that Carlos Manuel de Cespedes, who was deposed from the provisional presidency by a radical coup d'etat, be placed at the head of the government again with a new "cabinet of concentration." Such a cabinet would include representatives of all revolutionary groups.

A heavy guard was placed around the presidential palace where the commission of five, the new rulers of Cuba, was in session.

Communist meetings in celebration of international youth day were scheduled throughout Havana. The government announced that no street demonstrations would be permitted.

Logged Over Land Restored to Entry

More than 1800 acres of logged over land in this section of the state has been restored to entry, according to announcement at the United States land office at Roseburg. Entry is subject to preference rights of ex-service men of any war.

Applications may be filed in the land office by ex-service men within 20 days prior to the date of the opening or from September 10, 1933, to September 29, 1933, and by the general public from December 10, 1933, to December 29, 1933.

Ex-service men must file with their applications for the land a soldier's affidavit and a certified copy of their discharge, and all applicants must file a non-waiver reserve affidavit. This being logged-off land only the regular fees and commissions are payable when filing. No rights may be acquired to the land by settlement in advance of entry or otherwise, excepting in accordance with the above.
