

STUDENT WORKERS UNDER NRA; JOBS ARE NEEDED HERE

EMPORIA, Kas., Sept. 8.—(AP)—Employers complying with NRA provisions as to full-time workers may employ part-time student help. Dr. John Bailey Kelly, president of the College of Emporia, has been informed by NRA officials.

In a letter from C. S. Long, of the interpretation department of the Blue Eagle headquarters at Washington, the college head was told the administration does not wish to create any hardship on students.

JOBS NEEDED HERE

Work, any kind, but lots of it, will be needed by students of the University of Oregon this year, and a plea to Eugene people to aid as much as possible was sent out Friday by Miss Katherine Kneeland, employment secretary.

Actually, hundreds of students have applied for part-time jobs, or part-time work of any type, Miss Kneeland says. Many of these have enough funds on hand to register and get a start in the university, but must have enough other income to pay board and room.

While practically all students are willing to do work of any sort, many of them are already trained for positions, Miss Kneeland points out. From the ranks of both men and women at the university may be drawn skilled stenographers, bookkeepers, accountants, and clerks. Many men are anxious to obtain positions in homes for their board and room, while men are eager to cut wood, mow lawns, clean furnaces or do any other work.

Positions that require from one to four hours' work per day are especially desirable, Miss Kneeland says, as these will assure students of enough income to play to stay through the entire year.

Anyone having work for students may get in touch with Miss Kneeland by calling her at the university, phone number 3300. Qualifications of all students are carefully checked, and the employer is assured of competent workers.

first place winner in the contest on tomatoes:

"Let's Eat Tomatoes—Tomatoes occupy an important place in the family menu. They are generally liked and always available (fresh or canned), are attractive in color, and may be prepared in a great variety of ways."

Tomato Fritters
1 pint tomatoes (canned or fresh may be used).

1 tablespoon sugar.
1 tablespoon onion (minced).
Salt and pepper to taste.
2 tablespoons butter.
2 rounding tablespoons corn starch.
1 egg.
Breadcrumbs.

Rub the tomatoes through a colander and add the sugar, onion, salt and pepper. Put into a saucepan and boil up well. Blend the butter and cornstarch in another pan over the fire. Draw the tomatoes to one side and stir in the paste. Let the mixture cook for a few minutes until very thick, stirring constantly. Then remove from the fire and stir in the yolk of the egg. Pour into shallow buttered pans and when cold, cut into circles with a biscuit cutter. Beat up the white of the egg, brush over the rounds with it, toss in fine breadcrumbs and fry. These fritters may be fried in a frying basket in deep fat or in a small quantity of fat in a frying pan until they are crisp and brown on both sides. They should be served piping hot and are excellent with meats of all kinds, and especially with fish or with pork.

Keen interest in scouting is shown in the Florence district, several boys making a practice of walking from five to eight miles in order to attend scout troop meetings, Chief Salles reported.

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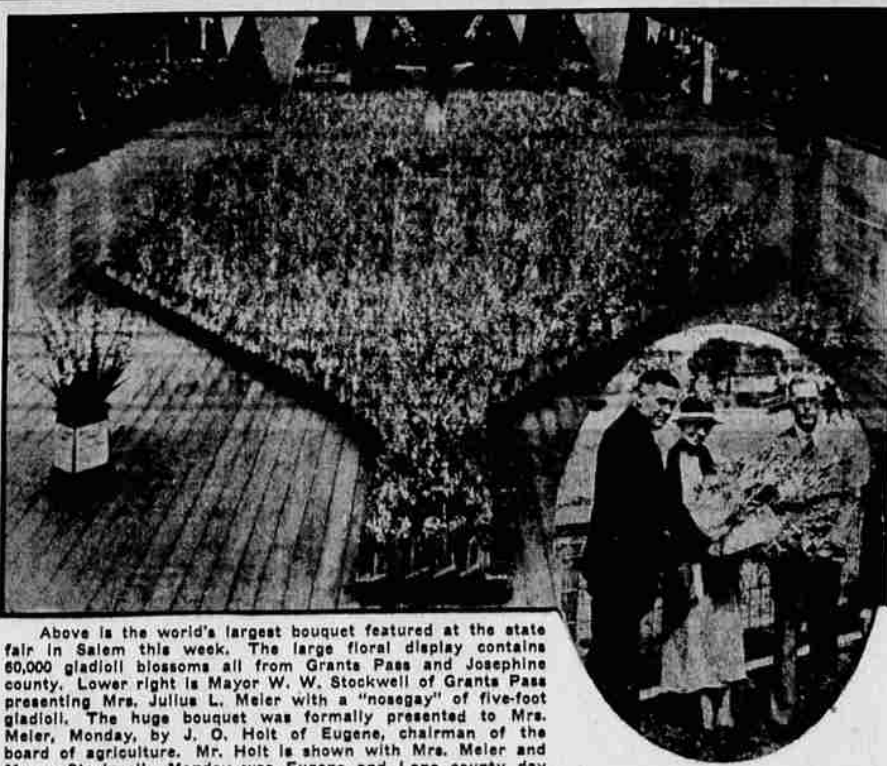
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LARGEST BOUQUET FEATURED AT STATE FAIR!

FIGHT OVER AMOUNT

PORTLAND, Ore., Sept. 8.—(AP)—After a second day's session the Wilcox committee to determine the amount of money needed for unemployment relief, had failed to agree on a sum.

One faction, led by W. J. Rook, of the Unemployed Citizens' league, and supported by Mrs. Nettie Rankin Bolland, president of the Portland Federation of Women's Organizations, and Frank L. Shull, county commissioner, held out for \$12,000,000.

The other faction led by Chairman Raymond B. Wilcox and Elliott H. Corbett, refused to go above \$8,000,000.

Wilcox said the legislature would be dumfounded if a request for \$12,000,000 was made.

Another meeting of the committee was called for tomorrow, but it was considered likely that two reports would be made to the governor, one saying that the higher figure was necessary and the other saying that the state can "get by" at the lower figure.

ROSEBURG, Ore., Sept. 8.—(AP)—The Standley Bros. sawmill, located on the Roseburg-Coos Bay highway about a mile west of Camas valley, was completely destroyed by fire last night. The blaze apparently started in the fuel bins and spread quickly throughout the entire plant, due to an accumulation of planer shavings.

The loss is estimated at about \$2000 with no insurance. The property is owned by Ed Reese of Cottage Grove and has been under the operation of Noble and Adrian Standley. The mill employed 19 men.

search of the mountain would be completed by tonight.

A second party of 10 that left Portland yesterday joined in the hunt today.

The Skyliners of Bend last night sent a party of its ablest mountaineers into the Metolus valley from which they planned to cross country to the southeast slope of Jefferson, searching Waldo glacier before continuing to the summit.

Another group of five Obsidians from Eugene struck out last night for the southwest slope of the mountain, heading for Pamela lake and thence to Hunt's Cove. They planned to explore the southwest ridge and the Mill Creek glacier, working gradually up to the summit.

The Crag Rats from Hood River dispatched a party of ten mountaineers to the scene of the search last night and ten more were planning to leave today.

Supplies Packed In

Meanwhile, two pack trains were carrying supplies from Ollalie lake over the arduous trail to Jefferson park, at the base of the mountain, where it was expected most of the camps would be located. A supply base was established today at Ollalie lake, and rations for 50 men for two days were being sent in.

Phases of the hunt were being directed from three centers. P. G. Payton of Portland, Mazama guide, was directing the actual search on the mountain. Curtis James of Portland, of the Wy-East club, was in general charge at Jefferson park. From Portland, L. A. Nelson of the West Coast Lumbermen's association and an active Mazama, was supervising the sending in of supplies and the general financing of the expedition, to which several civic and service organizations here have contributed.

FIVE OBSIDIANS GO

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Corvallis Flyer Killed in Crash

CORVALLIS, Ore., Sept. 7.—(AP)—His plane crashing into the ground just after leaving the North Corvallis airport, Ray Bicknell, 38, garage mechanic, was killed here late yesterday afternoon. Bicknell was taking off and banked into a turn before gaining sufficient altitude, when his plane nosed into the ground and was totally demolished.

His body was found on one of the wings, with his skull fractured, face burned by hot oil and clothes bearing indications of being burned in the crash, though the plane did not catch fire.

Bicknell had been flying about three years and is survived by his mother, sister and a brother, living in Eugene, and by two children, who reside with his estranged wife in Toronto, Canada.

Andrew Ray Bicknell was born on December 13, 1891, in Yakima, Washington, and had lived in Corvallis three or four years. He is survived

by his mother, Mrs. P. J. Polk, Eugene, his widow, Gertrude Bicknell, and two sons, of Vancouver, B. C., and Belford Bicknell of Seattle. Funeral services are to be held at the Poulos-Grey-Burns new chapel. The date will be notified following the arrival of brother and sister from Seattle.

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
