

DEGREES, TITLES TOPIC OF SERMON AT CHURCH SUNDAY

"Greater Than College Degrees," was the title for the Sunday morning sermon delivered by Dr. S. Earl Childers, pastor of the First Christian church, to his congregation. His sermon in part follows:

"We have again reached that time of year when the youth of Oregon are thinking of schools, courses and degrees. I believe in our public school system and feel that we cannot afford to drastically reduce our budget for the coming year.

"We find that the scriptures attach importance to degrees or titles of various kinds. Abraham received the title of 'Father of the Faithful,' Jacob was given the title of Israel or 'the one who had prevailed.' Many titles were applied to Jesus such as 'Prophet,' 'Priest,' 'King.' The followers of Christ are also given certain titles within the sacred scriptures.

"One of the outstanding titles applied to His followers is that of 'Friends.' Jesus said, 'I have called you friends.' Someone has called friendship 'The Master Passion.' We know that friendship binds people together with cords so strong that they are not even broken by death. One of the great needs of our world is a real friend. When Jesus sent out the seventy he sent them two by two that one might strengthen the other. The greatest need of the immigrant who comes to our country is the presence of a friend.

"Solomon said, 'There is a friend that sticketh closer than a brother.' You agree with me when I say that this friend is Jesus of Nazareth. While he is a friend of the world his friendship is conditional for he said, 'Ye are my friends if ye do the things that I command.'

"God's people are also called a 'Holy People.' We have been afraid of the term holiness because we have misunderstood its meaning. Certain classes of Old Testament people were called Holy, such as Prophets, Priests and Kings. Not because any better morally than anybody else but because of the nature of the work they were called upon to do. Followers of Christ are called Holy People, not because they are necessarily better than the man of the world, but because of the holy task for which they have been called.

"Christian people are also known as 'Brethren.' This term suggests equality and fraternity. In the world business has become an economic war and politics an ambitious rivalry but in the church we are all brethren. Paul's admonition was, 'If one falls, restore such a one in the spirit of meekness.' The community of goods as practiced in the early church was a great friendship of the spirit of real love.

"Perhaps the greatest blessing is that Jesus himself claimed to be our brother. In this relationship he has identified himself with poor fallen humanity. We have a privilege even greater than the privilege of his nearest and dearest. For he said, 'Whoever doth the will of my Father is my brother, my sister and my mother.'

tures, and \$12,777,500 in loans made on preferred stock.

The government has agreed to purchase preferred stock in 88 institutions since passage of the emergency bank act on March 9, permitting banks to issue preferred stock and sell it to the Reconstruction Finance Corporation.

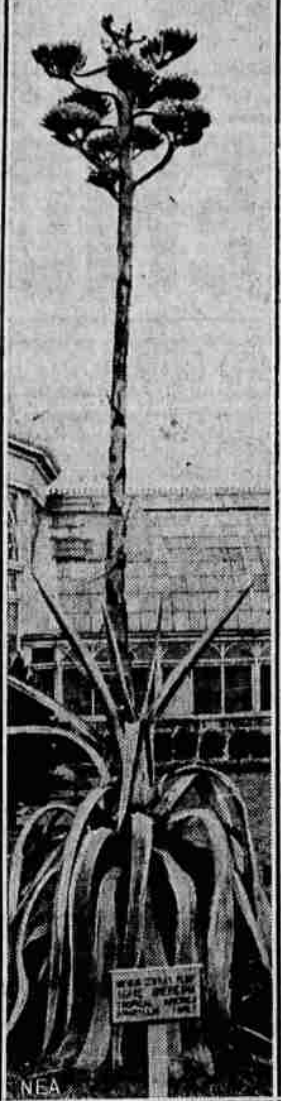
The government's offer to become a partner with bankers is considered in administration circles here as another safeguard to prevent serious break-down in the system.

Augmenting the government money to bolster the system is the bank deposit insurance program which becomes effective next year. With virtual government control of banks on one hand and more stringent restrictions on the other, the government hopes to make the banking structure almost fool proof.

St. Paul Robbers Make Big Haul at Express Co. Office

ST. PAUL, Sept. 11.—(AP)—Eight masked robbers held up two Railway Express company employees at the door of their office today, escaping with two large cash boxes which the police said contained between \$60,000 and \$100,000.

Cash boxes were on a hand truck outside the door of the express company office, near the Union station, ready to be taken to Minneapolis.

Police said the eight men backed a big sedan under the depot concourse, not far from the express company office. As T. J. Mangano, a guard, and S. Moles, messenger, opened the door of the office to wheel out the truck carrying the cash container, five robbers surrounded them.

The leader, armed with a sawed-off shotgun, commanded the company employees, "Stick 'em up and face the wall."

Two men guarded the victims while the others loaded the cash boxes into the automobile.

Sleeping Sickness Claims More Lives

ST. LOUIS, Sept. 11.—(AP)—Thirteen additional deaths resulting from encephalitis, epidemic here since July 30, today increased to 120 the number of fatalities among the 720 persons who have been confined to hospital isolation wards.

While spread of the disease seemed to gain momentum, scores of the nation's leading medical scientists sought some means of checking it, or a successful formula for its treatment.

Physicians have been especially concerned over the high death rate here, about one death out of every five cases. Only about 110 persons have been released from hospitals as cured of the disease.

ALTOONA, Pa., Sept. 11.—(AP)—Lakemont Park's annual G. A. R. Day, for 40 years an event that drew crowds of 15,000 to 20,000 will not be held this year. Reason: Lack of funds for the big bean soup and hardtack dinner.

BALTIMORE, Sept. 11.—(AP)—Size of the wet majority was generally regarded as the only question in doubt at Maryland, one of the pioneer states in the repeal movement, prepared to vote on the issue tomorrow.

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FIGURES ON WHEAT PAYMENT RECEIVED

Lane county wheat growers who contract to reduce their wheat acreage this year, will receive bonuses at the rate of approximately 28 cents a bushel for wheat that is not grown, it was announced Monday by O. S. Fletcher, county agent.

The acreage reduction for 1938 is set at 15 per cent of the crop average for three years. The average production for Lane county is 19.3 bushels per acre. Payment will be based on 28 to 30 cents per bushel, less the expense of conducting the Lane County Wheat Production Control association.

"Assuming a payment of 28 cents per bushel, Lane growers will receive \$19.40 for each contracted acre in 1938," Fletcher explained.

Information received states that farmers may not grow any sort of crop on the contracted acreage, Fletcher said. It was at first thought that there would be no restriction in this matter, but it now develops that no crop, for sale directly or indirectly, can be grown on the acreage that is contracted.

However, permanent pasture crops, such as clover or alfalfa may be grown on this land and it can count as reduced acreage this year. Next year, however, it will count as land under production and other land must be listed as reduced acreage.

Hop Growers Get 40 Cents Pound

SALEM, Ore., Sept. 11.—(AP)—The 1938 Oregon hop market opened at a 40-cent per pound level.

First sale reported in the Willamette valley was 400 bales of the early Fuggles variety for that amount. Another sale of 250 bales at 38 cents was also reported.

The sales were made to English firms, which have not been active in the Oregon market for some years. Ordinarily the later, main-crop varieties of hops sell for better prices than the Fuggles.

manded that American marines "Leave Cuban waters" and advocated "Death to Sumner Welles," United States ambassador.

Although Havana generally received the new government dispassionately, unrest continued in the interior. At American-owned manganese mines near Santiago one man was killed in a brush between strikers and miners.

Two men, one an army sergeant, were arrested for conspiracy in Marianao, near here, in Oriente province rebels were reported in the field. They were said to be Menocal supporters.

The Havana officers, loyal to Dr. Cespedes who gave way before an enlisted men's coup last Monday, demanded his return but indicated that whether he continues in office or resign shortly after his re-installation was for him to decide.

ROOSEVELT WATCHES

WASHINGTON, Sept. 11.—(AP)—President Roosevelt let it be known today that his attitude toward the new Cuban government headed by Dr. Ramon Grau San Martin depends on whether it has the support of the people there.

While keeping the strong navy forces zipped about the island in readiness to protect American lives in event of outbreaks there, it was said at the White House that the president is ready to support that government in Cuba which is the choice of the people and can maintain order. So the present attitude remains one of watchfulness.
