

Goodman Eliminated By Chandler Egan Wheat Up Two Cents; Stocks Have Short Day

EX-CHAMP SHOOT SUBPAR GOLF TO DEFEAT FAVORITE

KENWOOD COUNTRY CLUB, CINCINNATI, Sept. 13.—(P)—Johnny Goodman of Omaha, the national open titleholder and outstanding favorite, was eliminated today by Chandler Egan of Del Monte, Cal., amateur champion nearly 30 years ago, in the first round of the United States Amateur golf tournament.

Egan won by 2 up in an 18-hole match.

Egan, 49 years old and holder of the crown back in 1904 and 1905, blasted Goodman out of the tournament with a sensational sub-par finish. The veteran negotiated the last nine holes in 33, two under par and carded a 70, one under perfect figures for the complete round.

Goodman shot fine golf most of the way, with a 72, but cracked on the 17th and lost the 18th to Egan's birdie three as the former titleholder contributed a dazzling climax to the upset.

Johnny Fischer, of Cincinnati, holder of the new qualifying record for the United States amateur golf championship, led the way into the second round of match play today by whipping Gene Homma, Englewood, N. J., star, 8 and 2, in the first 18 hole round of competition.

FISCHER BREAKS RECORD

CINCINNATI, Sept. 13.—(P)—Amateur goldmine's hall of fame opened to new heroes today and the custodian of the record book blotted out four old marks as the 37th national amateur golf championship moved into the match play at Kenwood Country club.

Leading the parade of new heroes was Johnny Fischer, 21-year-old Cincinnati boy, who won the qualifying medal with a 72-69-141, lowest score in amateur history.

Twelve players tied at 150 for eight places in the match play brackets. This is the largest number ever to tie for a playoff, the previous record being 10. It is the lowest score by a player in the match play brackets. Until this tournament 152 strokes had been sufficient to place.

At 8 a. m. 12 players met at the first tee for the playoff to determine the eight players who went into the match play rounds along with 24 others.

Led by three ex-champions the eight players who survived the playoff were H. Chandler Egan, Medford, Ore., 1904-1905 titleholder, Chick Evans, Chicago, 1916-1920 champion, and Max B. Marston, Gulf Mills, Pa., 1923 champion, George T. Dunlap, Jr., Flushing, N. Y., former intercollegiate champion from Princeton, Will Gunn, Jr., Wallingford, Pa., Eddie Held, Jamesburg, N. J., Nicol Thompson, Jr., Toronto, Canada, and Maurice J. McCarthy, Jr., Cleveland.

Don Moe, Portland's Walker cup star, with 201 and Ted Longworth having the same figures divided the fifth place. Moe being the leading amateur in the tourney.

Dr. Cliff Baker, Portland, runner up in the recent California amateur, followed behind Moe and Longworth with 203.

HIGHCLIMBER Takes pm over

Here's some news for Lane county duck hunters. The hunting season, ordinarily three months long, has been reduced to two months by the department of agriculture, and the daily bag limit has been cut to 12 a day, rather than 15. Of the 12, not more than eight may be canvasbacks, redheads, scaups, teal, shovellers or gadwall. The possession limit for ducks was reduced from 30 to 24, and on the accepting species from 20 to 16.

Local hunters get a break over those on the east coast through a regulation permitting brand hunting here, but banning it on the Atlantic seaboard. The new open season for this section opens Oct. 16, and closes Dec. 15.

The Isaaq Walton league of Tillamook county has also requested that the area burned over in the recent forest fire be closed to all fishing and hunting. The state game commission has announced any action on this as yet, but it will probably go through. If it does, there should be a considerable influx of hunters into this territory.

ZIMMERMAN LEADS STATE PRO MEET

PORTLAND, Sept. 13.—(P)—A sub-par round of 68 and a 74 on the final round in the afternoon, duplicating his play of Monday, gave Al Zimmerman, Portland pro, the Oregon State open golf championship here yesterday. Zimmerman, clicked off a 68-74 the opening day to make his stroke for 72 holes 284, four strokes ahead of his nearest competitor.

Joe Moe, another local pro, garnered the 288 for second position while Zimmerman's brother, Emory, took the third place with 280. In the fourth place Willie Goggin, San Francisco, and Frank Rodia, Seattle, were tied with 290's.

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Oregon Prospects None Too Bright, Says Titus

EUGENE, Ore., Sept. 13.—(P)—There will be few new faces in the Oregon lineup this year, and in light of last year's record, "Prink" Callison's prospects do not seem too bright.

His severest losses from last year's team were Capt. Bill Morgan at tackle and Bill Bowerman, stalwart quarterback.

Ralph Terjeson, who saw some service last year, probably will succeed Bowerman, although the play likely will be called by the veteran Mark Temple, halfback, and backfield captain.

Alex Eagle and Chuck Bishop will be fighting for Morgan's tackle berth. Both saw service last year when Morgan broke his hands.

Gonzaga is Tough

Callison faces a tough situation in meeting the strong Gonzaga eleven Sept. 30, just two weeks after practice starts, but will have a testing game against Linfield college of the Northwest conference Sept. 22. Oregon beat Gonzaga 13 to 6 last year but had a hard time doing it.

The Webfoots play a 10-game schedule, meeting in succession Linfield, Gonzaga, Columbia (Portland), Washington, Idaho, U. C. L. A., Utah, Oregon State, Southern California, and St. Mary's.

The sophomores coming up from last year's freshman team give little encouragement to the youthful Callison, who succeeded Doc Clarence Spears as head football coach last year, and he will have to depend largely on his 1932 men.

Backfield Promising

Plenty of lettermen are available for all positions and the backfield

for this battle was so close that we made no attempt to pick a winner. Ross proved himself a real champion, and the crowd which saw the bout was the most wildly enthusiastic fight audience since Benny Leonard whipped Lew Tendler.

This only serves to remind, though, the contrast between a pair of real fighters, such as Canzoneri and Ross, champions worthy of the name, and a number of so-called titleholders in the heavier weights. Ross is the first reminder of a world title in our remembrance who was willing to risk that little against the former champ less than three months after winning it. It simply isn't done nowadays. And when you realize that Canzoneri lost to Barney in Chicago on a decision that had everybody up in arms, it becomes even more surprising.

Back in the old days, champions were champions, and when they fought their titles were at stake. However, since the advent of the big gate and the "cheese champ" title bouts have become as rare as hula dancers in Alaska. Perhaps the example of Ross and Canzoneri portends the return of better days. It certainly will go a long way in restoring public confidence, and it may even force some of the big boys to come out of the bushes and put their crowns on the block.

JUDGES DECISION SPLIT BUT REFEREE VOTES FOR CHAMP

NEW YORK, Sept. 13.—(P)—The big town, the toughest in the world to convince, was ready today to admit Barney Ross of Chicago to the ranks of the world's ring champions.

Out of one of the most savage, grueling fights ever seen in a local ring, the Jewish battler from the middle west emerged with his second victory over the veteran Tony Canzoneri, from whom he won the lightweight title less than three months ago.

With 40,000 howling fans looking on at the Polo grounds last night, most of them pulling fervently for Canzoneri to turn the tables on the former amateur champion and reclaim his crown, Ross withstood Tony's early rushes, caught up with him midway of the fight and beat him all over the ring before it was over.

Decision Close

As in their first scrap at Chicago, it was so close it required the vote of the referee to reach a decision. Arthur Donovan, who was in there with them for the torrid 15 rounds, cast his ballot for Ross after the judges had split.

Harold Barnes, one of the arbiters, gave the Chicago boy nine rounds, Canzoneri two and called four even. The other judge, George Kelly, awarded Canzoneri eight and Ross seven. Donovan gave Ross eight rounds, Canzoneri four and adjudged three even.

Canzoneri, who had been so confident of regaining his title that he bet several thousand dollars on himself, was the most downhearted young man in New York.

The big crowd, which paid a gross of \$114,000 to watch the two great little fellows pour gloves into each other, received the verdict with mixed emotions. Ross and cheers were almost equally mingled.

Tony's flashier style evidently made him look like the winner to the thousands of patrons clustered in the outer stands, but those closer to the ring-side could appreciate the terrific punishment dealt out by Ross in the last six or seven rounds.

Neither was in danger of a knockout, despite the terrific pace they set and the many furious exchanges. Ross admitted he was dizzy for a moment both in the ninth and eleventh rounds, when Tony caught him flush on the jaw with left hooks, but he recovered quickly and from there on evaded the Italian boy's left like poison.

Tony tries knockout
Canzoneri clearly intended to end the fight quickly with a knockout. He sailed into Ross in the opening round with both hands pumping away to the head. But Barney met him with a two-fisted attack that set him back on his heels. Tony gave up the knockout idea, then and there, and the rest of the way was content to try to outbox his slightly taller rival.

He did very well at it for a time, and at the end of six rounds was a winner. He looked at that stage like a fighter as he danced about and kept Ross' head bobbing back with sharp jabs and rights.

Ross Wades In

But when the seventh round opened, Ross made his bid. Evading Tony's jabs, he waded in and began a bombardment to the body that never ceased until the last bell. Canzoneri rallied to win the ninth, twice catching Ross wide open and blasting away at his chin until the Chicago boy was forced to clinch. Ross took it like the next round again was wearing Tony down with thunderous blows to the midsection.

STAR LOSS GIVES L. A. 4-GAME LEAD

Los Angeles drove forward today towards the 1935 Coast league championship with a full four-game advantage over the second-place Hollywood club.

The Angels took the measure of the Seals 5-4, while another San Francisco team, the Missions, downed the Stars 9-5 with a 17-hit attack. Fay Thomas held the Seals to one run until the ninth when Leo Oesterberg homed with two men on base to tie the count at all. The Angels won their own game in the Los Angeles half of the ninth when he singled to score Gene Lillard. Lillard cracked out his 25th four-bagger of the season in the fourth.

The Hollywood-Missions clash saw three Star hurlers take turns at trying to stop the free-hitting Reds. Only Pitcher Lloyd Johnson failed to hit safely to tie the count at all. The day's batting honors with four singles in four trips to the plate.

Portland pulled up to within a game of Hollywood by trouncing Oakland 17-9. Eight Oakland errors and 17 safeties off Salinas, McEvoy, Iffner and Gabler combined to give the Beavers their high run total. Portland's rookie outfielder, Loane, topped the slugging with a home run and pair of singles that drove in five Beavers runs. Hal Turpin and Jack Wilson hurried for the winners.

Second baseman Alex Kampouris of Sacramento knocked the ball out of Seattle's park twice last night to send home four runs as the Senators noosed out the Indians 6-5. Ed Ryan was touched for three hits and four runs in the sixth inning but aside from that kept the Indians in check.

Mauler Still Has KO Punch

SAN BERNARDINO, Cal., Sept. 13.—(P)—The lethal dynamite of a one-two swing that carried Jack Dempsey to the top of the heap in the prize fight ring has not deserted the 38-year-old Manassas Mauler.

He brought the punch out of retirement last night to score a quick knockout over Leslie Grimes, Australian light-heavyweight wrestler.

Grimes was wrestling Frankie Schroll of Fresno, Cal., and Dempsey was refereeing. The grapplers engaged in a slugger bee. Dempsey pried them apart. Angered, the Australian swung at the one-time heavyweight champion.

The blow never landed. Dempsey ducked neatly, adroitly stepped and sent his famed left to the point of Grimes' chin. A short right followed the left. The Australian dropped.

A few moments later, Dempsey helped the then docile wrestler to his corner and called the match a draw. Grimes was in no condition to continue.
