School Boards Talk High School Costs

SPRINGFIELD, Sept. 13.—(Special)—Springfield and Walterville school boards, meeting together in this city Tuesday evening, were unable to decide whether Walterville high school students should attend Springfield high school this coming year.

For two years, under the Wheeler law, Springfield took care of Walterville high school students. The law having been declared unconstitutional makes it necessary for Walterville to choose between paying Springfield to educate their students or re-opening high school classes in the Walterville district.

The per capita cost last year was \$39.69, but the law at that time did not allow the district to figure in the depreciation on buildings, which would add about \$3.50 to the individual cost. This year the depreciation may be figured, but expenses in the Springfield district have been cut drastically, both through the decrease in teachers' salaries and in reducing school from nine to eight months. These items make it difficult to give an estimate of the per capita cost for this year, school officials pointed out.

The Walterville board will call a special meeting of the voters in that district within the next week or two, when they will decide whether to send their students to Springfield high school or to educate them themselves.

M. E. Church Plans For Promotion Day

SPRINGFIELD, Sept. 13.—(Special)—Plans for promotion day were made by the Sunday school board of the Methodist church at its monthly meeting Tuesday evening. Date for this event was set for Sunday, September 24.

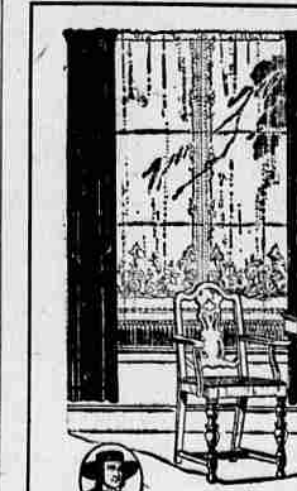
