

SPEED PROMISED ON FARM CREDITS

WASHINGTON, Sept. 19.—(AP)—Farm Credit Administration Governor Morgenthau replied to critics today with a pledge to cut red tape so that loans could be speeded up to debt-ridden farmers.

He charged that red tape difficulties had been "inherited" from the farm credit set-up of the Hoover administration.

Morgenthau, calling on farm credit officials to speed up their activities, said that it now takes from three to six months for debt-ridden farmers to obtain loans and he hoped to be able to reduce the time to two or three weeks.

In a three-point "call for action" addressed to all officers and employees of the 12 federal land banks and all national farm loan associations Morgenthau said:

1—"We must increase our forces; we must find more efficient methods; we must speed up the work."

2—"We must interpret normal values fairly, so that, without making unground or excessive loans, we may give the benefits of refinancing to as many farmers as possible."

3—"We must study every application sympathetically and patiently and strive to find a way to help the applicant out of his difficulties with one or more of the means at our command."

Morgenthau said that more than 185,000 applications for loans now are in the mill and that new ones are coming in at the rate of 17,000 a week.

"The fact that we have increased the number of appraisers at work from 210 when the law was passed to nearly 10 times that number at present means little to the farmer who has been waiting 60 or 90 days to learn whether he can get a loan," Morgenthau continued. "He knows there has been delay; he doesn't know why and it wouldn't help him to pay his debts if he did. He wants action and so do I."

Judge Threatens Jail For Attorney In Urschel Case

OKLAHOMA CITY, Sept. 19.—(AP)—Judge Edgar S. Vaughn today delivered a stinging rebuke, threatening jail for Ben Leaks, attorney for Albert Bates, a defendant in the Charles F. Urschel kidnapping trial, as a result of an alleged attempt to mislead a witness being questioned by the government.

Your honor, counsel for Bates deliberately pointed in the other direction to mislead my witness when I asked him to point out Bates," District Attorney Herbert Hyde protested.

"There will be none of that or there will be other people in jail," declared the judge. "I didn't see the motion to which you refer, but I won't have that going on."

Carl Wilson, a farm boy, had been asked to identify Bates from the other persons crowded in the fore part of the small court room.

POLICE AIDE ATTACKED

DENVER, Sept. 19.—(AP)—Beaten by three men who attacked him early Saturday in an isolated section of Denver as he was returning home, William B. Ellsworth, who gave police information that helped solve the kidnapping of Charles Boettcher II, was taken to a hospital with a fractured skull today. Doctors described his condition as grave.

Bruce Shawe, assistant to Mr. Fletcher in handling the Lane county wheat allotment, met with the group. Other members of the committee are Ash Bailey and Lenzie Halderson.

Other community chairmen are calling meetings of their groups this week.

50 Intellectuals Arrested By Nazis

ULM, Germany, Sept. 19.—(AP)—About 50 men and women, including a former high state official, his family, several professors, judges, and aristocrats, were arrested over the weekend by political police and storm troopers in a lonely castle near Heidenheim-Wuerttemberg.

Police charged they were plotting sabotage against the national socialist (Nazi) state under the guise of intellectual pursuits.

HALIFAX HAS FIRE

HALIFAX, N. S., Sept. 19.—(AP)—Damage estimated at more than \$750,000 was caused today by fire which swept a 1,200-foot pier of the Halifax harbor commission. The bulk of the seasonal shipment of new flour was destroyed, and more than 700 longshoremen were thrown out of their jobs.

anything about the matter for five years at least, it was explained by I. M. Peterson, recorder, as the city has a contract with the Mountain States company which still has five years to run. The power company holds a franchise in that city covering a period of 30 more years.

W. L. Jackson, mayor of Albany, pointed out that as that city contained the head offices of the Mountain States company, sentiment might not be favorable to a change. However, he said, there could be little doubt that power customers would favor purchase of cheaper.

"The budget committee of our council meets Wednesday night and I will bring the matter up for discussion. The matter also will be discussed at the next regular meeting of the council a week from Wednesday."

Support Pledged

A resolution pledging whole-hearted support to the water board in its plan to construct the Rennie project with federal funds will be submitted to the city council of Brownsville at its next regular meeting, the second Tuesday in October, J. P. Sumpter, mayor of Brownsville, told the Register-Guard.

"We have been considering building a plant of our own in order to avoid paying the excessive power rates now prevailing here," Mayor Sumpter said. "The people of Brownsville do not want to build a plant, but have reached the place where they feel something must be done about the power rates."

"I feel sure this city would welcome such a project as planned by the Eugene water board."

Project Has Appeal

Many private power plants of small capacity are now being operated in Junction City and power consumption in that town is unusually high for a municipality of its size, Mayor J. H. Miller said Tuesday. Elevators, mills and other companies use much power, one mill reporting a minimum power bill of not less than \$60 monthly.

"A project such as considered by the Eugene water board would receive considerable support in this city, I am sure of that," Mayor Miller declared. "Personally I think it is a wonderful idea and I intend bringing the matter to the official attention of our council at the next meeting, Friday night."

Victor Chambers, mayor of Cottage Grove, declared he had heard considerable favorable comment on the project Tuesday and stated he felt sure the city would support a move to obtain cheaper power. He said he would present the matter at the next council meeting on Oct. 1.

The city council of Creswell, meeting the first Monday in October, will have the project brought to their attention by O. H. Sedgwick, recorder, he said Tuesday.

Would Like Proposition
Mayor Douglas McKay of Salem Tuesday issued the following statement:

"If the Eugene water board wants to submit a power proposition to us we would be very glad to entertain it in the city council and see what we could do."

"We are interested in cutting down the cost of electric current. The city itself pays a large sum each year, about \$25,000 I believe, for street lighting."

clusion of a meeting with a committee of Rotarians who, as mediators, gave him separate memoranda from the OOR and ABC societies, Col. Carlos Mendizábal's nationalists, former President Menocal's group, and the Marianistas of Miguel Mariano Gomez.

"It doesn't matter who is president," Dr. Grau San Martin asserted, "so long as the revolutionary program is carried out."

A leader of the student pro-government faction interrupted him to say that "Grau San Martin can not resign unless we (the student directorate) who put him in the presidency ask him to."

TROUBLE SPREADS

WASHINGTON, Sept. 19.—(AP)—A condition of turmoil, accentuated by labor strikes, over much of the interior of Cuba was reported to the state department today in consular advices from widely scattered sections of the island.

Secretary Hall told newspapermen the situation in Havana appears quiet, but then read advices from the interior reporting some violence and almost general tension.

A renewed strike at the United States Fruit company plant at Preston was reported by Hull, coupled with a general strike at Manzanillo and serious labor disturbances at sugar plants around Antilla.

Destroyers Shifted

The situation at Matanzas he declared was unsatisfactory, while general disorder was reported in Santa Clara province, along with the ousting of the student government at Cienfuegos and installation of an army sergeant.

Violence was reported in Camaguey, although Hull said no overt acts against American life or property had been reported to his department.

He said Santiago was outwardly quiet, but was the scene of increasing apprehension by the inhabitants.

Geary Closing Is Not Crowding Rooms

The closing of the Geary school is working no hardship on the handling of pupils in the city school system this year, it was announced Tuesday by H. R. Gould, superintendent.

Pupils who would have attended the Geary school building are now enrolled in the Lincoln and Whiteaker schools. One teacher was shifted from the Edison school to the Lincoln school, making a staff of 11 teachers at the latter building this year. With

the additional class room space provided in the basement of this building, the increased enrollment has been absorbed without trouble.

The traffic problem is being well taken care of this year, danger spots such as railroad crossings and highway crossings being patrolled so that younger children may cross in safety. Fewer inquiries than usual regarding attendance problems have been received this year, Mr. Gould said.

Registration to Continue at E. B. C.

Enrollment will continue all week at the Eugene Bible college which started registration Monday. Classes will open at the college Wednesday morning, Dr. S. E. Childers, president of the school, announces officials look for a larger enrollment than last year when 118 took work at the school.

The institution is the merged school this year for the Eugene Bible school and the Spokane university. Students from several states are registering. Prof. S. J. Chapman of the former Spokane university has arrived here to be on the faculty and Linden Leavitt has come from Whittier, Cal., to be acting chancellor this year.

Baby Girl Dies at Vaughn Monday

best interests of Oregon's institutions of higher learning.

Suppression Charged

The letter to Starr was transmitted late yesterday from the executive office at Salem. Simultaneously the governor released a statement explaining his action, although he said the text of the letter was not to be released until it had been received by Starr.

This demand for Starr's resignation occurred one week after a board meeting here at which a general verbal disturbance took place when E. C. Sammons, chairman of the board's financial committee, took Starr to task. Sammons accused Starr of neglecting to provide other members of the board with an audit report of certain departments of the state college, made by the secretary of state. Subsequent replies by the college, through the office of Chancellor W. J. Kerr, likewise were not revealed to board members other than Starr. Sammons contended. The audit report was said to have discussed certain alleged irregularities on the part of E. P. Jackson, superintendent of the building department at the state college.

Fight Is Expected

Persons close to Starr said it appeared to be a foregone conclusion the chairman would refuse to resign and that he would demand a hearing on the governor's charges. The governor had previously indicated he would favor this step. Starr can be removed only for "cause," but this term has not yet been narrowly defined in connection with the current situation.

Starr was appointed to the board by the late Governor Patterson in

1929 for a six-year term. Seven other members were appointed at the same time, and all but Starr were confirmed by the state senate on the same day the governor's recommendation was made. Starr's appointment was rejected by a vote of 15 to 15. Two days later, however, after Governor Patterson had conferred with senate leaders, that body approved Starr's appointment by a vote of 25 to 3.
