

SPRINGFIELD STORES CLOSE FOR REBHAN FUNERAL THURSDAY

Springfield stores will be closed Thursday afternoon during the funeral of Dr. William Caslon Rebhan, widely-known physician who died of heart trouble Tuesday afternoon at his home in Springfield after an illness of only six days.

The funeral will be held at the Springfield Methodist church at 2:30 p. m., with Rev. Dean Poindexter and Rev. Veltie Pruitt officiating. The Murphy-Mobley quartet will sing several numbers for the service. The Springfield Lions club, of which Dr. Rebhan was past president, and a member of the board of directors, will usher at the funeral. Liberty lodge No. 171 of the Masons will be in charge at the graveside service in the Rebhan Memorial park.

Pallbearers are to include members of the Pacific hospital staff and other friends of Dr. Rebhan. Active pallbearers will be Dr. A. O. Waller, Dr. Charles D. Donahue, Dr. A. H. Ross, Dr. Melville A. Jones, Dr. Harry Talbot, and Dr. George L. Hurley. Honorary pallbearers include Dr. G. S. Brantley, Dr. Del Sinar, Dr. Charles E. Hunt, Dr. Gaven C. Dyott, Dr. W. N. Dow, and Dr. B. F. Scieffe. Dr. Rebhan had practiced in Springfield for 22 years, and had a very large clientele both in that city and in the Mohawk, McKenzie and Willamette valleys. His practice had increased so much in recent years that he was unable to handle it all and recently took Dr. Melville A. Jones of Portland into his office.

Dr. Rebhan was very active in Springfield civic affairs, and was one of the group which was instrumental in getting an airport for that city. He has served continuously since the establishment of the port on both the city and Lions club airport committees.

He was also interested in the local Boy Scout troop and very active in the organization of the Lions club several years, serving in various capacities in that body. He was president of the club for two years. He was also a member of the club's quartet which furnished musical programs for many civic events.

Dr. Rebhan was well known as a sportsman, being a particularly enthusiastic fisherman. With Rev. Veltie Pruitt, M. B. Irish and Prince Halfrich he made the first rowboat trip down the Rogue river two years ago.

He was born on March 19, 1884, in Brownsville, attending elementary and high school there. In 1908 he received his doctor of medicine degree from Willamette university, and practiced medicine in Wendling for two years. He then was in Brownsville for a year, and before coming to Springfield in 1911 studied at Chicago.

Dr. Rebhan is said to have had one of the finest backgrounds in surgery of any physician in this vicinity. In addition to studying at Willamette and Chicago, he also took surgical work at San Francisco, and has made several trips to Mayo brothers clinic. He was a member of the Pacific hospital staff.

He is survived by his widow, Mrs. Olive J. Rebhan; three daughters, Roberta, 9, Joy, 6, and Mrs. Constance Miller of Portland; three sisters, Mrs. W. C. Templeton, Albany, Mrs. Nellie Rebhan, and Mrs. A. L. Windom, both of Seattle.

Poole-Gray-Bartholomew chapel of Springfield are making the funeral arrangements.

Mental Tests to Be Used By Fraternities In New Pledge Plan

A new plan for pledging freshmen students of the University of Oregon, known as "selective" pledging, will be put into effect this year. It is announced by Virgil D. Earl, dean of the men. The plan will be based on the "A. C. E." tests given to all entering students Monday and Tuesday of this week.

Students who score in the upper nine quartiles will be eligible to pledge fraternities of their choice, while those in the tenth or lowest quartile cannot pledge until they have earned a grade average of .75 for at least 12 hours during some subsequent term. The system is expected to eliminate a class of students who many times have been responsible for low grade standings of fraternities and who most often drop out early in their college careers. Extensive investigation of records over the past several years have shown this to be true.

A higher grade standing and more satisfactory conditions in fraternities is expected to result from the plan, which is being watched by fraternities all over the country.

Nazis Find Sacrifice Of Isaac 'Un-German'

SCHLESWIG, Germany, Sept. 20. (AP)—The Biblical story of Abraham's sacrifice of Isaac was struck today from the schedule of religious instruction by order of the provincial governor on the ground that "this conception of the deity is un-German."

Further eliminations of certain Old Testament features from the curriculum were foreshadowed.

I.C.C. APPROVES LOW CANNED GOODS RATE

WASHINGTON, Sept. 20. (AP)—The lowest freight rate on canned goods from Pacific coast ports through the Panama canal to the Mississippi valley ever put into effect between these sections was upheld today by the interstate commerce commission.

The commission refused to order a suspension of the proposed charge and it goes into effect tonight. It will be the first through water and rail rate to be applied on canned goods through the Panama canal.

The rate, 76 cents per 100 pounds from 15 Pacific coast ports, was filed by the Luckenbach Gulf Steamship company, the Gulf Pacific Line, and the Gulf Pacific Mail Line, Ltd.

All railroads serving the Mississippi valley from the southwest and reaching Texas gulf ports and the carriers reaching New Orleans and Alabama joined the steamship companies in filing the rate.

The schedule was protested by transcontinental carriers, who charge 90 cents for 100 pounds.

The steamship companies believe the new rate will assist them in increasing their traffic through the Panama canal in canned fruit, canned fish and other Pacific coast products as well as pineapple and other products re-shipped after reaching the Pacific coast from Hawaii.

Labor League to Be Formed Here

The International Labor Defense, an organization interested in securing justice for oppressed persons because of their race, color or creed will meet this Wednesday night to organize a Eugene unit.

Prior to this time, a number of persons living in Eugene vicinity have belonged to the International Labor Defense, but have been deprived of active participation in the work. The session will be held at 720 Williamette street. It is open to the public and will be addressed by members of the Portland International Labor Defense unit.

The International Labor Defense is the same organization which brought to the fore the now highly publicized Scottsboro case; also it has been active in the defense of Mooney and Billings, and of the now little known Theodore Jordan case here in Oregon.

Mrs. Northrop Dies In Portland Tuesday

Mrs. Ida Ford Northrop, mother of P. Ford Northrop, Eugene water board engineer, died at her home in Portland suddenly Tuesday. She had been in good health the day before her death.

Mrs. Northrop was born on April 24, 1888, in Portland. On November 16, 1888, she was married to Frank M. Northrop in Portland. From 1908 until 1913 she lived in Eugene, moving to Idaho from here and later to Portland.

She is survived by her widower, four sons, Harmon, Theron and Cedric of Portland, F. Ford Northrop of Eugene; and three daughters, Helen Northrop, Vancouver, Washington; Mrs. Winifred Wright, Hollywood, California; and Mrs. Katherine Quigley, Ellensburg, Washington. All of Mrs. Northrop's children attended Eugene high school and the university while they were living in this city.

Mr. and Mrs. Northrop plan to go to Portland for the funeral Thursday.

power development of this community one of the most important factors to be considered by any civic group," Mr. Stevenson said. "One of the dominant thoughts of the chamber leadership this year will be encouragement of new industries in Eugene."

"The development of cheap power naturally goes hand in hand with industry and the power committee of the chamber will investigate every possible angle of the situation."

In connection with the encouragement of new industries in Eugene, the chamber will work on the proposition of further utilization of the present steam stand-by plant built by the water board. Mr. Stevenson said.

Seek Highway Completion

"With the power that could be generated at this plant only a matter of fuel for plant operation. It would seem that it would be possible to interest some industry to make a deal with the water board for power from this plant. It would, of course, be understood that the board have authority to switch the power on to city lines in the event of emergencies."

One of the main projects to be backed by the chamber's new administration is the Eugene-Florence highway, it was said. This project has long been an important phase of Eugene chamber activities and it will be continued during the coming year, Stevenson declared.

Further policies and projects of the administration will be discussed at the meeting of the directors Thursday.

The new president has been working on committee appointments for the coming year, but has no announcement to make as yet, he said.

Assessor Keeney to Attend Tax Meet

The state tax commission has announced that a meeting will be held at Salem, Thursday, October 5, at which time there will be a general discussion between the members of the commission and different county assessors of the state as to property valuations. Ben F. Keeney, Lane county assessor, received notice of the meeting Wednesday and he is planning to attend.

The state tax commission each fall fixes the ratio of tax valuation of property as to its cash value and the ratio differs in the several counties.

The annual convention of assessors will be held at McMinnville the day before the meeting date set by the tax commission and it is expected that all of the assessors attending the convention will be present at the tax conference at Salem.

level objectives are eventually attained, has given rise to the mistaken impression that I have changed my views. My position with respect to controlled inflation has not changed."

Secretary Wallace said he looked for "decidedly higher agricultural prices within a few months" but that he felt the improvement might come to a sad end if "we are not prepared to meet the peril produced by the following forces."

"First: America is a creditor nation to the tune of one billion dollars annually, but, as a nation, she has a debtor psychology."

"Second: The American people, democrats and republicans alike, are still essentially high tariff in their attitude. Reciprocal tariff agreements may be negotiated but the increase in foreign purchasing power resulting thereby will not be sufficient to enable foreign countries to pay a satisfactory price for our surplus wheat and cotton unless the attitude of the American people and American congressmen change very radically."

"Third: The American people are disillusioned about lending money abroad and it will be difficult to float foreign loans in their present temper."

1 1/2 cups milk
1/4 cup flour
1/4 cup sugar
1/4 teaspoon salt
2 eggs
Put milk in top of double boiler. Mix sugar and flour and add to milk. Cook until thick. Add egg and salt and beat until smooth. Pour into the pie crust, cover with 1-cup fresh sweetened huckleberries. Bake the egg whites and add 2 tablespoons sugar. Spread over the berries a brown slightly in a medium oven.
