

### COUNTY BUDGET MEETINGS WILL BE HELD SOON

With the appointment of the Lane county budget committee, announced Wednesday night, the machinery for setting in motion the 1934 tax levy was set in motion and from this time on until the first of November, when the levy must be fixed, the committee will be kept busy trying to study out means whereby the affairs of the county may be carried on another year with the least possible expenditure of money, without impairing the efficiency of administration in any department.

E. U. Lee of Eugene, Charles Beldar of Cottage Grove and Walter Holland of Crow have been appointed as the three outside members of the budget committee, the three members of the county court being ex-officio members.

The committee will be called for its first meeting in a few days. It was announced by County Judge Fred Flisk Thursday. A series of meetings will be held during the latter part of this month and fore part of October and the budget, under a new law, must be adopted during the early part of October, then it must be advertised for 20 days before the taxpayers' meeting is held and the levy must be made after the meeting and before the first of November. Heretofore the taxpayers' meeting has been held between Christmas and the first of January.

Under the new law the tax rolls must be turned over by the assessor to the sheriff so that collections may be started by January 1 instead of March 1 as heretofore. On this account it is necessary to set the budget meeting and fix tax levy two months ahead.

The new law also provides for quarterly payments of taxes instead of semi-annual payments and provides for a discount if paid in advance. Under this plan, if the entire tax for the year is paid before March 15 a three percent discount is allowed. No discount is given if only the first quarter is paid before that date, but if the second quarter is paid by March 15 there is a 2 per cent discount on the payment and if the third quarter is paid by June 15 there is a 4 per cent discount on that particular payment while if the fourth quarter is paid by September 15 a 6 per cent discount is allowed on it.

In order to obtain these discounts the payments must be made three months prior to the due date, it is pointed out.

### CITIES GROUP TO MEET SATURDAY

Representatives from cities and towns in every part of the state are expected to be on the campus of the University of Oregon Saturday, September 23, for a special meeting of the League of Oregon Cities. It is stated by Herman Kehrl, director of the Commonwealth Service Bureau.

The formal election of Mr. Kehrl as field manager for the league is expected to take place at this time, and plans for the coming year will be made. Important matters affecting cities will be discussed. Of particular interest will be the effect of the expected special session of the legislature.

Delegates will discuss the matter of regulating and controlling the sale of alcoholic beverages, as it relates to cities. Legislation covering this is expected to be before the legislative session. Raising revenue for unemployment and public relief will also be taken up.

The business session of the conference will be held in the Social Science seminar room in Friendly Hall at 1:30 Saturday. A dinner meeting will be held in the evening to conclude business.

Informal discussions will include the matter of requests for funds for local use from the Federal Emergency Administration of Public Works, a subject in which delegates are expected to be keenly interested.

### Noble French Prune Grown By Lane Man

A box of Noble French prunes was brought to The Register-Guard Wednesday afternoon by Noble Andrews of Pleasant Hill. The prunes are a variety invented by Mr. Andrews, and are of very fine quality.

Mr. Andrews copyrighted the prunes in 1924 and has been growing them ever since. He first was located at Salem, and two years ago came to Pleasant Hill. He has sold 50,000 young prune trees at Salem, and has 500 trees already on his place near Pleasant Hill, with 4,000 youngsters to be set. Mr. Andrews sells his prunes and the trees both in Salem and Eugene.

### PRESENT ECONOMIC ORGANIZATION WILL BE COURSE SUBJECT

An examination into the nature of the present economic organization, a topic that is regarded as especially interesting at this time, will form the basis for the course "Present Problems of Economic Organization," which will be one of three courses offered to people of Eugene by the General Extension Division. The class, which will meet each Thursday evening from 7:15 to 9:15 on the campus of the university, will be taught by John T. Gano, of the economics department. All classes will start the week of September 25.

Special attention in the course will be paid to the modern use of corporation in large scale production. A study will be made of financing methods and the organization of distribution. While the treatment will be partly historical in nature, the social significance of the many factors will be stressed, it is stated.

The courses offered evenings are open to any one interested, and those who wish to complete them and take the examinations will receive full university or college credit.

Other courses available are "Appreciation of Literature," which will be taught by Dr. E. G. Moll, professor of English, on Monday evening, and "Current Educational Principles and Practices," which Dr. J. R. Jewell, dean of the school of education, will offer on Tuesday night.

Full information on the extension classes may be obtained from the General Extension office at the university.
