# Theatres

Lee Tracy, the ace of wise-crackers, is seen in "Turn Back the Clock" which opens Thursday at the McDonald as part of a double bill with "Shanghai Madness" featuring Spencer Tracy (no relation to Lee). "Turn Back the Clock" is the story of a young business man who desires to live his life over, and through a peculiar accident is given the opportunity. It is humorously handled, and is a thoroughly entertaining picture. "Shanghai Madness" is a thrillingly portrayed adventure of the marines in China.

William Powell, who made Philo Vance famous, is seen in another detective role at the Heilig Thursday and Friday, this time as "Private Detective 62." Margaret Lindsay plays opposite him. Powell is cast as the suave, sophisticated private detective whose unpleasant assignment is to frame the girl he loves. The solution is cracking drama, lightened by Powell's cynical repartee and mastery of situation.

Jimmy Dunn comes to the Rex Thursday with a new leading lady, Boots Mallory. The featured vehicle is "Handle With Care," and Jimmy is at his best in the film, which tells the story of an assistant district attorney and his love affair. The picture is a pleasant drama, and is not the heavy stuff usually associated with films involving police and gunmen. Eli Brendel is excellent in a comedy role.

Glen Godfrey is showing a double bill at the Colonial today, with "The Story of Temple Drake," and "A Lady's Profession" featured. Miriam Hopkins and Jack LaRue are featured in the former, which is a brilliant story of the battle of a delinquent girl to achieve high ideals. Jack LaRue plays the role of Trigger, a villainous gambler who drags her down. It is his greatest role. "A Lady's Profession" is an amusing comedy of English nobility engaged in running a speak-easy. Allison Skipworth and Roland Young divide honors.

Today is the last showing of the Janet Gaynor-Charles Farrell picture, "Delicious," at the State theatre. It's a whimsical drama of young love, and it's guaranteed to "blow your sweet away." ## Salem Is Allotted Waterworks Money

WASHINGTON, Sept. 21.—(Special)—The public works administration today approved an allotment of \$7,054,500 for 80 non-federal projects in 11 states.

The list was the third of non-federal allotments to be approved by the administration and included bridges, gas plants, water plants and systems, sewers, schools, public buildings, power projects, dormitories, street improvements and lighting.

The allotments included: Salem, Oregon, water system (loan and grant) \$1,500,000 for waterworks.

# Coos Bay Firm To Carry Quota Fight to Capital

MARSHFIELD, Ore., Sept. 21.—(Special)—H. W. Bunker of San Francisco, president of the Coos Bay Lumber company, today advised the West Coast control board that his company will carry the battle for increased allotment of operating hours to the highest authority in the country before discharging any one of his 800 employees.

"We will not discharge any one until we have exhausted every resource to which it is possible to appeal," Bunker declared today. "We shall carry our fight back to Washington. We intend to present our case to the national lumber control council at its hearing Oct. 16."

Bunker emphasized that the argument does not concern the feasibility of the NRA, but resolves itself into an interpretation of the code's provisions.
