

CHARLES J. SMITH DIES HERE FRIDAY

Charles J. Smith, 1260 Hilyard street, died Friday morning at his residence at the age of 74 years.

He is survived by his widow, Mrs. Alice G. Smith; one son, Graham D. Smith of Eugene; and one sister, Mrs. L. R. Boynton, Mt. Vernon, New York.

Mr. Smith was born Aug. 30, 1859, in Pachogue, Long Island, New York. His family was a seafaring one, his father being a well known sea captain on the east coast. Mr. Smith recalled that as a small boy he saw the old frigate, Constitution, sail into Sag Harbor, and Captain Staunton, call to see Mr. Smith's father.

At the age of 14 years, Mr. Smith went to sea for three years. He returned to shore and went into the shoe business. He was manager of several shoe stores in the east, later buying a store of his own in Naplesville, Indiana. Some time later he went on the road as a salesman. Of late years he had been affiliated with wholesale shoe houses in Portland and San Francisco.

Mr. Smith was a member of the Masonic lodge at Sag Harbor, Long Island, New York. He married Alice Graham in Naplesville, Ind., in 1891.

The funeral services are to be held Monday afternoon at 2:30 o'clock at the Brannetter-Simon chapel, Rev. Cecil F. Hietow of the Methodist Episcopal church officiating.

have been passed upon by the state advisory boards they will be acted upon in Washington with a minimum of delay.

"We will match speed with you. The money is available and we want to put men to work."

Mayor Dore declared mistrust of federal officials in the honesty of cities caused delay.

He said Senator William F. Borah had openly declared such a mistrust, and that the public works federal engineers for the Seattle district had been required before appointment to fill out a questionnaire telling whether he had confidence in city and state officials.

Carson Asks Credit
Mayor Joseph K. Carson of Portland suggested that "deserving municipalities and other local government bodies" be given the right to ask the loan of federal government credit in reorganizing their bonded debts, "since it appears to be the only government credit left."

"If local government credit is not good," he said, "then what credit is good? To my mind, there is no more dignity, there is no more security, or virtue in a federal obligation than in many, in fact most, local government obligations."

"The agency that so generously extended its services in assisting us to create these obligations a few years ago—the private investment bankers' market—no longer exists," he continued. "They have transferred their affections to the higher body, whose credit they now consider to be the best."

Good as Russia?
"Is there any reason," Mayor Carson said, "why the federal government should not extend to these local governments the same red-count and refunding privileges that it is now making available to banks, railroads, insurance companies, irrigation and drainage districts, farmers, home owners and crop marketing agencies? The Reconstruction Finance Corporation has recently made in indirect loan of \$4,000,000 to Soviet Russia. Is the credit of local government not as good as that of Soviet Russia?"

Another proposal made by Mayor Carson was that "there be instituted in each of the states appropriate legislation to create a board or an individual to control state and local government finance, with power to aid all local bodies in re-organizing and refunding their debt structures and interest rates and sinking fund charges, upon such a basis as would enable these governmental bodies to liquidate their obligations. "This would mean," he continued, "that in some communities a write-down in principal might be necessary, but of a certainty something must be done to revise downward the interest rates which are now currently in force."

"I am told that the average interest rate, including the cost of refunding and re-issuing their obligations, average generally in excess of 5 per cent when all charges are included. This means that the entire principal is eaten up every generation. It is preposterous to suggest that private industry can, through its life, pay any such rates. If private business cannot do it, then government cannot do it when its revenues must come out of the prosperity of private enterprise."

A book of etiquette, written under auspices of the Associated Women Students and approved by the powers on the campus, was printed today. It tells the girls just how to conduct themselves on all occasions—and drops a few hints for her escort, too. In the chapter on "campus go-cart" the male is informed he should sweep the "cigarette ashes, sand and dog hair," from the cushion of his automobile before inviting his girl friend to ride. Likewise the young lady is told it is a "nice gesture" to flip the handle of the door for the gentleman—especially if he's standing outside in a downpour.

"No nice girl," the book says, "uses current slang phrases without realizing their hidden meanings; brags about not quite beating the milkman home; uses swear words in a smart-talk way, or brags about big parties with much uplift of eyebrow."

500 Sisters Escape In Cathedral Fire

VALLEYFIELD, Que., Sept. 22.—(AP)—Fire destroyed the historic Valleyfield cathedral and a convent to-day with an estimated loss of \$1,600,000.

Five hundred occupants of the convent of the Sisters of Jesus and Mary, pupils and nuns, were taken to safety. One fireman was injured.

The destruction brought to six the number of Catholic churches burned in Quebec province in the last 12 months with the total losses set at \$2,620,000.

Officials early today had not determined how the fire started.

SALEM PARADES
SALEM, Ore., Sept. 22.—(AP)—A parade two miles in length hailed Salem's participation in the NRA during a heavy rainstorm Thursday night. The national champion American Legion drum corps marched in the parade, together with national guard companies, Boy Scouts, school children and others. Many floats were entered by fraternal and business organizations.

CARLOADINGS GAIN
WASHINGTON, Sept. 22.—(AP)—The American Railway association today announced that carloadings of revenue freight for the week ended September 16 total 652,019 cars, an increase of 80,029 cars above the preceding week and an increase of 64,770 cars above the corresponding week in 1931.

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MEMORIAL CUP IS DONATED TO E. H. S.

The first assembly of the year at the Eugene high school was held Friday. Fred Kramer, athletic coach, presented to the student body a cup which was donated by Mr. and Mrs. Norman E. Jones, in memory of their son Earl, who died last spring.

In presenting the cup Mr. Kramer stated that each year the outgoing senior who was the outstanding athlete of the year would have his name engraved on this cup. The coach said the trophy would be awarded by a point system and pointed out that in order to be the outstanding athlete of the year, the candidate must rank high in scholarship, sportsmanship, and citizenship, as well as in athletics. The man eligible for this honor will be chosen by a committee consisting of the principal, the coach, and the faculty. If Mr. and Mrs. Jones, the donors of the cup, are living in Eugene they will be asked to take a place on this committee. In any event the name of the student whose name will be engraved on the cup will be sent to them.

Warning Sounded On NRA Racketeers

Local NRA headquarters received information Friday concerning the operation of professional racketeers in the country, these racketeers setting themselves before the public as "expert NRA consultants." General George H. McMorran said Friday.

According to the information received here, these racketeers present themselves to merchants, posing as consultants qualified to give expert advice on NRA problems. They demand charges for their services and represent themselves as officials of national, state or local NRA forces. "There are no such NRA consultants connected with this movement," General McMorran warned. "Anyone seeking information about NRA regulations should go to the local headquarters where he will receive any information available without paying any fee."

Former State Farm Director Is Dead

Lawrence Demagalski, for four years the director of the state game farm near Eugene, died in Corvallis Wednesday, and funeral services will be held at 10 a. m. Saturday at the Hollingsworth chapel in that city, according to word received here Thursday evening.

Mr. Demagalski established the state farm, and after serving as director was transferred to the Pendleton farm and later to that at Corvallis. He left for Pendleton about four years ago.

He had been in the state game work for about 25 years and was well known in Eugene and this vicinity.

interest of harmony on that board. I have taken this step with the deep assurance in my mind that the state has a sound educational system worthy of the support and confidence of taxpayers and students, providing the system is maintained in the interest of our youth, and the disastrous jealousies and the other obstacles are submerged."

Work Enjoyed
Colt also said "I have been interested for many years, as a regent of the university and as a member of the state board of higher education, in trying to assist our boys and girls in securing higher education as an equipment for their life's work. It has been a most pleasant duty and until recently it has not been difficult. Differences of opinion have, for the most part, been harmonized in the interests of the institutions and the youth served by them."

Melzer Makes Statement
In announcing the appointment of Nelson to succeed Starr, Governor Melzer made a formal statement in which he said:

"Changes effected on the board of higher education have been made with the sole aim of securing a harmonious, efficient and fair minded administration of the institutions of higher learning, serving alike the best interests of the college, the university, the normal schools, and the state."

ACCOUNTING MADE PORTLAND, Ore., Sept. 22.—(AP)—

A detailed answer to the report of O. F. Kubin, alleging irregularities in the administration of Oregon State college affairs, was released late Thursday by Chancellor W. J. Kerr.

The report was prepared by W. A. Jensen, executive secretary of the college and specifically answers the four

charges in the Kubin report, namely: The "Linoleum deal," the "Window shade deal," the substitutes for athlete-janitors, and the allegation that the College conducted a "one-sided investigation."

It claims that every inch of linoleum mentioned in the Kubin and Buell reports has been accounted for, and an exhibit of invoices was enclosed. A similar statement was made in relation to the window shades.

Not "One-Sided."
Jensen said that all substitute janitors were required to register, and that the Kubin and Buell reports do not allege that the work was paid for more than once. It offers, if Kubin or Buell will name the three athletes who were paid for janitorial services while away from Corvallis with the football team, to investigate those cases specifically and report on them.

A flat denial that a "one-sided" investigation was made was contained in the latest report and the same charge was hurled back to Kubin and Buell. It was charged that Buell intimidated witnesses and forced them to sign "half truths."

In making public the statement, Dr. Kerr said he had never been furnished either the original or a copy of the Kubin report, but read the report in full in the newspapers. It was upon its publication that he directed Jensen to make a full investigation of the charges of mismanagement in college affairs.

Jensen points out that the only recommendation contained in the reports of either of the auditors was that the purchase of supplies be divorced from the department of buildings. He said that this was done immediately the matter was called to the chancellor's attention by the original Buell audit.
