

HUNT FOR KELLY CENTERS AROUND CHICAGO AREAS

CHICAGO, Sept. 23.—(AP)—The nation wide hunt for George (Machine Gun) Kelly, suspect in half a dozen major crimes of the southwest, was focusing on the Chicago area tonight.

A picture of a man known locally as "J. J. Rosenberg," suspected owner of the armored car which figured Friday in a daring mail messenger holdup and the slaying of a policeman, was identified, Chief of Police William Schoemaker said, as that of Kelly.

Who made the identification was a carefully guarded police secret, but Schoemaker intimated it was by a close acquaintance of Rosenberg.

Shortly before police announced this progress in the widespread hunt for the slayers of Policeman Miles Cunningham and the robbers of the federal reserve bank mail truck, Theodore Rosenberg, who had been brought to the station on an anonymous tip, was released. Theodore Rosenberg established his status as a reputable citizen and it was disclosed he was a prospective candidate for the police force from department 11.

Two men still were held by police in the search for the robbers and gunmen who killed Policeman Cunningham in their escape after holding up the bank mail truck. They were Joseph Bergl, Cicero motor car dealer, and friend, Chief Schoemaker said, of Gus Winkler, sought as possible engineer of the robbery plot, and Charles Phillips, a west side garage man.

Police suspect Bergl of having ordered the armament for the fortress car used in the robbery and left behind when the slayers fled in another machine. Phillips has denied any knowledge of the owner of the hand truck, but Chief Schoemaker considered the detention of both men so important he ordered them booked for murder if habeas corpus writs were sought.

A bill of sale bearing the name "J. Rosenberg" was found in the car.

Chicago police were asked Thursday to seek Kelly following receipt of threatening letters by U. S. District Attorney Herbert Hyde, Charles F. Urschel, for whose kidnapping Harvey Bailey and others are being tried in Oklahoma City, and others in that city associated with the prosecution of the alleged Urschel kidnappers.

The letters to the Oklahoma City recipients were mailed from Chicago and bore Kelly's fingerprint. In the abandoned car along with the bill of sale bearing Rosenberg's name was found a map heavily smudged in the Kansas-Oklahoma region—home haunt of the Kelly gang.

Reforestation Meeting Called For October 24

WASHINGTON, Sept. 23.—(AP)—Conferences with Secretary of Agriculture Wallace concerning the lumbermen of the United States and the nation's reforestation and conservation element will begin here October 24, the purpose being to form a plan whereby the lumber interests will plant as well as cut down trees.

In the past lumbermen have held the cost of planting trees was too great while the conservationists have warned against a disappearing lumber supply unless reforestation methods are put into practice. Nature cannot keep step with the lumberjack's axe in replenishing the forests, the latter group maintains. It is believed the conferences will terminate a 75-year fight between the two bodies.

The NRA code of fair competition for the lumber industry contains a provision for conservation and sustained production of forest resources. This article was inserted through the efforts of Dr. Wilson Compton, president of American Forest Industries and manager of the National Lumber Manufacturers association.

I was told this plan was resorted to in the cases of men who had become so involved financially that they seemed unable to extricate themselves.

Production Speeded Up
"Harry H. Bennett, director of personnel for the Ford company, told me this plan had been discarded several weeks ago. We still continue to receive complaints from the men who want to get off it, however."

"The last class of complaint comes from men now employed at the Ford plant, who state that the production speed is being stepped up so high that they are overworked."

Officials of the Ford company could not be reached tonight for comment on the complaints outlined by Mills. Earlier, however, Ford officials had denied a rumor current here for some days that regular employees were being laid off to make room for the veterans employed. The charge that only Legion and other organization members were being employed has been denied repeatedly by Legion officials.

new deposit insurance provision which goes into effect January 1 will not work under hardship on banks outside the Federal Reserve system which must meet certain requirements of liquidity to be eligible.

He will call first upon local communities to raise any necessary capital required to bring non-member banks into line for the deposit insurance. If the communities cannot go all the way the government will purchase capital stock in solvent banks to make them eligible.

Walter Cummings, conservator of the closed banks, has prepared a broad program to bring about the early release of the locked-up deposits under a plan calling for federal support.
