

MRS. MILLIGAN DIES AT AGE OF 84 YEARS

Mrs. Mary A. Milligan, widow of the late Robert Milligan of Waverly, died Monday at the home of her daughter, Mrs. Bruce Garrison.

Funeral services are to be held Wednesday at 2 p. m. at Veach chapel, interment to be in the old I. O. O. F. cemetery.

Mary Abigail Beale, the daughter of Taverne Beale, was born in Bates county, Mo., Dec. 22, 1849. At the age of three years, she, with her parents, started for the Oregon territory. Upon arriving in the vicinity of Fort Boise, her parents joined those following Elijah Elliott who proposed to lead all those who wished to follow him across the desert stretches of eastern Oregon by the Willamette river to the valley. After a time he became bewildered and lost the way, leaving the emigrants without a leader which necessitated much suffering before word reached the valley and assistance was sent to their rescue.

Aug. 13, 1867 Mary Abigail Beale was married to Robert Milligan, a pioneer of 1859, who settled at Waverly.

She leaves the following children: Oscar, Belle, Laurence and Lester of Waverly; Mrs. George N. McLean and Mrs. Bruce Garrison of Eugene, Mrs. H. E. Leveridge of San Carlos, Cal., and Mrs. Marian Brewster of Battleground, Wash.; three sisters, Mrs. Alice Masterson of Rupert, Idaho, Mrs. Frona Cherry and Mrs. Ida Waggoner of Berkeley, Calif., and one brother, Frank Beale of LaGrande, Oregon.

Mrs. Milligan was a member of the Presbyterian church of Waverly.

Dean Inge Declares Christ's Biography Cannot Be Written

LONDON, Sept. 25.—(AP)—"Whatever confidence we may place in the good faith and substantial accuracy of the synoptic gospels, it remains true that we cannot construct a biography of Jesus Christ," declares Dean William Ralph Inge of St. Paul's in the forward to "Jesus the Unknown," a book by Rassin Merckhovsky published today.

"These lives are most of them unsatisfactory," the dean says. "They are all attempts in the national character of the countries in which they are written and express the ideas and the ideals prevalent in the generation in which they appeared. Seeley's *Ecce Homo* is the work of a contemporary and fellow-countryman of Tennyson; a fine book but Jesus Christ was not an Englishman nor did he live in the reign of Queen Victoria."

JANET SMITH NEW EMPLOYMENT HEAD

length the coordination of four prime federal agencies into a systematic plan intended to release deposits tied up in closed banks and place banks already operating upon a sound basis.

Under this scheme the RFC would rehabilitate a bank's capital structure by purchasing new issues of preferred stock; the farm credit and home loan administration would place slow real estate mortgage assets with their readily saleable bonds, and the deposit guaranty corporation would guarantee the funds of new depositors.

PWA Money Allotted
Meanwhile, the public works administration, promising renewal pressure for greater cash expenditures, announced that it had approved projects which would provide 1,300,000 man-hours of quick-direct employment. It said \$1,600,000,000 of its \$3,300,000,000 had been allotted though only \$50,139,756 had been drawn from the treasury for real expenditure.

Simultaneously Hugh S. Johnson, NRA chief, planned a Blue Eagle buying campaign, intended to help industry take on additional employees and raise wages.

Johnson's appeal to buy, as he put it, "To buy to the limit of prudent means" has been delayed by various circumstances within the NRA, notably the difficulty of completing the coal code.

FISH BONE KILLS
KELSO, Wash., Sept. 25.—(AP)—A tiny fish bone, swallowed ten days ago, had caused the death today of Alex Algren, 42. Algren suffered some pain but x-rays failed to show the bone, which ultimately punctured an artery.

First instance of cremation in this country was the cremation of the body of Col. Henry Laurens at Charleston, S. C. in 1792.

DR. MOLL TEACHES FIRST NIGHT CLASS

"MASQUERADER" IS COLMAN'S GREATEST

BUDGET MEETINGS BEGIN TUESDAY

The Lane county budget committee is scheduled to meet at 10 o'clock Tuesday morning to organize and scan the budgets submitted by the different county officers and heads of county departments. E. U. Lee of Eugene, Charles Beldier of Cottage Grove and Walter J. Holland of Crow have been named the three outside members of the committee to sit with the members of the county court to determine the amount of tax money to be expended by the county in 1934.

Members of the county court declined to make an estimate as to the amount of cuts, if any, to be made in the sums allotted to the different branches of the county government but were quite certain that they would have to figure on a tax delinquency fully as great as that of this year and would have to get along without the O and O land grant tax refund.

The committee probably will meet every day until the budget is finally drafted.

Greenland Has New Links for Evolution Chain

COPENHAGEN, Sept. 25.—(AP)—Lauge Koch, Danish explorer of the Arctic, arrived from east Greenland today, bringing fossilized fish of the tertiary period which he claimed plainly demonstrated new links in evolution.

Koch last year brought home the now-famous four-legged fish. Regarding prospects of gold discoveries, the explorer said:

"East Greenland is no Klondike, although we actually found five grains of pure gold."

Last year on his return from Greenland, Dr. Koch announced he had found evidence of a missing link in the chain of evolution—a four-legged fish that walked ashore.

"As you know," he explained, "scientists have divided evolution into five main groups, fish, toads, reptiles, birds, and mammals."

"But the connecting link has been missing. This link I claim to have found between fish and toads. We have found petrified remains of incalculable value."
