

COMPLIANCE BODY READY TO SETTLE WORK QUESTIONS

With the election of P. E. Snodgrass, former president of the First National Bank here, as permanent chairman of the NRA board of compliance, the board is now ready to function in the local NRA campaign. Names of the chairman and the board have been sent to Washington for registration.

Mr. Snodgrass will retain his position indefinitely, other members of the board being elected for shorter terms, possibly of 45 days. The members are Hugh W. Reynolds and S. O. Jordan, representing employees; A. L. Williamson and M. R. Irish, representing employers; Mrs. George P. Winchell, representing consumers; and Donald Husband, legal member. The compliance board will not handle labor disputes, having no authority to do so, according to word received here Thursday. Regional labor boards, to be established in the near future, will mediate all labor disputes.

General George H. McMorran, E. G. Harlan, manager of the chamber of commerce, J. A. McLean and Crosby Owens went to Portland Thursday to confer with NRA officials there and to view the Portland NRA parade. It is possible an NRA parade may be organized here in the near future.

Wives working in stores jointly operated by a married couple are considered partners and are not subject to provisions of the NRA re-employment agreement. General McMorran was informed in a set of instructions received here Thursday. Other members of the immediate family, however, are subject to the NRA provisions governing hours of work and wages.

Ford automobile agents who have signed the president's agreement and are complying with its provisions are entitled to display the Blue Eagle in spite of the fact Henry Ford has refused to sign it, it was further learned.

Other information received was as follows: Private schools and educational institutions operated for profit, including business colleges, are eligible to display the Blue Eagle upon qualifying under the provisions limiting hours of work and setting minimum wages. The practice of employing working at two jobs, while not specifically forbidden by NRA, is deemed advisable to spread work as much as possible. Barber shops operated by the owner, who employs no help, are limited to 52 hours of operation in any one week. No barber, or owner, may work more than 48 hours in a week in shops employing one or more men. Barbers must determine their prices individually.

plans? And if so how to achieve the best results at least expense. "The agricultural council believes that the question of the county agent's value as a farm adviser can be omitted at present and that the actual costs of handling the two federal items of seed loans and wheat allotments through the county agent this year as compared to the cost of hiring a special man, indicate that the budget item for a county agent is sound business judgment. The county court is pledged to economy and efficiency and we feel that the saving in using the county agent primarily as a federal contact man more than offsets other campaign pledges that the agent as a farm adviser is an expense not warranted at this time."

Mrs. Mabel Chadwick, secretary of the Lane county fair board, after having been asked to submit an itemized budget for the fair, simply handed in the item of \$1400 as asked for, \$700 of which was for general expenses and \$700 for Four-H fair. This brought forth sharp criticism on the part of some of the members. Commissioner Crowe declaring that the committee should be furnished with a clear statement of what has been received and expended.

The committee placed the sum of \$800 in the budget under the head of juvenile court, Judge Fisk announcing that he planned to set up a real juvenile court with an unpaid advisory council. The judge will continue to act as judge of this court, he said. He pointed out that while Lane county boys are no worse than any other, juvenile delinquency cases are on the increase here and that the committee should budget a sufficient sum to take care of all such work.

The budget items agreed upon by the committee are only tentative and

are subject to reduction before the board adjourns, it was emphatically pointed out. The budget items adopted compared with those of 1933 are as follows:

half dollars in addition to its state school fund. Missouri has raised \$3,000,000.

"In New York \$51,000,000 of school costs for the current year will come from state sources. In North Carolina a minimum term of eight months throughout the state will be paid for from state funds and local school districts may continue the term beyond that period.

"The legislature of the state of Washington provided a state fund of \$10,000,000 annually for the schools of the state. A number of other states have taken steps similar to these."

Sister of Judge Skipworth Dies

Mrs. Mary C. Pipes, sister of Judge G. F. Skipworth of Eugene and widow of the late Judge Martin L. Pipes, one of the best known attorneys in the state, died at her home in Portland Wednesday night. Judge Pipes died in July, 1932. Judge Skipworth was at her bedside at the time of her death. Time of the funeral had not been set up to late Thursday.

Mrs. Pipes was born in Alabama in 1856, and married Judge Pipes in that state in 1874. A few months later the two came to Oregon, settling near Independence. Later they moved to Corvallis, and in 1892 they went to Portland.

Three sons and two daughters survive. Other surviving relatives besides Judge Skipworth include a brother, Rev. Walton Skipworth of Portland, and Mrs. Eula B. Wood of Monmouth, a sister.

four relief organizations in the county and in conclusion declared the unemployed groups requested the repeal of the state relief committee act and place county courts as relief agencies for disbursement of funds. They demanded relief be based on the rate of \$30 per month for single persons, \$40 for couples and \$50 for each child; that payments be made in cash; that relief work be on the basis of 50 cents an hour for not less than six hours a day and four days a week, and that a capital levy on wealth be assessed to pay for relief.

At the conclusion of these demands an unemployed family of six children, declared to be typical of unemployed families, was offered as an "exhibit." Speakers before the committee representing the unemployed included Bjorn Johannson, Kenneth Fitzgerald, Paul Moore and Dirk DeJong, the latter a communist candidate for mayor of Portland in the last general election.

Reaction Feared
The majority sub-committee report, submitted by F. L. Shull, Nettie Rankin Boland and W. J. Roork, based its demand for about \$15,000,000 relief funds on the basis of 20,000 families on relief rolls at an average of \$40 per family per month. Of this sum about \$12,250,000 was to be raised by the state, \$5,000,000 by the federal government and \$400,000 by counties.

The minority report, which was adopted, was presented by R. B. Wilcox and Elliott Corbett, asking \$8,000,000 of which the state was to raise \$5,000,000. The same number of families was used as a base, but providing \$18.40 per family, with the suggestion that self-help could provide the balance necessary for sustenance.

Wilcox spoke for adoption of the lower figure, while Shull, Roork and Harry L. Gross spoke at length in favor of the larger sum. Gross declared the \$8,000,000 would be raised by pressure within three or four months, and that "if you want an orderly reaction, \$15,000,000 should be the minimum consideration." He declared that "otherwise there will be spontaneous eruptions all over the state that require no agitation to start."

Plans Considered
In voting for the reports, Ray Gill, Earl Snell and Wilcox, voting in favor of the lower estimate, made explanations declaring that if this fund were low, no one could predict the future happenings and conditions, and if necessary a second special legislative session could be called to take care of emergencies. Gill said he feared the up-state reaction against revenue

measures if the larger sum were submitted. Wilcox concurred, declaring the submission of such large sums for relief had "already done much injury to the unemployed."

The committee, called to consider unemployed and school relief, was expected tonight to recommend several methods of raising the revenue, as presented by a sub-committee headed by Ray Gill, to meet the state's share of the \$8,000,000 set as a goal for relief alone. It was expected the committee would again urge the governor to call a special session immediately. The earliest probable date mentioned unofficially was October 16.

Fred E. Kiddle of La Grande, president of the senate, presided at the meeting. During the afternoon several special reports of the revenue sub-committee, in addition to a list of 13 measures proposed by the majority of the committee to raise money, will be introduced. Chairman Gill announced.

CONVICTIONS ASKED
OKLAHOMA CITY, Sept. 28.—(AP)—Joseph B. Keenan, President Roosevelt's crime minister, today asked the Urschel kidnaping jury to decide whether Americans shall have a government of law and order or "abdicate in favor of machine gun gangsters."

In an uncompromising manner the heavy-set prosecutor, condemned notorious Harvey J. Bailey, Albert Bates and others accused in the \$200,000 ransom plot against Oilman Charles F. Urschel. Only for 21-year-old Armon Shannon, Texas farm youth defendant, did he recommend mercy.

With fighting Irish fervor, Keenan, assistant U. S. attorney-general, demanded conviction of "each and every one of the nine men and one woman" on trial as he opened arguments for the government.
