

HOMEMAKERS ASK BUDGET GROUP TO KEEP HOME AGENT

which the money is distributed, she pointed out.

"Fifty per cent of the counties in the United States now maintain home demonstration agents," she said. "In your own state, Lane county ranks high in this work. Lane county, with 41 communities having the extension program, stands at the top of the list in this respect for Oregon. Clackamas county has 34 communities. Lane is second highest in number of local leaders trained for the work with a total of 173. Jackson county is first with a total of 185.

"In the number of office calls, 1,484 last year, bulletins distributed numbering 5,968, and material demonstration meetings numbering 192, Lane county is among the highest."

A group of projects, to be carried out in Lane county during the coming year, in the event the home demonstration agent is retained, was outlined at the meeting, according to Mrs. E. G. Gustin, vice-chairman of the county extension committee, who presided at the meeting. Following are the projects:

1—Low cost meals project. Twenty-eight communities have requested this project and a course of six lessons has been tentatively scheduled. It will include instruction in the selection and preparation of low cost foods to insure health protection and child health.

2—Home sewing project. This project follows the low cost meals lessons and will consist of a series of meetings with instructions. Last year 1,627 persons attended the meetings in this project with a total savings in garments estimated at \$500. On the basis of garments received at meetings, the total saving in the county is estimated at \$2,000.

3—Material study project. This project, to be started late in October or in November, will bring hundreds of Lane county women to Eugene where they will be conducted on a tour through local stores, studying materials with the purpose of learning to recognize values. In connection with this project, a series of six lessons on economical sewing using inexpensive new material will be given.

4—Recreational training project. The county recreational institute is scheduled for the third week in Octo-

ber for three evenings. Representatives of the county groups gathered here at that time to receive instruction in recreational leadership. This project is followed by monthly meetings. Last year a total of more than 2700 persons attended these meetings. In this connection, the National Recreation association will assign a recreation specialist to this county this year to conduct a course in recreation leadership similar to the course held here last year. Lane was one of the five counties in Oregon to benefit through this service last year.

5—Child development. In this project, radio clubs are being formed throughout the county to listen to radio broadcasts on home development. These start Friday, Oct. 2. Present indications are that there will be 20 such groups in this county. Reports on the meetings and additional instructions are handled by the home demonstration agent.

The meeting was started at 10 a. m. with Mrs. Gustin talking on the purpose of the meeting. Mrs. Truman Chase, county project leader in recreation, conducted the recreational periods in the morning and afternoon. She was assisted by Miss Beulah Morgan, of 7-45, market reports; S. Prof. A. G. Bouquet, "Winter Storage of Vegetables"; 8-15, philosopher of the crossroads; 8-30, music of the masters.

FORD MAKES DENIAL
DETROIT, Sept. 29.—(AP)—A printed report that the Ford Motor company would close all its plants if pressed by labor troubles was authoritatively said today to be without foundation.

While the company stuck to its established policy of not issuing denials of unsubstantiated reports, it was revealed informally that no authorized spokesman of the firm was responsible for the published reports.

PINCHOT SEES F. D.
HYDE PARK, N. Y., Sept. 29.—(AP)—Governor Pinchot of Pennsylvania flew here today to confer with President Roosevelt on moves to end the labor troubles in the western Pennsylvania bituminous fields where 7,500 men are on strike.

Asked if he was going to request federal intervention, the governor replied that "I am going to talk over everything."

Accompanied by Mrs. Pinchot he landed in a national guard plane at the government field at New Hackensack, 11 miles distant.

Hunter Missing Since Tuesday In Vaughn Area

Lloyd Kilburn, 26, who had been visiting relatives at Vaughn, has been missing since Tuesday and several parties of men are in the timber in that locality trying to find him. Deputy Sheriff George Canaday, Phillip Pittman, state police officer in charge of game protection, and Isaac Newman left Eugene early Friday to assist in the search.

Kilburn, who had been visiting his aunt, Mrs. Michaels, at Vaughn, left Tuesday with his gun, stating that he was going to try to get a deer. He failed to return and a party began a search the next day without finding trace of him. Sheriff Swartz and the state police were notified Thursday afternoon and the party of officers was made up that evening to go out early Friday.

The young man had come to Oregon from his home in Michigan several months ago. He had been on the Siuslaw river below Vaughn for some time and had returned to the home of his aunt only a few days ago.

Kilburn had no food or bedding with him, his aunt says, and it is certain that he did not plan to remain in the woods over night. It is feared that he might have been badly injured or killed in an accident.
