Articles Printed
Articles written by two university professors appear in the September issue of the Oregon Historical Quarterly and the Pacific Historical Review. Dr. R. C. Clark is author of "Abner and Peel on Oregon," in the Quarterly. The article contains a collection of letters written by Sir Robert Peel and Lord Aberdeen, at the height of the Oregon boundary dispute in 1844. "The United States and the Sino-Korean Relations, 1880-1887" is the title of the article which Dr. Harold W. Swanson, printed in the Review. It traces the diplomatic representative of the Korean court during 1885-1887.

Deed to Bend
Dean Wayne M. Morse of the law school has gone to Bend to attend the annual meeting of the Oregon Bar association which is being held there Friday and Saturday. Dean Morse is to address the session on "Plans for the Pacific Coast Institute of Law and Administration of Justice." His two other volumes are entitled, "The Standard of Living," and "The Cooperative Marketing of Agricultural Products."
