

CODE AUTHORITY CHOSEN BY LANE COUNTY GROCERS

Enforcement of regulations of the food and grocery stores code will be started in Lane county as rapidly as government approval and a certificate of authority can be obtained for the four members of the county code authority elected Tuesday night.

Chosen members of the code authority are Ray Glass, Pioneer Grocery company, Eugene, representing wholesalers; E. Rogers, Safeway Stores, Eugene, representing chain stores; Otto Schmidt, The Groceries, Eugene, representing independents; Ben Perlich, of Perlich's, representing voluntary groups. About 75 grocers from all over Lane county were present to ballot for representatives.

Members of the code authority will elect a chairman, a secretary and a treasurer and be in charge of administering all provisions of the code in Lane county. They will serve for a period of one year without pay. Mr. Schmidt is acting as chairman of the group pending formal elections Friday night.

Elmer Little of Eugene, temporary chairman, presided at the organization meeting and read the code and powers of the code authority. The county code authority will receive all complaints as to violation of the fair practices rules, all complaints to be made in writing and signed, and attempt to bring about a correction through contacting the alleged violator. If unsuccessful, the local authority may take the case direct to national headquarters but also has the privilege of asking help of the state board, which will act solely in an advisory capacity.

Complaints of labor troubles are to be made direct to the district compliance board which will notify the local code authority with full protection for the complainant.

Expenses of the code authority are to be met by an assessment of one dollar a year for each employee, including proprietors and managers, and part time workers employed over 60 per cent of the work week. The assessment is divided as follows: 25 cents to national code authority; 15 cents to state code authority; 60 cents to local code authority. Non-payment of the assessment, now due for the year starting Jan. 1, 1934, will be reported to the national authority.

COSTS NOT EXAMINED

WASHINGTON, Feb. 7.—(AP)—Navy department auditors admitted to the house committee today that they accepted without question the cost figures submitted by aircraft engine companies working on government contracts.

Captain T. P. Ballenger, chief of the accounting division of the navy bureau of supplies and accounts, disclosed the practice in response to questions by Chairman Delaney of the house naval affairs sub-committee investigating government aircraft contracts.

Ballenger said his division accepted aircraft companies' statements as to payrolls, labor costs, number of employees and amounts paid. He said that the department assumed these figures were correct.

Former Secretary of Navy Charles Francis Adams telegraphed Delaney he would be glad to appear before the committee as suggested yesterday. Delaney said Adams probably would appear the latter part of next week.

JURY PROBES GRAFT

WASHINGTON, Feb. 7.—(AP)—The Evening Star says indictment of at least three persons, two of them high in the ranks of the American Legion, will be asked of the federal grand jury by the government in connection with the alleged conspiracy to graft on the millions of dollars allotted for motorizing the army.

As President Roosevelt today asked Attorney General Cummings to go to the bottom of the reported irregularities, a procession of army officers and motor company representatives went into the grand jury room some blocks away.

The only name publicly mentioned by the war and justice departments in the inquiry is that of Joseph Silverman, Jr., of New York, but the Star reports that evidence presented to the grand jury today is said to have incriminated a former high executive of the legion, now practicing law here, and a legal associate.

"Scab" Taxicab Driver Attacked

NEW YORK, Feb. 7.—(AP)—Hurting bricks and stones, a crowd of about 50 striking taxicab drivers today injured a hack driver and caused his woman passengers to flee in terror. Two of the malcontents were arrested and charged with malicious mischief. The injured driver suffered a lacerated temple.

The cab strike which for five days has compelled many New Yorkers to pound the pavements was declared virtually ended by both union drivers and operators.

taste with the salt, pepper and onion juice.

Cook the oysters in their own liquor until the gills curl. Add to the white sauce. Pour in to the case made from the loaf of bread. Cover with the lid cut from the bread. Place on a hot platter and garnish with vegetable curls.—Mrs. H. H. Brubeau, 87 West Eighth street, Eugene.

Baked Smelt

Clean smelt and lay in stone jar or heavy aluminum pan. Between layers, sprinkle allspice, cloves and salt according to family's taste for spices. On top, lay one bay leaf if there is any in the house. Equally delicious without. Cover fish with weak solution of vinegar and water approximately 1 cup water and 1/2 cup vinegar. Bake 4 hours, covered closely. The action of the vinegar will soften the bones so they can be eaten as in sardines. A tomato sauce in place of the vinegar will have the same action on the bones and is equally delicious.—Mrs. Ira O. Williams, 1159 Washington St., Eugene.

Spiced Pickled Smelt

Select the smaller smelt and clean, leaving heads and tails on, and steam for exactly five minutes. Longer steaming will make them too soft. Place in a crock, cover with pickling vinegar highly spiced to suit your own taste and a little cooking oil. Slice

two lemons and two or three onions into the crock and let stand 24 hours. Served on a small plate with marmalade of lemon, parsley and crackers. This makes one of the most delicious kinds of appetizers.—Mrs. M. Johnson, 501 West Broadway, Eugene.

Frozen Salmon Salad

1 1/2 cups canned salmon (or fresh cooked salmon)
1 c. diced celery
1 Tbsp. each of minced pepper and pimiento
1 Tbsp. minced parsley
1 Tbsp. onion juice
1 Tbsp. lemon juice
1/4 tsp. salt
1-8 tsp. pepper
1 c. mayonnaise
1 c. heavy whipped cream.
Shredded lettuce
1 hard cooked egg

Remove all skin, bone and liquid from salmon. Break into flakes and combine with celery, pepper, pimiento, parsley and other flavorings and seasonings. Blend mayonnaise and cream, use to moisten first mixture. Turn into refrigerator trays and place in freezing chamber four to six hours, or pack in mold, seal and bury in salt and ice for four hours. Unmold on shredded lettuce, garnish with sections of hard cooked egg. Serves six.—Mrs. Roger B. Hall, Wendling.

that was exchangeable in other parts of the world.

"Money is simply a tool to do a job," he said.

The speaker traced the recent steps of the administration's monetary policy, starting with the bank holiday last spring at which time he said, in his opinion, America went off the gold standard. Previous to this, in 1929, the world was convinced that the gold standard was fixed for all time, but when in 1931 Great Britain went off the gold standard, the world began to be doubtful.

Following the bank holiday, he said, the president began calling in gold since, as he planned to cut the value of the gold in the dollar, it would not do to have gold coin held by persons who would capitalize in the increased value of the metal when the dollar value was cut. Then followed the governmental purchase of gold, forcing the gold price up, and finally the actual cutting of the gold value of the dollar.

In declaring he felt the danger of inflation was not yet over, Dr. Morris pointed to the wide powers given the president in the Thompson amendment to the agricultural adjustment act which was sought by Mr. Roosevelt to prevent such wild inflation. This act, he said, gave the president the power to issue three billion dollars in paper money, accept from foreign debtors payment in silver at the rate of 50 cents an ounce, cut the gold content of the dollar up to 50 per cent, and establish bi-metalism at any ratio he desired.

These powers were sought by the president to prevent wild inflation, he declared.

In expressing his criticism of the administration's policies, Dr. Morris emphasized the point that he was in accord with the plans for economic adjustment, including the various adjustment acts and the NRA and industrial codes, but said he felt that the tinkering with the money was putting the cart before the horse.

"Our troubles are not, primarily, with the gold supply," he said. "If it were, it might have been necessary to cut the gold content of the dollar. Again, had distribution of gold was said to be the trouble with too much of the gold centered in America and France, but that also was not the real root. If the gold had been re-adjusted all over the world and the system left as it was, it soon would have again been mal-distributed as before. There was something back of the thing causing the mal-distribution."

These troubles, the real root of the world depression, lie in the international difficulties and no monetary system could stand up under these difficulties, he stated. International debts before the war consisted of investments in productive enterprises and interest and principal could be paid, but in the post-war period these debts were non-productive, and interest could not be raised to meet them.

"In productive debts, the burden falls on foreign trade and the movement of goods carries the interest,"

he said.

PARISIAN RIOTING CONTINUES; TROOPS KEPT ARE IN HIDING

slightly, gained steadily throughout the day, and as night drew in, private cars were impressed into duty as ambulances to rush the wounded to hospitals.

The horses of the guards, many of them riderless, plunged madly through the confusion of the Place de la Concorde.

Hallways and corners of the buildings surrounding the great square were packed by persons seeking shelter from the battling mobs and the police.

Troops Are Hidden

The apparent hostility of the crowds increased steadily.

The courtyard of the marine ministry, which the mob set afire last night, was turned into a barracks.

Mounted troops and mobile guards were held there in reserve instead of on the Place de la Concorde in the hope that diminution of the visible force might serve to pacify the crowd.

The commanding officer of one detachment of helmeted mobile guards ordered his men to sheathe their sabres for the same reason. With their sabres in the scabbards, the guard detachment passed down the Rue de Lafayette.

Mob Fury Grows

As at the Place de la Concorde, most of the available military force which has been poured into Paris, was hidden in courtyards and on side streets, ready to emerge at any time.

Darkness fell, and the Place de la Concorde suddenly became such a scene as when one army assaults another in its camp.

Huge bonfires like those of a bivouacked army burst into being among the trees of the great square.

The flickering flames cast struggling shadows in long lines across the place as the rioters and the police milled in tumult.

The snarling mob actually was pushed up close to the deadly barricade across the bridgehead which some of the rioters crossed yesterday only to meet a burst of bullets from machine guns placed on the steps of the chamber of deputies building directly across the river Seine.

The temper of the mobs steadily grew uglier as darkness became more intense. They were composed mainly of workmen with a large mixture of communists marching and singing and fighting beside them.

The steelhelmed mobile guards carried rifles but up till 6 p. m. they had done no shooting.

They did not fire although they

were showered relentlessly with bottles, stones, and slugs of iron.

DALADIER RESIGNS

PARIS, Feb. 7.—(AP)—President LeBrun today offered the premiership of France to Senator Louis Barthou, a former premier.

Senator Barthou was asked to succeed Premier Edouard Daladier who resigned his post in the face of threats of a renewal of the rioting.

to the main stores, agencies will be established in seven suburban districts. Bootleggers, moonshiners and all unlicensed dealers in liquor will find three groups of law enforcement officers arrayed against them when the liquor control commission takes over the job of regulation and control, it was said today by Sammis.

Police Plan Outlined

The commission will take over this control as soon as the state supreme court rules on the constitutionality of the liquor law.

The city police forces will be the first line of attack on the illegal dealers. The sheriff and their deputies will constitute the second line, working outside limits of municipalities, and the state police will serve as a flying squadron, operating in co-operation with the other branches of the service.

Sammis said the state police will operate with both city and county officers if and when needed. The primary job of enforcement, he explained, rests with the city police.

Administrator Sammis said the supervisors will personally notify city officials and the newspapers in each municipality in connection with the store sites and personnel. Each city in which a store is to be located will be visited.

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BAILEY THROWS FULL SUPPORT TO GEN. MARTIN

Throwing his full support behind the candidacy of General Charles H. Martin, Edward F. "As governor, his cordial relations with the national administration will be of untold benefit to Oregon."

"The Democrats of Oregon would do well to unite solidly behind the

candidacy of General Martin. If they do so I feel that our victory is certain."
