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CONTROL OF MILK SURPLUS PLANNED THROUGH POOLING

PORTLAND, Feb. 8.—(P)—Establishment of a pooling agency by which milk and cream surpluses in the Portland area will be controlled, and the industry otherwise stabilized, was effected by Saturday. It was said here today by E. G. Harlan, chairman of the Oregon milk control board.

The order will provide for pooling of income from surplus milk in this area, will regulate production to some extent by establishment of basic production averages, and will attempt to eliminate "chilling."

"Chilling," Harlan said, has long been costly to a majority of local milked producers who have been unable by reason of mutual agreement to cope with a few unethical producers who have free-lanced in the surplus milk market.

Next week the control board will visit Baker, La Grande, Pendleton and other eastern Oregon cities where meetings will be held, data collected, and suggestions heard for ultimate formulation of price schedules and milked boundaries.

The Portland city council was asked yesterday by Thomas Sweeney, chairman of the Portland milk consumers' committee, to seek an injunction against the price-fixing orders of the control board on the ground the orders were issued illegally. He said his committee has never been able to obtain an audience with the board.

Optional Military Training Petition Faculty Question

Action on the petition of a group of 25 students of the University of Oregon to make military training optional instead of compulsory was deferred by the faculty Wednesday until a special meeting to be held Thursday, Feb. 8 at 4 o'clock. Lack of time for debate on the proposal was given as the reason for the postponement of action.

A majority report of a committee appointed to consider the matter was read, which favored retention of the present system, with some modifications if the faculty saw fit to so legislate. A minority report in favor of the proposal was also read. Lack of time prevented debate, but the entire session tomorrow will be given over to this matter.

The faculty approved three courses in religion, to be taught next year. These will be titled "Origins of Religions," "Great Religions of the Orient," and "The Great Religions of Palestine and Arabia." These will replace present courses on religion, and will be offered as heretofore through a non-major service department of religion in the college of social sciences. Two new courses in education entitled "Methods of Teaching Art Appreciation" and "Methods of Teaching Appreciation of Literature" were approved.

The courses in appreciation have been developed through work done under the Carnegie grant for appreciation of art, and will have as their purpose the training of teachers to teach these subjects in high schools. Dr. John F. Boyard, dean of the school of physical education, was elected a member of the advisory council, replacing Dr. C. V. Boyer, who has been named acting president of the university.

Bigger and Fewer Eggs Code Way to Cut Down Surplus

BOISE, Idaho, Feb. 8.—(P)—Bigger eggs and fewer of them is the aim of the National Poultry Hatcherymen's code which Idaho and eastern Oregon operators were told they must join if they wish to sell any of their production.

J. A. Hannah, national coordinator of the code, said it was aimed at insuring fair practices, but had as a major motive the reduction of the surplus.

"Little eggs hatch out chickens which lay little eggs," he said.

The code provides that only chicken eggs which weigh 22 ounces a dozen or more will be permitted to hatch.

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Beer Alcoholic Content Studied

CHICAGO, Ill., Feb. 8.—According to an announcement appearing in the Brewers' Bulletin, tests of 104 brands of beer made in the United States since the 3.2 per cent alcohol limit was removed in December, show that none has more than 4.2 per cent alcoholic content. The tests were made at the Siebel Institute of Technology.

All the tests showed more than 3.2 per cent alcohol by weight, the lowest being 3.3, according to Dr. Frederick P. Siebel, head of the institute. The beer best in regard to palate fullness, foam stability, specific gravity, and which was the most normally fermented, contained 5.0 per cent, or 4.5 per cent by volume.
