Housewives' Forum

Cook in large kettle, in water enough to cover. Boil slowly. Season to suit taste.

About an hour before serving add little balls made of the following: $\frac{1}{4}$ lb. hamburger, $\frac{1}{4}$ lb. sausage, 1 egg, 1 cup cracker crumbs, $\frac{1}{4}$ teaspoon nutmeg. About 20 minutes before serving add a pkg. of vermicelli. Really delicious.—Mrs. F. C. Cottrill, 1126 Taylor St., Eugene.

Scotch Soup
(As made by the housewives of the Bonny Isle. Serves six or eight generous helpings.)

1 large soup bone
2 medium carrots
2 medium turnips, yellow or white
1 large onion
 $\frac{1}{2}$ head cabbage (about 2 pounds)
 $\frac{1}{2}$ cup lentils
1 cup rolled oats, pearl barley or rice
2 quarts water
Salt and pepper to taste.

(Method of Procedure)
Get knuckle joint soup bone if possible, or at any rate one containing much marrow. Have the butcher saw the bone so that the juices and marrow will all cook out.

Put the bone to cook very early in the morning, (or cook day before using) with cold water in tight covered kettle and simmer slowly for two hours. Next add the vegetables which have been chopped all together with chopping knife. (Do not put through food grinder.) Cook slowly another two hours then add the lentils and rolled oats. Cook one hour longer and serve hot with bread and butter. Longer cooking does not injure soup.

As this soup burns to the kettle very readily after the rolled oats are

added it is best to use an asbestos mat under the kettle, for a tiny bit of scorch will spoil the soup.

This soup served with bread and butter, followed by fruit and cookies for dessert and milk is an excellent meal for school children and grown-ups. It is the national soup of Scotland.—Margaret I. Ferguson, 1571 High St., Eugene.

Celery Soup
3 cups celery (cut in 1 in pieces)
1 pint boiling water
 $\frac{1}{2}$ cup milk
1 slice of onion
3 tablespoons butter
 $\frac{1}{4}$ cup flour
Salt and pepper.

Cook celery in boiling water until soft and rub through sieve. Scald milk with onion, remove onion, add milk and celery, bind with butter and flour cooked together. Serve with crostons or pulled bread, or crisped crackers.—Mrs. J. Gorianna Svarverud, P. O. box 563, Eugene.

Onion Soup
3 potatoes
3 onions
1 pint water
1 quart milk
1 tablespoon butter
1 cup cream
3 tablespoons flour.

Chop onions and fry them in butter till soft and brown. Then add flour and stir until cooked. Add gradually boiling water and stir until smooth.

Boil, mash and stir into 1 quart boiling milk, the potatoes. Into this pour the other ingredients, and season with salt and pepper. The addition of the cream improves the flavor.—Mrs. J. N. LeBeau, Laxton Apts., 434 B. St., Springfield.

AGE PENSIONS STORY

shall receive some help, rather than a few receive a maximum amount, and others receive nothing.

"The tax burden to finance the old age pension from each county is greater and the pension much less than would have been the case had the legislature followed the custom used in most states where pensions are granted, wherein the state itself pays from one-half to three-fourths of the pension, or had the pension been financed from other than real property taxes, the legislature provided no method of financing except from present tax sources. The pension law states that in no case shall a pension exceed \$50 in any one month, including any income which the claimant may have from any source, or may thereafter acquire.

Within this limit, the old age pension commission of each county is authorized to exercise its discretion with due regard to the conditions in each case. On account of the number of applications, beyond a doubt no pension for even \$30 will be allowed except in cases where the applicant is bedridden and without home or relatives for partial support. In the main, pensions will range from \$5 to \$20, according to the classification of applicants. Allowances will be granted as near as possible in accordance with the needs of the applicant, taking into consideration all surrounding conditions and circumstances."

checking over the reports of the inquiry into ocean mail subsidies. upon the \$8,000,000 estimated to be employed by industries which have codes pending. Through increased business activity and codification the hope to expand this number by at least 1,500,000.

Theoretically, therefore, by reduced hours and business expansion they expect a minimum re-employment in the spring months of 4,000,000 and whether this number is increased is dependent upon the result of the renewal of industrial activity.

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
