

CONTRACT PROBE ASKED BY HOOVER, BROWN DECLARES

House. I asked Mr. Coleman if he desired me to prepare anything of that sort and he stated that he would handle it."

MacCracken Sees Bids
Black said that within three hours after the transcontinental bids were opened on Aug. 25, 1930, William P. MacCracken, Jr., former assistant secretary of commerce and Washington representative for TWA went to the postoffice department and examined the Unit A bid "with a view to submitting objections."

"I recall that they filed a protest," Brown said, "covering all of the points in controversy, some of which had merit and some not. I sent the bids and accompanying papers to the comptroller general."

Brown said he discussed the bid with President Hoover.

"Did you ever discuss it with Herbert Hoover, Jr.?"

"I never did."

Objections Not Valid

Brown said he probably had discussed the bids with MacCracken.

A letter to the comptroller from Harold N. Graves, one of Brown's assistants, on Dec. 29, 1930, explaining the reasons for rejecting the United Corporation's low bid was read by Black.

The letter explained that the postoffice department believed the United company had failed to answer the statutory requirements in connection with submission of bids.

The comptroller informed the department that in his opinion the low bid could not legally be rejected on the grounds that the company had not qualified under the night-flying provision in the postal regulations.

Black brought out in questioning that all air-line companies carrying the mails two weeks ago were operating on contracts, extensions or route certificates issued by Brown.

Patents Charged

"And they were all given certificates after that conference in May, 1930?" Black asked.

"I'm not questioning that, but it's a matter I'd want to look at further," Brown said.

Black then attempted to show that political considerations prompted Brown to arrange for airmail contracts to expire in April, 1934.

"It is not true," Black said, "that the route certificates were drawn so that they would expire two months before the regular republican convention in June, 1934."

Brown smiled and admitted the "coincidence," but said:

"I didn't have time to think about that. Sometimes I thought about the conventions, but not when I was busy running the postoffice."

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cold milk, stir well. Let cook till consistency of gravy, add salt to taste. Peel eggs, cut up the whites, add to white sauce. Have ready hot buttered toast, place the white sauce on toast, crumble the yolks, sprinkle on top. Add a little paprika if desired. Can also be used for a luncheon dish.—Mrs. Theuerkauf, Lorane.

Never-Fail Omelet
(With Spanish Sauce)

1 cup bread crumbs, not too fine, just merely broken up and scald 1 cup milk, pour over bread crumbs while hot. Let soak 'till bread is just soft. 6 eggs, stir up, but do not beat them, put in with milk and bread, salt and pepper to taste. Put a piece of butter about as large as a large walnut in a frying pan. Pour in mixture, and fry like hot cakes, but rather slowly, so the mixture sets with boiling; when brown on one side, turn and brown on other side, and serve with Spanish sauce, which has been previously prepared. Serve at once.

(Spanish Sauce)

2 tablespoons chopped carrot
2 tablespoons chopped onion
2 tablespoons chopped raw ham
2 tablespoons butter or bacon fat
3 tablespoons flour

1 cup meat stock (brown)
1 cup tomatoes
1 teaspoon salt
1 teaspoon paprika
1-2 teaspoon black pepper
Bit of bay leaf
6 peppercorns
2 cloves

Sprig of parsley
Cook carrot, onion and ham in fat five minutes, or until light brown. Add flour and brown. Add stock, tomatoes and seasonings and simmer fifteen minutes. Strain. Season more, if necessary and serve with omelet.—Mattie W. Radabaugh, River Road, Eugene.

Rice Omelet

1 cup cooked rice
1 cup milk
1/2 teaspoon salt
1-2 teaspoon pepper
3 tablespoons butter

4 eggs
Heat milk, add cooked rice, 2 tablespoons butter, salt and pepper. Beat well and add the well beaten yolks of eggs. Fold in whites of eggs beaten until stiff and dry. Melt remaining butter in a hot iron spider or omelet pan. Turn pan until thoroughly coated with butter and make sizzling hot. Pour in omelet mixture and let cook on top of stove for two minutes to brown the bottom. Then cook in a hot oven until well puffed and firm to the touch. Fold and turn out on a hot platter. Serve with tomato sauce or fresh tomatoes cut in slices, dipped in melted butter and broiled. Or can be served plain (I like this best).

(Cook rice in boiling salted water until tender, about 3-4 hour, pour boiling water over it, drain through sieve, pour more boiling water over rice, until rice falls apart.—Mrs. Faya Baker, Baker, Ore.)

Eggs in Baked Potatoes

4 potatoes
4 eggs
4 tablespoons grated cheese
4 tablespoons butter
Salt, pepper

Bake potatoes, cut off top and remove about half of the inside of each potato. Into each drop a raw egg, dot with butter, and then sprinkle with cheese. Place in oven for four or five minutes.—Mrs. L. G. Klunkert, R. 3, Eugene.

Baked Eggs and Cheese

Break the desired number of eggs in a shallow, greased baking dish, add a few tablespoons cream and salt enough to season; and sprinkle with a mixture of grated cheese and dry bread crumbs. Set this dish in a pan containing hot water. Bake in moderate oven until eggs are set and crumbs brown. Before serving sprinkle with paprika.—Mrs. Leslie Hodges, 832 East Main St., Springfield.

Fluffy Omelet

3-4 cup milk scalded
1/2 teaspoon salt
1-2 teaspoon pepper
2 tablespoons quick cooking tapioca
1 tablespoon butter
4 egg yolks beaten until thick and lemon colored.

4 egg whites stiffly beaten.
2 cups cooked vegetables (peas, carrots, celery) sautéed with onion.
Add salt, pepper and tapioca to milk and cook in double boiler 15 minutes or until tapioca is clear and mixture thickened, stirring frequently. Add butter. Combine with egg yolks, stirring. Fold in egg whites. Pour into hot buttered frying pan and cook over low flame three minutes. Then bake in moderate oven 15 minutes. Omelet is done when a knife inserted comes out clean. Cut across middle, being careful not to cut all the way through. Turn out on platter, cover one-half with vegetables and fold other over. Garnish with parsley and serve.—Mrs. Brumbaugh, 675 Pearl St., Eugene.

STRUGGLE NEARS HEAD
PARIS, Feb. 20.—(P)—The report that Nazis had delivered an ultimatum to Chancellor Engelbert Dollfuss of Austria was regarded today in official quarters as bringing to a head the struggle between Chancellor Hitler of Germany and Premier Mussolini of Italy for the dominance of Austria.

The future was regarded as "obscure."

The little entente—Yugoslavia, Czechoslovakia and Rumania—are said to have urged the French to act quickly to halt the threat of another civil war in Austria, but a government spokesman said it was unlikely that the French will move in the matter until Dollfuss has filed an official complaint with the League of Nations, a complaint which he gave notice of filing last month.

BOMBERS BUSY
INNSBRUCK, Austria, Feb. 20.—(P)—Bombers police believed to be embittered socialists beginning a last ditch fight against political extinction, created havoc here during the night.

A bomb explosion wrecked the library of the city hall, injuring three persons. Another bomb crumbled one of the masts of the Innsbruck radio station. Others damaged the school electric sub-station.

BONNEVILLE STILL NEEDY
PORTLAND, Ore., Feb. 20.—(P)—Denial that any sums other than the original allocations, had been "earmarked" or set aside for the Grand Coulee or Bonneville projects was made by the public works administration, a Washington dispatch said today.

The amounts allotted were \$15,000,000 for Grand Coulee and \$20,000,000 for Bonneville.

Will-Nick Future Funds
The PWA said, according to the dispatch, that funds for completion of both projects will have to come from future appropriations.

This money may be made available if congress acts favorably on extending the public works program.

Bridge Contracts To Be Ready Soon

PORTLAND, Ore., Feb. 20.—(P)—Speedy completion of preliminaries for construction of five bridges on the Oregon Coast highway was indicated today in Washington, D. C., by Senator McNary and Representative Mott, it was said in a special dispatch to the Journal after the two had held independent consultations with PWA officials.

"It was said that tentative draft of the bond contracts is under way for use in preparing the contracts which, it is believed, will be completed before the end of the week and mailed for approval of the Oregon highway commission," the dispatch said.

Good Turnover of 1932 Taxes Made

Taxes for 1932 are still coming in at the office of Sheriff Swartz and a turnover of \$32,027.08 was made Tuesday. Numerous federal loans made here recently have augmented the tax payments, as one of the requirements of the loans is that all back taxes must be paid up.

The turnover of Tuesday was segregated into the following funds: State and county, \$15,657.07; cities, \$5,616.47; school districts, \$8,796.52; union high schools, \$687.63; road districts, \$55.43; county high school fund, \$1,053.59; forest fire patrol, \$152.09; grey digger squirrel poisoning fund, \$5.00.

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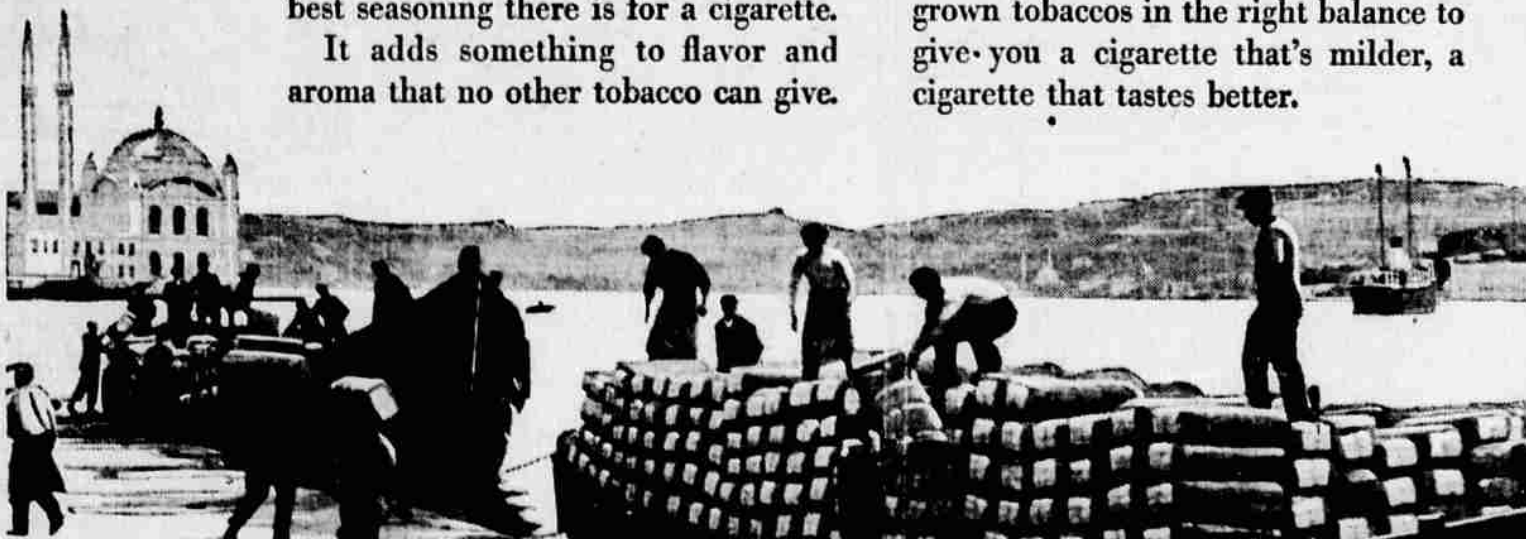
