This can be brought about through development of honors courses, other forms of recognition for superior students, and devotion of more time and attention to their development.

The president stressed especially the idea of excellence, which he pointed out, has often given way to the idea of "getting by." "We stress excellence on the athletic field, and there is no reason why this stimulus could not be carried over into the classroom and so inculcated into the student that he would carry it on in his life work," Dr. Boyer said.

Dr. Boyer was introduced by Dr. W. T. Kerr, chancellor of higher education, who declared that the new president had the full confidence and support of the chancellor and the board of higher education.

Greetings from the board of higher education were brought to the session by Fred E. Callister, of Albany, member of the board. Wayne L. Morse, dean of the school of law and president of the association, acted as toastmaster.
