

DAVID CAMPBELL TO GIVE CONCERT HERE ON TUESDAY

One of the most interesting musical events of the early spring here will be held on Tuesday evening when David Campbell, widely known Portland pianist and composer, will give a concert.

The program will be given at 8 o'clock in the campus school of music building. It is presented under the auspices of Mu Phi Epsilon, women's national music honorary, for the benefit of the group's scholarship fund.

Mr. Campbell is well known in Eugene, having visited here several times. He is a younger brother of the late President P. L. Campbell of the University of Oregon. Cheese Balls

Beat whites of 2 eggs stiff, add 2 cups of grated cheese, 1/2 tsp. salt, and a little cayenne, form in balls, roll in fine bread crumbs and fry in deep fat until a delicate brown.—Mrs. Alma Wood, Oakridge.

Cheese Souffle

3 tablespoons melted butter
4 tablespoons sifted flour
1/2 teaspoon salt, dash of cayenne pepper

1/2 cup milk
1/2 cup grated cheese
3 eggs
1 scant teaspoon baking powder.

Cook butter and flour in sauce pan, when well blended add the 1/2 cup milk. Cook until smooth then add salt and cayenne, add cheese. Remove from stove and beat 3 egg yolks well beaten. Set aside to cool. When cool fold in the 3 egg whites beaten stiff, add a scant teaspoon baking powder.

Put in a well buttered bake dish. Bake 25 minutes in slow oven. Place under broiler and set in pan of water. Serve immediately.—Mrs. O. S. Bundy, 1479 High St., Eugene.

Cheese Fondue with Dried Beef
1/2 lb. grated cheese
1/2 cup scalded milk
1/2 cup bread crumbs
1/2 cup shredded sliced dried beef
1 tablespoon melted butter

Yolk of 3 eggs, well beaten. Pour scalded milk over bread crumbs. Add all other ingredients, and mix well. Beat three egg whites stiff, but not dry and add to first mixture. Bake in a buttered casserole 30 minutes using 350 degrees F. The casserole should be placed in a pan of hot water before putting in oven. Very fine.—Mrs. J. I. Willets, 234 Cherry Court, Cottage Grove.

Mexican Cheese
2 lbs. butter
2 lbs. chopped green pepper
2 lbs. flour
1 tsp. salt
1/4 tsp. mustard

A few grains cayenne
1 cup strained tomato juice
1 cup cooked or canned corn
1/2 cup grated cheese
1 egg.

Melt butter, add green pepper and cook until soft, add flour, salt, mustard and cayenne, mix well. Add tomato juice slowly and cook until thick, stirring constantly. Add corn and cheese and cook until cheese is melted. Remove from fire. Beat the egg well and pour the hot sauce on it. Mix well. Serve hot on toast.—Mrs. C. L. Hoffner, 1819 Fairmount, Eugene.

"Pop-Eye's" Salad
Make a cheese sauce using:
2 tablespoons butter
2 tablespoons flour
2 cups of water or milk
1 cup scalded cream (Tillamook)

Seasoning to taste.
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cook until soft, add water or milk, mix well. Add cream and cook until thick, stirring constantly. Add cheese and cook until cheese is melted. 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OREGON POLITICS IN UPHEAVAL AS PRIMARIES NEAR

able to sit at the speakers' table at the Lincoln day banquet in Portland recently because it had been decided that avowed or nearly avowed candidates would be barred from that place.

Many Way Split Seen
Lorenson's announcement coming immediately after the "true progressives" powwow in Portland, was taken by some to indicate he believed the republican party would be so split up on candidates by the time the primaries rolled along May 18, that any man with a sure block of votes would stand a good chance.

Lorenson's chances up-state are not considered good, but he may draw more water in the metropolitan area.

The descent of the "True Progressives" into the gubernatorial pot "tur-molled" the broiling political broth even further and the growing suspicion that the move to put forth Senator W. E. Burke as a candidate for governor was a shrewd political move to embarrass Senator Sam Brown was given strength with the announcement Saturday that Brown, already an avowed candidate, most certainly would not withdraw from the race.

Brown Will Fight
In a brilliant statement Saturday Brown declared his friends had agreed that he should "fight until Hell freezes over and then fight on the ice for a principle even greater than the elements of the progressive program—and that principle is for clean politics."

There are now five avowed candidates for governor. Burke and Brown, former State Senator Charles Hall, Lorenson, for the republican nomination; and General Charles H. Martin, seeking the democratic nomination.

Another element injected into the gubernatorial contest was revealed here Saturday with the announcement that Albert Strief, Portland, would be a candidate for governor, running on the socialist party ticket. Strief was

a candidate once before and this year is expected to make a strong bid for the job, at least the socialists think he will. A complete slate of socialist candidates for state offices and for congress and senate will be in the field this year, according to J. J. Martin, Eugene, prominent in the party here.

Socialist Petitions Out
"Strief is strong with the grange in the state and has wide support in all sections of the state," Martin said Saturday. "We believe we can put him over this year."

The socialist party has petitions circulating around the state to put the party on the ballot this year. Last time the move failed by a few names, but this year the 15,000 names already have been secured and the party is certain to be on the ballot, he said. The Eugene party will meet Monday evening, Feb. 26, at Hamblen's laundry on Olive street. The meeting will start at 7:30 o'clock.

The gubernatorial contest is still somewhat befogged by the actions of Governor Meier and Earl Snell, speaker of the house of representatives. The governor is to make a radio talk soon and at that time his position will be made clear.

Snell, George May Team-up
Snell is expected to say something important soon, probably within the next ten days. What he will say will settle the question whether he will run for governor or for secretary of state. If he runs for governor, it is a fair bet that S. S. George of Eugene will be a candidate for secretary of state. Not that it would be a "slate" because George is more or less a lone wolf in such things, but a considerable following of younger men, especially veterans, have indicated they would like to see these two men running for these two jobs.

George said Saturday he had not yet made up his mind whether he would run if Snell goes out for governor, but he said he was keeping a close watch on the situation and expected to be able to clarify his position within a week or so.

House Job Is Lure
Since J. M. Devers, former Eugene man and at one time district attorney for Lane county, has come out seeking the republican nomination for congress representing this district, political observers expect the incumbent, James Mott, to have considerable trouble in this district at the polls in May. Devers is strong and there has been considerable anti-Mott sentiment felt around this part of the state.

John Goss, Marshfield, democratic candidate for the same job, also is a strong opponent for Mott and he is expected to attract a heavy vote in view of the democratic sentiment this year. Goss will be in Eugene Monday to give a talk at the university.

Ex-Congressman W. C. Hawley is still an "X" or unknown quantity in this race. Persons supposed to be close to the veteran congressman declare he is "through" but there is nothing official from Hawley as yet.

Farley, Brown
Farley, the latter's face was flushed, but he rose and shook hands with Black, McCarran and Austin. Then Farley strode from the room to the accompaniment of a spontaneous burst of applause by the spectators. Brown left immediately behind him.

Senator Austin sought through more than three hours to show that the cancellation of the air mail contracts was made on insufficient evidence; that it was ill advised and that it was a mistake both from the point of law and policy.

Farley insisted: "I did what I did after due consideration of all the evidence and I believe I was justified."

Cheese Gingerbread Pudding
1/2 cup sugar
3 tablespoons shortening
1 egg
1/2 cup sour milk
1/2 cup molasses
1 1/2 cups flour
1-8 teaspoon salt
1 teaspoon ginger
1/2 teaspoon each of cinnamon, and cloves

1 teaspoon soda.
Cream butter and sugar, beat in egg, then add alternately the dry ingredients which have been sifted together, and the mixture of milk and molasses in which the soda has been dissolved. Pour into a loaf pan and bake in a moderate oven 40-45 minutes.

Cheese Filling
1 cup cottage cheese
1/2 cup chopped nuts
Cream
1 cup chopped dates
1/4 teaspoon salt.
Mash the cheese with enough cream to make it soft, then work in the dates, nuts and salt. Slice the ginger bread, spread with the cheese filling and serve hot.—Nellie Morris, Oakridge.

give a pledge which otherwise is given to royalty only.

In all, more than 4,000,000 Germans—or one citizen out of 15—will have pledged absolute obedience to the former Austrian corporal.

These four millions hold all the power in the new Germany, except that represented by the army.

But the army, too, is Hitler's instrument, for since Dec. 1, 1933, its oath is one of allegiance not to the president or to the constitution, but to "people in the fatherland"—and no army officer or private will deny that Hitler represents the people.

In a recent one-day session of parliament the government was authorized, by decree, to change the constitution.
