

DR. EVERSON IS KIWANIS SPEAKER; CLUB FOR PAGEANT

The Eugene Kiwanis club's board of directors voted unanimously at a special meeting Monday to back the pageant proposed to be held in Eugene again this coming summer.

Dr. William G. Everson, pastor of the White Temple, Portland, a former major general in the army and former head of the militia bureau at Washington, D. C., was the speaker for the weekly luncheon program held Monday noon in the Osburn hotel. Dr. Everson is here to conduct a series of meetings for the next two weeks at the First Baptist church.

The opportunities of the individual in working out today's problems and the opportunity of the church in guiding those individuals were discussed by Dr. Everson.

"It is not the job of the church to tell politicians how to be good politicians or to tell business men how they should run their business, but there is a big opportunity for the church to bring something into their lives to stabilize and hold them in their battles of life," he said.

He suggested three things, three ideas in carrying on today's three ideas being compared to military principles.

No army goes on the defense, he said, except to consolidate its position, to reorganize its forces, and to wait for reinforcements, then launches its attack at the right opportunity.

Men in business, in education, in the church, today must take this principle and be ready when the opportunity comes.

Secondly, whatever the army, whatever the machinery, it must work out a coordinated program so that each unit has a project commensurate with its ability to do a definite mission. When each of these parts fulfills its duty in keeping with its ability, the whole program is thus carried out, Dr. Everson said.

Thirdly, the individuals as well as the organizations have something to contribute. "Because the church as an institution does not do certain things, people say it has failed. Because the church does not act as a police force or as a hotel to provide all the hungry with clothes and food, or because it does not stop all the crime, graft, and greed, there are those who say it has failed. But the church can express itself only through the individual lives," Dr. Everson pointed out.

"When the church ceases to give the individual something to influence to others, it will be a sad day for religion," he said.

Every person should have an influence to help others. The great mission of the church is to bring something into the lives of men that will enlarge and enrich their sphere that others may be happier when within the shadow of that sphere, he added.

Arch A. Bernard, president of the club, introduced the speaker. O. A. Houlston and W. A. McDonald were introduced as guests.
