

WOMAN PLACED ON PROBATION 3 YEARS

Two young women charged with passing bad checks appeared in circuit court for sentence Wednesday morning and one of them was placed on three years probation while the sentence of the other was continued by Judge Skipworth until the end of the term when he will take the case under further consideration.

Mrs. Bess Connors entered a plea of guilty and her attorney asked the court that sentence be pronounced immediately making a plea for a parole as this was her first offense and she has promised to go to her home at Wenatchee, Wash. Mrs. Ella Richardson, city police matron, who has had charge of her in the city jail since her arrest a number of weeks ago, and Chief of Police Bergman both recommended that she be paroled. The judge put her on probation and instructed her to report at regular intervals to Mrs. Richardson.

The other woman, Elizabeth Stewart, who lives in Eugene, also asked for a parole and the judge announced that definite action will be taken at the end of the term. She was named defendant in the charge with Ray Watson of Eugene, who pleaded not guilty Wednesday.

G. A. Macfarlane of Sweet Home pleaded not guilty to the charge of obtaining money under false pretenses. He was indicted for allegedly placing sawdust in 34 sacks of chittam bark and selling it to a local firm.

Barkley Broom entered a plea of not guilty to the charge of assault and battery upon Edna Jones.

GUARDS ARRESTED
CROWN POINT, Ind., March 7.—(AP)—Two members of the force of 17 guards posted in the Lake county jail where John Dillinger, ruthless outlaw, broke to freedom, today faced charges of aiding and abetting the criminal's escape.

The pair, Sam Cahoon, 64-year-old turnkey, and Deputy Sheriff Ernest Blank, fingerprint expert, were taken into custody yesterday on warrants issued by Judge William J. Murray in Lake county criminal court. They were later released on their own recognizance.

PROBABLY NOT DILLINGER
SIOUX FALLS, S. D., March 7.—(AP)—Authorities of South Dakota and Iowa searched by airplane and automobile today for the machine-gun bandits who robbed the Security National bank and Trust company of \$46,000 in cash Tuesday after terrorizing employees and citizens.

The robbers held 1000 townspeople at bay, wounded a policeman, and forced five persons including four women, to accompany them as shields against the fire of pursuers.

Reports that John Dillinger, escaped killer, may have led the gang, were discounted by officials of the bank who said there was no resemblance by any of the bandits to Dillinger.

LIQUOR STORE STORY

sort was noted in Eugene Wednesday where purchasers entered the store, bought their permits, looked over the stock and made their purchases with no more to do than as though they were buying a bottle of milk, according to members of the staff.

A survey of the stock carried by the Eugene store reveals nine brands of high-grade domestic whiskey, averaging 16-year old stuff and bottled in bond. Three of these brands are carried in half-pint sizes selling for \$1.75.

There are three brands of straight whiskey, bottled out of bond, which sell for from \$1.25 a pint to \$2.45 a pint. This whiskey has been aged in wood for approximately 11 months. In blended whiskey, the store carries 14 different kinds, running in price from 90 cents a pint or \$1.70 a quart, to \$1.65 a pint or \$3.25 a quart. These blends are put out by reputable firms and are blended scientifically.

Six brands of Canadian whiskey are carried, ranging in price from \$2.25 to \$2.50 a pint. Miniatures, two-ounce bottles, of this type of whiskey sell for 35 cents a bottle. There are three brands of Canadian type Scotch and five brands of imported Scotch, all in fifth and selling for from \$3.75 to \$4.25 a bottle. Nine brands of domestic gins are stocked, the price running from 80 cents a pint to \$1 a pint. Fifth sell for from \$1.35 to \$1.65.

A large stock of imported and domestic wines, rums, cognacs, brandies, cordials and other liquors is available.

Halves of grapefruit
Cornmeal waffles
Eggs in minced ham cups
Coffee; milk for children.

Cornmeal Waffles
Place 1 cup cornmeal in a bowl. Add 1 1/2 cups boiling water. Stir until smooth. Add 6 tablespoons butter or shortening and stir until melted. Let cool. Separate two eggs, beat the yolks and add to the cornmeal mixture. Dissolve 1 teaspoon soda in 1 cup sour milk and add to the cornmeal. Add 1 cup flour, 2 level teaspoons baking powder, 1 teaspoon salt, 1 tablespoon sugar. Mix well. Fold in beaten egg whites. Serve piping hot with melted butter and syrup.

Eggs in Minced Ham Cups—Have your butcher slice your minced ham from the large round loaves about 1/4 inch thick. One slice for each serving. Put 1 teaspoon bacon drippings in skillet. Let it get very hot, then put in your slices of minced ham. They will curl up and form a cuplike shape. Reduce heat and drop in an egg in each cup, season and cover with a tight lid. Let steam until a white film covers yolk. If a hard egg is desired let cook a few minutes longer.—Mrs. L. Evans, 1050 Almaden Street, Eugene.

her lands bought back from the government.

Stelwer Backs Plan
The "cutting" tax would be paid locally. It would be less than formerly paid in ad valorem taxes but would be more regular and less of a burden on timbermen.

The bonds received by the timbermen for their stumpage would become an asset where the vast, surplus timberlands had been a liability. The bonds could be negotiated for cash at banks. Sponsors believe this would aid the administration aim of paying out credit and tend to stabilize labor conditions. Also it is held, it would lessen cost of production, sometimes resorted to as a means of paying of taxes.

Senator Frederick Stelwer, repn. Ore., has been developing the nationalization idea for several years but is in no rush about it.

"The nationalization plan is inevitable unless the lumber code becomes the answer to the lumbermen's prayers," he said.

It was considered possible that the nationalization of forests might be worked out through the conservation program now included in the lumber code.

KEENEY SEES DISASTER
"If the government took over all privately owned timber land in the country it would simply be disastrous," was the comment of B. F. Keeney, county assessor, when told of the plan to nationalize all the country's forests. "But if the United States by some process would reimburse the counties for the taxes that would be lost, well and good." Further than that the assessor said he could not comment as he is not conversant with the plan.

Assessor Keeney's books show that there is on the assessment rolls 400,454 acres of privately owned timber land in the county with an assessed valuation of \$6,007,330.

S. P. Will Pay Its Entire Year's Tax Here in Lump Sum

The Southern Pacific company will pay its 1933 taxes in Lane county in full March 15, it is indicated in a letter received Wednesday by Sheriff C. A. Swartz from James A. Lathrop, tax, right of way and assistant lease agent of the company in Portland.

Mr. Lathrop sent statements of taxes levied against the company's property in this county amounting to \$246,788.52 but this is not quite all the company owes, it is stated. Last year's total tax on the company's property in Lane amounted to \$251,117.86 and as the taxes are higher this year, the total will be several thousand dollars over the amount in the statements sent by the company Wednesday.

The company is making the total payment at this time in order to obtain the rebate of three per cent. Three per cent of \$246,788.52 is \$7406.59 which is the amount the company will save in making the total payment on the sum indicated in the statements.

Assuming that the company is making the same arrangements to pay its taxes in the other Oregon counties through which its lines extend, it will save a good sized fortune by making the entire year's payment at this time, it is pointed out.

Lloyd Howe, chief tax deputy in the sheriff's office said Wednesday that a number of Lane county property owners have paid their 1933 taxes in full but no payments in very large sums have been made. Most of the smaller property owners are taking advantage of the opportunity to pay in quarterly installments.

The company will enrich the coffers of state, county, school and city by payment of \$1,256,278.45, representing the total 1934 tax payment on the company's properties in Oregon. Those properties carry a tax valuation of \$34,411,010. Saving effected by the discount amounts to \$37,688. In the past Southern Pacific taxes have been paid in two equal payments on May 5 and November 5.

for the construction of the bridge across Alsea bay at an estimated cost of \$711,000, will be let April 5 if the federal government by that time has attached final signatures to the contract. In the meantime several highway meetings would be held to provide further information, particularly relative to toll schedules, requested by the government.

Sluiceway, Umpqua Last
The three copies of the contract were signed by the commissioners after more than two hours perusal of the 27-page document and after the commissioners were satisfied the terms of the contract were satisfactory. It is provided that other revenue than tolls could be provided by legislative act for repayment of the loan in the 80 years time. The loan amounts to \$4,000,000 and the grant makes up the balance. Repayment of the loan would start in 1938 when the first payment of \$100,000 would fall due.

The second bridge award would be for the Coos bay span, an estimated \$2,255,052 project, which would be opened April 26, the commissioners declared. On May 17 the Yaquina bay span will be let at an estimated cost of \$1,128,418, while the other two, those over the Umpqua river at \$337,700 and over the Siuslaw river at \$470,450, would be awarded on June 7.

Safety Strips Voted
Purchase of \$40,000 worth of lacquer paint for painting a middle strip down the main highways was heartily endorsed by the members of the commission. Commissioner E. B. Aldrich of Pendleton declared this expenditure was the best investment in safety the state could make. About 25 per cent of the 29,000 gallons of paint would be for repainting jobs while the bulk will be used on highways not yet marked. Three state highway crews will start work on this job at once.

The commissioners ordered cancellation of all special permits for moving materials of over-length and over-weight on state highways March 31. A more strict regulation was ordered by Chairman Leslie M. Scott because of abuses. Where materials in this classification can be hauled by rail no highway permits will be granted, he announced.

The commissioners last night considered the matter of judicial officers failing to invoke penalties for violations of overweight trucks and trailers when violators are brought before them by state police. In most instances such cases are dismissed they declared. Commissioner Carl G. Washburne of Eugene cited a case from Lane county in which a hay trailer, overloaded, tipped over and caused a wreck. The offender was not penalized by the judge presiding at the court to which state police brought the farmer. It was indicated statutory penalties would be sought.

POWER EXTENSION SOUGHT
WASHINGTON, March 7.—(AP)—The administration decided today to withhold for the present any flat rule for NRA wage increases and shortening of code labor hours. President Roosevelt expects congress to extend his powers for licensing industry, an important cog in the industrial discipline under the NRA that has not yet been put into use.

These developments coincided today with continued protests by code authorities against the wage increase and hours reduction ideas broached by the president in his recent speech.

objective legislation for veterans' welfare and of course one of the main channels through which this objective is to be reached is through electing candidates certain to vote the required legislation.

It has been pointed out by local veterans that if this group can be made to stick together in a harmonious unit, it would be possible for it to elect candidates to most any position; local, state or nation. While the movement politically appears to bear some resemblance to ex-soldier organizations in other countries, members do not wear conspicuous "shirts" or resort to any methods commonly employed by foreign veteran groups.

Veterans for some years have exerted strong influence in political issues, political observers point out, but up to now no veteran organization can openly engage in politics under their constitutions. The new league is designed to allow veterans to actively engage in those issues which are of interest to them.

With the May primaries drawing nearer, candidates are beginning to file at Salem and Wednesday C. A. Schooling, Junction City, filed his declaration of candidacy for the democratic nomination as joint senator from Lane and Lane counties. He is the first of local candidates actually to file. One the republican side E. A. McCormack will seek the nomination of his party for this job.

Dr. E. V. Stivers, formerly pastor of the First Christian church in Eugene and now a resident of the Pleasant Hill area, is being urged by local democrats to run for senator from this county, opposing the republican aspirant, H. C. Wheeler, also of the Pleasant Hill district.

Dr. Stivers is considering the matter but so far has reached no definite decision on the matter. He is well known in Lane county and local democrats feel he is assured of a wide

following should he enter the political race.

While he has not been a candidate for any political position here before, Dr. Stivers has a thorough knowledge of state and county affairs and his ability in fighting for issues in which he believes is well known by the many who have heard him talk, members of the local party point out. It is believed he would be a campaigner of the first order and a formidable opponent for any republican should he run.

GOSS FILES
SALEM, March 7.—(AP)—John D. Goss of Marshfield, state senator from Goss and Curry counties today filed for the democratic nomination for election to congress from the first Oregon district. He had previously made formal announcement of his intent to seek the position.

Goss is the second to file for the democratic nomination. R. R. Turner of Dallas filed last week. It was reported that Earl A. Nott, district attorney of Yamhill county, and William Dellzell of Salem were considering the advisability of entering their names in the race for the democratic nomination.

No filings have been made on the republican side but James W. Mott, present congressman from the first district, and J. M. Devers, attorney for the state highway commission have announced their intention to run.
