NEW GRAHAM CAR IS DISPLAYED HERE

The new Graham car for 1934, with startling new developments and refinements which already have won recognition as the automobile news of the year, is on display in the show-rooms of Motor Sales and Service Co., 8th and Pearl.

According to Floyd Manville, local Graham dealer, the introduction of a supercharger on the new Graham custom eight has drawn the attention of automobile engineers throughout the country as the most revolutionary motor development in any automobile for 1934. Although the supercharger is one of the most widely-discussed features of the new car, equal comment has been made on the addition of a new clear vision ventilating system, on the designing by Norman bel Geddes, in collaboration with Graham engineers, of the striking interiors of the new de luxe six and all eight, on new developments in springing and in the steering gear, and on many refinements of the streamlined body in which Graham pioneered two years ago.

In addition to the custom eight with supercharged motor, the Graham line for 1934 includes a standard eight, and also a six with either deluxe or standard equipment. All cars feature longer outboard springs, adding to unusually easy riding qualities; the aluminum cylinder head, full-length water jacketing and banjo frame developed by Graham engineers. The six is longer, with a wheelbase of 110 inches, while the eights are 123 inches. The streamlined design has been further refined in appearance on all cars. The sweeping curves of the front end have been accentuated, the hood lengthened, and the fender lines refined. Hubcaps have been re-designed. Tire sizes are larger, and wheel diameter has been decreased.

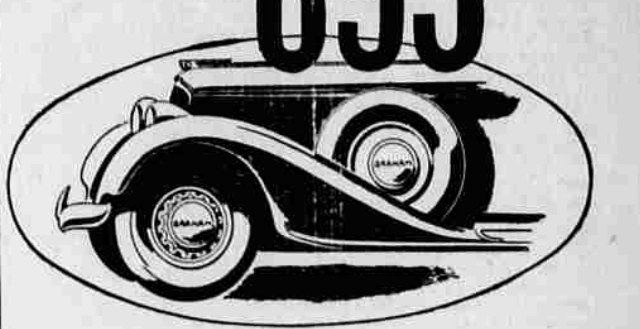
