

RURAL CWA JOBS NOW UNDER WAY TO BE COMPLETED

Seventeen rural CWA projects will be carried to completion under the resolution adopted at the meeting of the county relief committee Wednesday which provides that all outside projects under construction and unfinished at the present time be carried on before the men are transferred to other work, according to O. E. Crowe, member of the committee and CWA administrator. The resolution was adopted to head off any movement to transfer men on outside projects to the Eugene airport job. These 17 projects will require from two to five weeks to complete, Mr. Crowe said, and the crews range from two or three men to a dozen or so. These projects, along with the airport job and the other city projects now under way, will take the county's entire quota of men and it is believed that there will be enough to finish all the work planned, both inside and outside the city, the administrator said. He said that the quotas can be doubled if needed, but that the airport project will not last.

Names of Liquor Purchasers Not Public Property

SALEM, Ore., March 8.—(U.P.)—Belief that more persons have hesitated to purchase state liquor permits because of fear that such information might become public was expressed by officials today.

The state liquor control act provides, in section 26 however, that "records of permit holders and the amounts of liquor sold shall not be made public."

A survey conducted by the United Press in five state departments showed that officials had failed to purchase permits. Most of them and their assistants admitted frankly that they feared their names might be made public.

"I have a friend of mine, not a state employee, make my liquor purchases," the head of one department declared.

The liquor commission was expected to make some statement assuring permit holders that their names will be held in confidence.

Administrator George L. Sammis predicted that purchase of liquor permits would exceed 100,000 during the first week after stores and agencies opened. The estimate proved over-optimistic, however, since less than one-twentieth that number were purchased in Portland area, where one-third of the state's population is centered.

Individual permits purchased to date probably do not exceed the 16,000 mark, although complete statistics have not been received at headquarters here.

Bridge Contracts Signed in Salem

SALEM, Ore., March 8.—(U.P.)—First interest on the federal loan to construct the five Coast highway bridges becomes due September 1, 1934, and semi-annually thereafter, contracts signed by the State Highway commission showed today.

First payment on \$4,000,000 principal, and additional \$1,102,000 was made by the government as an outright grant, falls due in 1935 and annually thereafter through 1944.

Interest on the loan is at 4 per cent.

The contract, now en route to Washington, D. C., for final approval by Public Works Administrator Harold Ickes, also calls for a sinking fund. The fund must be opened in 1937 for \$120,000.

Waffles and Menu

Waffles! Yum! Yum! Of course we must have a fruit. Why not strained peach juice for a change? It will make a hit with the young folks. And then waffles and maple syrup; there are good syrups on the market, but I prefer to mix my own with 1 part corn syrup, 2 parts brown sugar syrup and some maple flavoring. And what could be better with it all than a rasher of fresh country sausage, or even the home canned product? Of course waffles to be really at their best, must be direct from iron to individual, so if you haven't one of the electric irons, by all means plan to have the breakfast table in the kitchen, mornings when waffles are served. Here is my waffle recipe:

2 cups sifted pastry flour,
4 teaspoons baking powder,
1/2 teaspoon salt,
1 and 2-4 cups sweet milk,
2 eggs,
2 tablespoons melted butter.

The waffles will be a little more delicate if the eggs are separated and the whites beaten, though it isn't necessary.—Mrs. Lyle Taylor, Route 1, Creswell.

day morning appointed John B. Weldon from organized labor, George H. McMoran from the relief group, and Ray Babb from the business interests. In a short time they had agreed upon a revised scale of wages in several different classifications and the recommendations were at once transmitted to state headquarters at Portland.

Aside from the increase for common labor from 40 cents to 50 cents an hour, changes suggested by the committee from the new scale were as follows: As men from 40 cents to 50 cents; asphalt workers from 40 cents to 50 cents; building trades helpers from 60 cents to 50 cents (a reduction); caterpillar tractor operators from 60 cents to 75 cents; compressor men from 60 cents to 75 cents; crusher operators from 60 cents to 90 cents; drag line operators from 75 cents to \$1.20; dredge operators from 75 cents to 90 cents; jack hammer men from 60 cents to 90 cents; plasterers' helpers from 60 cents to 75 cents; plumbers' helpers from 60 cents to 75 cents; pick and shovel laborers from 40 cents to 50 cents; road grader operators from 60 cents to 90 cents; team of horses from 25 cents to 40 cents.

Prevailing Rates Studied
The telegram of instructions from the state administration to the county administration office states that prevailing rates of wages for each locality shall determine the new scale for various classifications of employment and that rates shall be agreed upon as actually prevailing for various trades in this locality, using authentic and official information and not confined to depression scales. The wages agreed upon shall be retroactive as of March 2 if the rates are approved by the state administration.

The association will meet on the first Wednesday evening of each month at the chamber of commerce.

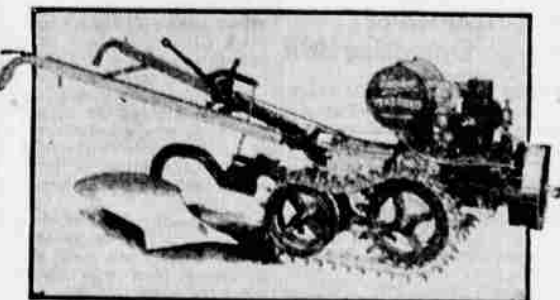
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Fundamentalist- Modernist Strife In Church Waning

ATLANTIC CITY, N. J., March 8.—(U.P.)—The Rev. Dr. McDowell, moderator of the general assembly of the Presbyterian church in the United States, believes the fundamentalist-modernist controversy waged in the church for years has died down.

"Never in my 36 years in the church," he said at the close of an executive council of the general church last night, "have I found it more wholeheartedly united in its essential beliefs, or more generally cooperative in its support of the authorized agencies of the general assembly."

"Except in one or two sections of the country the controversy between the fundamentalists and modernists is not playing a large part in the life of the church today, and that for the reason that men and women are recognizing now that there is no substitute for the spirit of Christ in the Christianity of the New Testament."

president, we are reorganizing to enforce the penal sections of the act," he said, first.

The other warnings were in substance as follows:

"That the country faces this spring 'the worst epidemic of strikes in its history,' that company unions in 100 out of 100 cases involve illegal 'interposition' by employers.

"That with the recent supreme court decision upholding the New York state emergency milk law, the administration has dropped all hesitation, and is ready to use the powers of the industrial law to the limit, if opposition forces it.

"Old Order Changeth"
Johnson let Donald Richberg, general counsel of NRA, present the last point in a preliminary speech, which, in non-legal language, presented sweeping implications of the decision.

Constitution hall's three thousand or so occupants were hushed and attentive as the counsel, after explaining, drawled:

"And that should sink a 10-0-0 way home. I want to submit it to the particular attention of some eminent counsel who come around and say they will cancel their codes if they don't get just what they want. It may be—that that act doesn't lie in their power."

Johnson backed that warning with a few preliminary snaps at "industrial bourbons" who "forget that the old order changeth."

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was a conciliatory exhortation for industry to rise to the opportunity given it by President Roosevelt.

He asked the industrial spokesmen to realize that their now ended meeting "is as important as the council of Nice—nothing like it has ever happened in the history of the world;" that NRA has set up representative government by economic groups, and

"on this rule let's govern as the attorney." He rendered a special offer to the heavy goods industries, warning, by asking their help in stabilizing the president's program to stabilize their production.

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
