

MUCH ACTIVITY IS NOTED AMONG CITY AUTOMOBILE FIRMS

The new DeSoto, most streamlined of any 1934 motor car, was on display at the Lane Auto company during the past week. Since the machine was a demonstrator, it made a visit of only three days. However, Walter and Claude Bearst, managers of the company, expect another car in soon, and the many persons who failed to secure rides last week will be taken care of at that time.

Much comment was heard concerning the radical design, and all of it was favorable. The absence of the usual gadgets and other imperfections which create "drag" in an automobile, the DeSoto one of the most distinctive cars on the market.

Gerald Scherer, of the Scherer Motor company, Buick, Pontiac and Oldsmobile agents, expects a carload of new Buicks within a few days. Both the Buick and the new Oldsmobile are the object of much discussion among prospective customers, with many stating that they believe the Olds is the most beautiful car put out this year. Scherer is displaying the Oldsmobile S, but the new G will be in soon, and advance reports indicate that it is identical with the S in construction and appearance.

The Airflow Chrysler, which has drawn much attention through the advertising campaigns conducted by the company, will be in March 20 at the Brown Motor company, local distributors for Plymouth and Chrysler.

Walter Brown, company manager, announces that sales of the new Plymouth are going well, and believes the many purchasers prove the merits of the 1934 vehicle, a decided improvement over last year's model. A Chrysler 6, of conventional design, is also on display at the Brown show-rooms.

"Road leveler" shock absorbers on the 1934 models of Terraplanes and Hudsons provide an important advancement in riding comfort, Hudson engineers say, because they contain a much greater volume of oil than has been possible in other types, and the apertures through which the oil passes are larger. These shock absorbers have a direct, or 1-to-1 action, whereas the elbow type has a 4-to-1 reduction. The new Hudson and Terraplane are on display at the Monroe Motors, managed by Elmer Gilbertson. Both boast fine performance as well as attractive design.

Floyd Manville, manager of the Motor Sales and Service company, expects a consignment of Grams in the near future, but the exact date is not set. Many people have called for demonstrations of the new machine, with its sleek streamlining and powerful engine. Graham pioneered automobiling streamline two years ago, and has advanced far since that time.

Lawrence Simmons, at the Ford motor company, announces the sale of six 1934 V-8s during the past week. The Ford concern has a large stock, and sales have been good all year. Several new machines will be delivered the first of the week.

Simmons was recently appointed Ford parts distributor for the district between Albany and Drain, extending to the coast. A large shipment of parts was received a few days ago, and the Simmons company is prepared to furnish the best Ford parts service of any company in the valley.

The Valley Chevrolet company, managed by Julio Sylva, received a carload of new Chevrolet trucks Saturday, augmenting their assortment of stock cars. Much favorable comment has been heard from Eugeneans who have purchased the 1934 models, and sales have been unusually brisk.

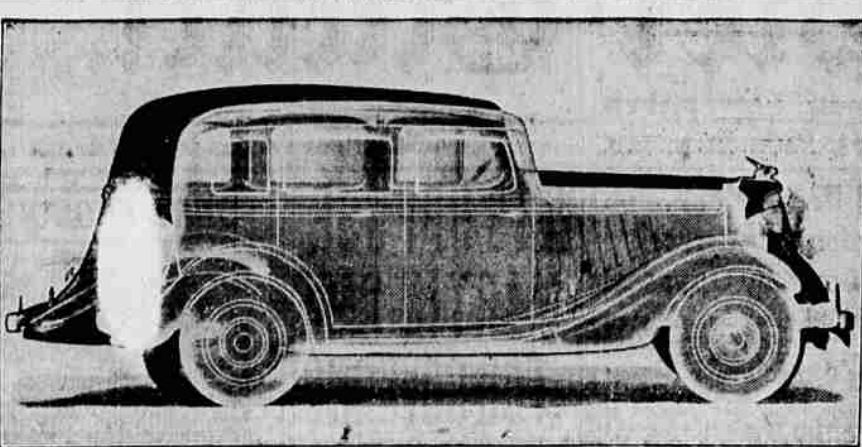

State executive commissions were swept clean of republicans in 1932. Nine republican governors remained and one farmer-laborite, Floyd R. Olson in Minnesota. Olson's term expires this year as do the terms of republican governors in eight of the nine states retained by republicans after 1932: Pennsylvania, Oregon, North Dakota, Kansas, California, Nevada, New Hampshire and Vermont. The term of Clayton D. Buck, republican governor of Delaware, does not expire until 1937.

Baked Macaroni and Cheese
(Vegetarian)
2½ cups cooked macaroni
1½ cups thick sour cream
3 eggs
1 cup buttered bread crumbs
Seasoning to taste
Boil macaroni in salt water till done. Drain and mix in a few buttered crumbs. Add beaten eggs with thick sour cream. Put in seasoning. Pour into a buttered casserole and sprinkle with buttered crumbs, and bake till well set. This is a delicious dish served with our cream sauce. One cup of sour cream put in a skillet and cooked till separated and brown. Stir often so as to keep from scorching then add three tablespoons of flour and two cups of milk or potato water. Salt to taste. —Bernice O'Quinn, 1455 Second avenue west, Eugene.

Cream Nut Cake
4 eggs
2 cups sugar
3 cups flour
2 tablespoons cream of tartar
1 cup sour cream
1 teaspoon soda
Beat the eggs and sugar together until light. Sift the flour before measuring, and then sift at least five times. Put the cream of tartar with one-half cupful of the sifted flour. Add the rest of the flour and the sour cream to the eggs and beat 5 minutes. Then add the cream of tartar and flour. Dissolve the soda in a tablespoon of boiling water and add last. Do not stir much after adding the cream of tartar and soda. Bake rather slowly and when done ice with the following icing:

Icing for Cream Nut Cake
3 T. butter
3 cups powdered sugar
1½ T. cocoa
1½ T. vanilla
1½ T. strong coffee
Cream the butter. Add the sugar and cocoa slowly, beating until light and fluffy. Add the vanilla and coffee, making it soft enough to spread. Sprinkle nuts between the layers and on top of the icing.—Mrs. B. W. DeBusk, 1011 Mill street, Eugene.

announcement of his plans and could not be reached for a statement Saturday night.

The local veteran attitude toward Gen. Martin is based on the latter's record in congress where, they declare, he consistently has voted against every item of soldier legislation thrown into congress. In not one instance, it is claimed, has he favored the veterans' cause. Since veterans naturally want politicians who favor their cause it is simple to figure out their probable action at the polls next May.

Vets Non-Partisan

The veterans are non-partisan in their political activities and will support candidates likely to further their cause. With the republican and democratic parties split up as at present, the veteran element is likely to be one of the strongest elements in the coming election and the candidate who wins their support would be wise to look up train schedules to legislative capitals.

Lane county democrats will go into a burst of activity here the latter part of the coming week, with democrats, young, feminine and masculine slated to gather at the Osburn hotel Saturday afternoon and evening for a veritable party jubilee. The democratic central committee will meet in the afternoon with some prominent democrat for a speaker. Party leaders expect some candidates to materialize from this meeting. In the evening the Young Democrats will sponsor a banquet and meeting, with state speakers. The women's democratic league and members of the central committee are to join with the Young Democrats at this meeting.

Stivers Not To Run

Party leaders announced Saturday that Dr. E. V. Stivers, former pastor of the Eugene Christian church, would not be a candidate for state senator this year. The decision followed a statement from his physician to the effect his health would not permit him to make a campaign. It was with reluctance that local party leaders gave up the idea of running Dr. Stivers for this post. Known as a man with wide popular support, it was thought he would be almost certain to win the nomination and have a good chance of beating the republican nominee. A man of sterling character, with well-formed opinions and indubitable power in presenting these opinions, he would be a formidable foe in any campaign.

Mrs. Lydick Supported

Democratic women were urging Belle Lydick, long associated with the local women's democratic league, to run for state representative from this county. It was reported Saturday, Mrs. Lydick, who lives near Eugene, is president of the Fortnightly club and has been active in public affairs for some time. She has not made up her mind on the matter.

Vera Todd Crowe, also mentioned as a possible candidate, said Saturday she would announce her decision within a few days. Ross Matthews has petitions out seeking to find support for his race for the democratic nomination as county treasurer.

Wimberly Seeks Judgeship

Carl E. Wimberly, Roseburg attorney, has announced his intention to seek the office of circuit judge in the second judicial district of Oregon. He made it clear he was not seeking the position held by Judge G. F. Skipworth, of Eugene, or of Justice Brand, but would seek to obtain the bench occupied by B. L. Eddy, appointed by Governor Meier to fill out the unexpired term of the late Judge J. W. Hamilton.

Wimberly, according to Roseburg attorneys, was a strong contender for the appointment, having the endorsement of the Douglas County Bar and many prominent attorneys throughout the district.

Carl Wimberly was born in Elkhorn, Oregon, July 22, 1887. He was graduated from Willamette University in 1908 with the degree of bachelor of laws. He was admitted to the Oregon bar June 15, 1909.
