EARTHQUAKE STORY

How far the quake extended south was not known, but Provo, Utah, 45 miles south of here, reported a slight jar and Pocatello and other southeastern Idaho cities were shaken.

The first quake was felt in this city at 8:05 a. m. The tremors continued for five minutes. Another minor shock occurred at 8:22 a. m., and a more severe jolt at 11:21 a. m.

When the latest movement occurred, the 1,500 students at South high school were rushed for the doors. Two students suffered minor injuries during the rush.

Buildings Sway Together
The tall buildings in the business district of this city swayed severely during the heaviest quake. The adjoining Ezra Thompson and Salt Lake Tribune buildings rasped together, sending up a cloud of dust. Clocks stopped in virtually all downtown structures and two windows in a bank building in the heart of the business district were broken. Plaster in other downtown buildings was cracked.

Prof. Perry Byerly of the University of California seismology department in Berkeley, Calif., said the quake was as severe as the shocks which did extensive damage to Santa Barbara, Calif., in 1925.

At Washington, D. C., the Georgetown seismological observatory reported today that Utah earthquake was considerably heavier than that which damaged Long Beach, Calif., some time ago.

MEIER RETIRES STORY

commissioner under Meier, stated he was very much surprised at the governor's action, because he had been told frequently by close friends of the executive, that he would be a candidate. Thomas appeared noticeably disappointed, as it was known he wished to continue his work under Meier. The change in the picture may bring Thomas into the race.

When asked directly today if he would be a candidate, Thomas said he had nothing to say. Previously he was emphatic in denying he would be a candidate, but this statement was made when he felt assured Meier would be a candidate to succeed himself.

Hansen to Retire

The governor, here today, declared he had received many phone calls and wires of commendation of his record as governor and indicating his refusal to be a candidate was an excellent move. He stated also he had many of the opposite nature, expressing deep regret he would not run, feeling he should be elected to carry on his work. He said he had no candidate in mind to lend support, but added he believed Marks would make a fine governor.

Henry M. Hansen, budget director

and political adviser, reiterated his statement of several weeks ago when he declared that "When Meier steps out of the picture, I shall retire." Hansen said no matter who was elected governor, he would retire the first of the year and re-enter the newspaper business. He emphatically denied he was personally interested in building up anyone's campaign. Hansen said the governor decided against campaigning after he had been assured he could be re-elected.

While many of the governor's appointees were surprised at the action of the governor, many declared he had made a good move and that his record sets him out as "one of the outstanding executives in the state." State Treasurer Holman, who has been at sword-point with the governor for some time, commended him upon his retirement.

It was generally believed here the reason for the governor's decision was based upon the wishes of his family and upon advice of his physicians, while he was in much better health now than when he took office, the strain of a vigorous campaign would undermine his health.

Check For Huge Sum Received in Payment Of Taxes For S. P.

Perhaps the largest check ever received by Lane county for taxes arrived at the office of Sheriff Swartz Monday. It was for \$238,184.21 and was from the Southern Pacific company in full payment for its 1933 taxes in this county. In addition to the check, the company turned in two county warrants amounting to \$32.05, to apply on its taxes.

The company in making its full year's payment this year is saving over \$7000 in Lane county alone and something over \$34,000 in the entire state.

Several other large concerns have indicated they will pay their full year's tax at one time and many individual taxpayers are doing the same, although a large majority are taking advantage of the provision in the new law which enables them to make four payments a year.

of a "character-wrecking" campaign against him. Instead of evading income tax payments, he asserted, he had always given the government the benefit of every doubt.

"I am as much in the dark as anyone," he said, "as to the possible grounds (Attorney-General Cummings) could have for such an action, but I am glad, under any circumstances, to get my tax affairs out of the attorney-general's office and into the court, where I am satisfied I shall get justice and a prompt disposition of the case which has so far been denied me."

The justice department chief also was informed of the first response of former Mayor Walker in England. The erstwhile New York chief executive said:

"They are only doing their duty and I welcome it as an opportunity of vindicating my character."

Banks Brief Goes To Supreme Court

SALEM, Ore., March 12.—(U.P.)—State brief in appeal of the L. A. Banks murder case was in hands of the supreme court today. It was filed by the attorney general's office.

Attorneys for Banks, former Medford newspaper editor serving a life prison sentence for slaying Constable George Prescott, were given until March 20 to file an answer to the state brief. The original Banks brief was filed last month.

Date for hearing of the case will be set by the supreme court following filing of the defense answer. Banks was convicted last year in Lane county circuit court, following a change of venue from Jackson county.

Seed Flax Urged As Cash Crop Here

Lane county farmers looking for a cash crop to plant this year are urged to investigate the possibility of planting seed flax, according to O. S. Fletcher, county agent, who says farmers may be assured of a

market for their harvest in this crop.

Two Portland oil manufacturing concerns are prepared to sell farmers seed flax and contract to purchase the harvest at the end of the season. These farmers may be assured of a cash return for this crop this season when chances for cash sales of wheat and feed grain are not so good. Any soil that will produce wheat will produce seed flax, the county agent said. The yield will be about half of what the yield of spring wheat would be in bushels. Seed flax, to guarantee the best results, should be planted not later than April 1, he declared.

More Claims Filed Against Bank Here

A supplementary list of claims against the Bank of Commerce of Eugene, which has been in the hands of the state banking department for nearly two years, was filed in circuit court Monday by A. A. Schramm, state bank superintendent.

In the commercial department the supplementary claims amount to \$213.12, making a total in that department of \$216,387.53. In the savings department the supplementary claims are \$378.88, and there is now a total of \$147,734.82.

Slough Gives Up Bodies of Girls

SALEM, Ore., March 12.—(U.P.)—Bodies of Betty Savage, 12, and Anabel Tooley, 9, who had been missing since Thursday, were recovered late Sunday from Minto slough, near the Oregon Electric Co. tracks southwest of Salem.

The bodies were found in 16 feet of water, near a log from which the girls apparently fell into the slough while on a flower-picking expedition. Physicians examining the bodies declared both had drowned and that no marks of violence could be found, thus ending the theory that the children had been harmed and then murdered.

Mix together and cook until thick in a double boiler—
1 cup sugar
5 tablespoons flour
1 tablespoon cinnamon
1½ cups raisins
¼ teaspoon salt
1½ cups of sour milk or butter-milk.

Add when thickened 2 egg yolks, 1 tablespoon or more butter. Cook 2 minutes, chill. Pour into baked pie shell. Cover with meringue made of 2 egg whites. Bake at 300 degrees (slow oven) 20 minutes.—Mrs. Waldemar Christensen, Route 2, Box 304, Eugene.
