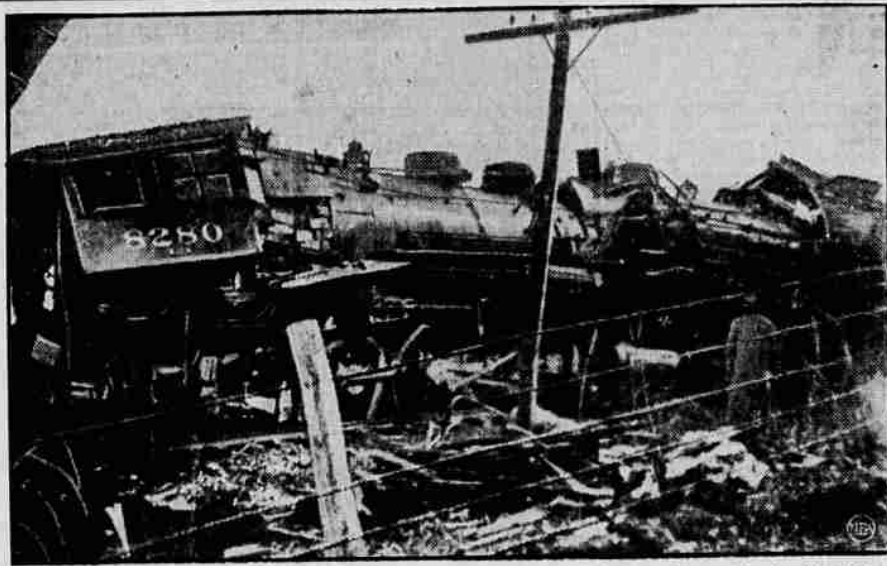

RENNIE PROJECT STORY

power development in the future, will be to prepare a brief in support of the application for the Rennie project already in the hands of authorities at Washington. This brief will be submitted first to D. C. Henry, Portland, consulting engineer of the government, for his approval and from him it will go to Engineer Reedy, of San Francisco, chief consultant for the coast states for the federal power commission. This commission has the final authority in such matters.

The proposed government Pacific coast power chain includes proposed plants at Grand Coulee, Bonneville, McKenzie river, Klamath river, two projects in California and Boulder Dam. This proposal is embodied in the so-called Dill bill now about to be presented in congress, fathered by Congressman Dill of Washington and supported by western senators and congressmen, it was said.

Under the proposal, all these plants would be in a huge power chain, the intermediate plants acting as boosters for the current generated in the larger plants and constituting a gigantic federal power hook-up for the entire Pacific coast area.

the approval of President Roosevelt, being in line with his governmental power policies for the nation. It is said that should the policy go through, there would be similar power chains for each section of the country, the Tennessee Valley Authority being one such hook-up.

In the event this plan materializes, the Eugene area stands to benefit vastly through the construction work and the subsequent supply of cheap power for this district, chamber directors point out. In this case, the Rennie project would be purely a government enterprise, with the probability being the government would build the plant, making an outright grant of 30 percent of the cost and amortizing the remaining 70 percent over a period of from ten to twenty years, the latter share being paid off through proceeds from the sale of the power.

The chamber directors also authorized several other projects at their meeting Monday. Secretary H. E. Cully was authorized to prepare a cancellation stamp for Eugene air mail letters, to be ready in the event Eugene becomes a regular air mail stop.

It was announced that the Oregon State Motor Association had decided to continue its local office.

Forest Extension Sought

The directors authorized the appointment of a national forest affairs committee, to cooperate with the national forestry department and army officials in matters pertaining to forest projects in this area. One such project will be the attempt to acquire a tract of \$3,000 acres, comprising four townships in the Blue River district, as national forest land, moving the western boundary of the Willamette national forest to a point just west of the Rennie bridge. Other projects will be roads, bridges, 3-C camps and similar propositions.

The directors adopted a resolution, expressing high esteem for the work of Major Charles H. Corlett, C. C. C. commander here, and expressing high tribute to his administration.

TUNNEL AT LUCKY BOY RETIMBERED

The tunnel in the old Lucky Boy mine in the Blue River district, recently acquired by George C. Stanley and associates of this city, has been entirely retimbered and good progress is being made on the road leading to the district Mr. Stanley reported Tuesday. It is hoped to have this work completed by April in order that trucks may haul supplies and equipment to the district and permit of extensive development.

Clive Stanley, son of George Stanley, upon his return to Eugene from the Robertson mine out of Grants Pass Monday, reported that a pay streak in which the ore assayed as high as \$205 a ton had been uncovered. The vein is 20 inches to three and a half feet wide and was found at a depth of 160 feet.

Clive Stanley will return to the mine Tuesday night. He will be accompanied by an engineer who will look over the old machinery on the property to ascertain how much of it can be used and to make a report on the mine itself.

Damage Claim Is Settled For \$600

A claim for damages against F. E. Backman, Stanley Hulegaard, the Koke-Chapman Printing company and the Eugene News Publishing company on account of the death of Glenn Jarvis in an automobile accident on the Pacific highway December 31, 1933, has been settled, according to papers filed in probate court Tuesday.

Sam Jarvis, administrator for the estate of Glenn Jarvis, filed a petition asking permission to settle and an order to that effect was granted. Jarvis was killed while riding in a delivery car owned by the Koke-Chapman company and used by the Morning News in delivering papers. Stanley Hulegaard was the driver of the car and Floyd E. Backman was owner and driver of the car with which it collided. A compromise

settlement was made for \$600, the petition stated.

Knight Bound Over On Liquor Charge

Tex Knight was bound over by Justice of the Peace Dan Johnston, Monday, on a charge of selling unlicensed liquor in violation of the state liquor law. His bail was fixed at \$500.

The jury in the case against George Aaris, charged with reckless driving, disagreed late Monday after a trial in justice court and the case was dismissed as this was the second disagreement.

Latin Language Lived Long After Fall of Empire

Latin did not become a "dead" language upon the decline and fall of the Roman empire, but actually continued to grow in use and in vocabulary after this time. This was one of the interesting facts pointed out by Frederic S. Dunn, head of the department of Latin, at the University of Oregon, who has just completed a section for the British Latin-Medieval dictionary, a volume to be published soon in London.

The task delegated to Professor Dunn was to select non-classical Latin words found in the writings in Latin of Robert of Avesbury, a contemporary of Edward III, about the

year 1340. More than 300 non-classical words, or words that came into use in Latin since the days of the Roman Empire, were discovered by Professor Dunn.

These words, all carefully catalogued, were sent by Professor Dunn to the publishing society in London. Here they will be classified with words sent in by other contributors and duplicates eliminated. In this way a complete Latin dictionary, containing both classical and non-classical words, will be compiled. A number of scholars in England and America are at work on the project.

The project on which Professor Dunn worked is known as "The Gestis Edwardi III," since the writings of Robert of Avesbury date with the reigning king at that time Edward III.
