obtain information in connection with the possible creation of a bank designed to extend to established concerns having adequate capital assets, long-time credits with which to acquire merchandise, materials and to pay wages.

Local Opinions Sought

Establishment of a branch in Eugene would bring to this city a permanent institution, designed to give much needed credit facilities to local businesses, it was believed. The branch would be an office, similar to other government agencies located here.

Residents of Eugene are urged to communicate with the chamber and present their opinion regarding locating this branch here. Directors of the chamber wish to ascertain the need for such an institution and the sentiment of the public regarding the matter. If it is found such an institution is desired, every effort will be made to locate a branch here.

Bankers' Hall Move

Establishment of the reserve bank credit office would mean much for this community, particularly the lumber industry, declared Richard Shore Smith, president of the First National Bank, Tuesday. Mr. Smith visualized the credit extension as a boon to those operators wishing to build logging roads this summer for use a year from now, those who need to build lumber docks or those who need material and who cannot do this expansion work on short-term loans.

"I am very much in favor of this plan and so advised the San Francisco bank officials in a telegram," Mr. Smith said. "National banks are not allowed to make long-term loans for this sort of expansion which would facilitate the securing of such loans would do much for betterment of

Would Aid Expansion Mr. Smith pointed out that the loans could not be obtained for reducing existing debts, but could be used for purchasing material and construction work when backed by adequate collateral. He said the organization probably would be administered from the present branch of the reserve bank in Portland, but that if there was sufficient volume of business here, Eugene would be given a branch office. The local chamber will work toward getting this local office.
