

DR. KERR DECLARES EDUCATION SHOULD ASSUME LEADERSHIP

transportation, commerce and industry.

"Higher education's contribution to the present economic emergency," he continued, "is illustrated by the varied and almost unlimited ways in which the state colleges and universities are being used by the state and nation in connection with the vast program of relief and economic recovery fostered by the government."

"It is the task of higher education to search out and to state the truth," Chancellor Kerr added, "applying it to constructive purposes. The primary function of higher education is to serve as the state's fact-finding agency. By research and experimentation it examines conditions and proposals, assembling the facts, and in the light of all of the evidence, drawing conclusions."

It is not the function of higher education to initiate or control public policies, Kerr explained, but rather "to bring to bear upon proposed policies the disinterested judgment of research, and to lend to such policies when established, the counsel and direction of expert knowledge."

The chancellor reviewed the changes that have taken place in Oregon's higher educational organization in the past few years, and pointed out that Oregon now is numbered among at least 15 states that have taken definite steps toward partial or complete unification of their higher educational offerings.

The system, itself, is in a state of growth and development, he said, with many changes and betterments having been put into effect by the board of higher education since the system was established.

He held out high hopes of the success of the coordinated plan and said it binds firmly together the several policies. Kerr explained, but rather system by centralizing ties in horizontal supervision while each institution is free to grow and develop in the particular field to which it is assigned.

Golden Tea Cakes

- 1 cup light brown sugar
- 1/2 cup butter
- 1/2 cup sour milk
- 1-2 teaspoon soda
- 2 eggs
- 2 cups flour
- 2 teaspoons baking powder
- 1 cup chopped nuts

Cream the butter and sugar, beat the soda into the sour milk and beat the eggs. Add the beaten eggs to the butter and sugar, then add alternately the sifted flour and baking powder and sour milk. Sift in the floured nuts, drop from a teaspoon and bake in a moderate oven.—Mrs. Atwood Foster, 1031 Jefferson, Cottage Grove.

Sour Cream Cookies

- 1 egg well beaten
- 1 cup sugar
- Pinch of salt
- 1 cup sour cream
- 1/2 teaspoon soda
- 1 1/2 cups sifted flour
- 1 teaspoon vanilla

Put egg in mixing bowl and beat until light, add sugar, then cream to which soda has been added. Then add flour, salt and flavoring. Drop on greased and floured pan and bake in a quick oven. These keep moist indefinitely.—Mrs. Floyd E. Kelsey, Signal.

Peanut Cake

- 1-3 cup shortening
- 1 cup sugar
- 1 3/4 cups flour
- 1 egg
- 1 teaspoon soda
- 1 cup sour milk
- 1 cup ground salted peanuts

Method: Cream shortening, add sugar gradually, cream together thoroughly. Add egg, beat well. Sift flour once, then sift flour and soda together. Add this to creamed mixture, alternately with milk. Add peanuts. Pour into well greased and floured 8-inch square pans. Bake 45

In the event Beebe entered the race, this club could do much to help his cause, especially in this part of the state.

George has been urged by many younger people of the state to run and many veterans are said to be supporting him. George's plans are thought to be contingent somewhat on Earl Snell's plans, there being quite a group of persons wanting Snell to declare for governor and George as secretary. If Snell decides to run for the secretary post, it may have some effect on George's plans.

Local political observers are keenly interested in the race for this position and hope to see a Lane county man declare himself as it has been many years since a local man held the job. It would not be out of place, they feel, for the job to be held by a local man again. The last Lane man in this job was Harrison Kincaid, father of Webster Kincaid, who held the office up to 1890.

Skipworth Files

Circuit Judge George F. Skipworth filed for the non-partisan nomination to succeed himself as circuit judge of the second judicial district Wednesday. Judge Skipworth has the endorsement of the bar associations of Lane, Lincoln and Benton counties and has no opposition so far.

Local observers were watching the gubernatorial situation closely, wondering who would declare themselves for the republican nomination, since Governor Meier withdrew himself. Current opinion is that Willard Marks of Albany is the most logical candidate since none of the other republican candidates meet with a great deal of favor about the state. Many feel Marks is the only man that could give General Martin a real race at the polls next November, but the all-important question of finances for a campaign must be considered in the Marks picture.

Campaign Finances Bother

Marks has intimated he cannot afford to make such a race and has repeatedly refused to enter the field, but since the withdrawal of Meier, he has been importuned so much that he is thought to be weakening a bit in his resolve. There is no doubt that plenty of financing could be obtained for Marks if republicans of the state see a fair chance to beat Martin, but it's hard to obtain money when only a political principle is involved, the men who dig down into their pockets for money want to be pretty sure their candidate will be in a position to well do favors.

Some observers, particularly republicans, believe Martin's popularity is on the wane and believe that by the November election he will be vulnerable. If enough of the money boys can be made to believe this, it is likely Marks will be sent into the campaign.

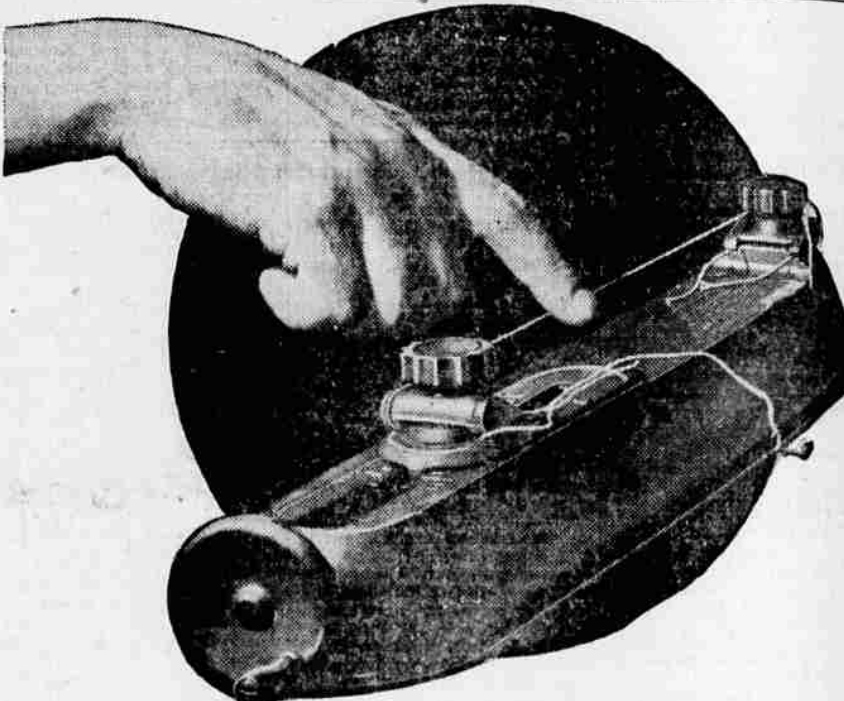
ing made, but thousands of dollars delinquent taxes are being received. The tax deputy said. A larger amount in delinquent payments is being received this year than for a number of years past and this means the county warrants are being brought further up to date than for several years past. Warrants on the general fund of the county have been drawn as far back as last July 1, and road fund warrants as far back as October, but heavy payments late will advance them several months. County Treasurer Grace Schlicka said Wednesday.

Mail Checks, Says Howe

Taxpayers who have been unable to make their payments at the office on account of the long line in waiting, are advised that they may now bring their checks to the office, during the March 15, they will receive their receipts in turn by mail with the three per cent rebate deducted, just the same if full payment is made. Hundreds of taxpayers make their payments in this manner thus avoiding the long wait in the line.

Mail payments are handled by a night force at the office and although there is a great stack of letters containing checks piled up in the office, the night crew make fairly good headway upon them in the course of a night's work.

The payment of \$88,217, made by the Southern Pacific company a few days ago has been turned over to the county treasurer and the sum has been segregated as follows: State county tax \$155,000.01; school, \$918.93; school districts, \$47,200.00; union high schools, \$13,000.41; county high school fund, \$12,575.01; fire patrol, \$26.84.

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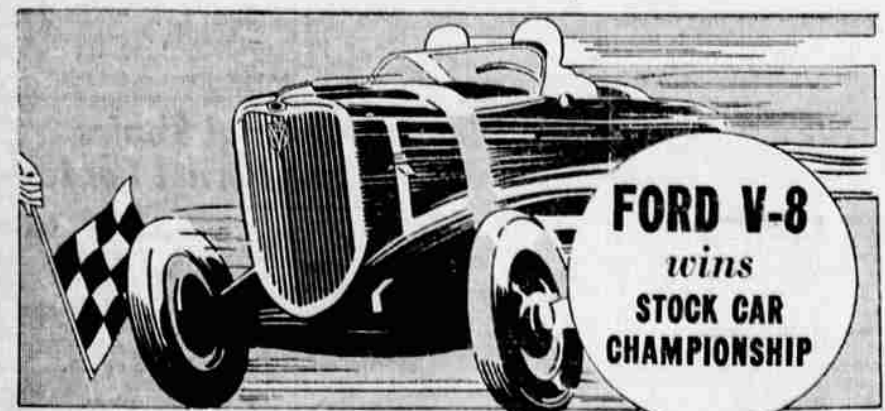
