with whipped cream or serve in individual dishes with top milk cream or whipped cream.

The secret of this dessert lies in two things, keep the rhubarb sugar boiling hot during the entire proceeding and keep weighted 24 hours before serving. You will repeat this dessert if you once try it, for it is good.—Mrs. Guy B. Knox, Route 3, Eugene.

Rhubarb Roll
2 1/2 cups rhubarb.
2 cups sugar.
1 1/2 cups water.
Chop rhubarb very fine. Cook water and sugar in a baking pan on a slow fire. While this is cooking make a rich biscuit dough: 2 cups flour, 1/4 teaspoon salt, 4 teaspoons baking powder, enough cream or rich milk to make a stiff dough. Roll out in 1/2 inch sheet then spread with the chopped rhubarb, roll up and cut into 2 inch pieces, place cut side down in hot syrup. Sprinkle top with nutmeg and cinnamon, also place small piece of butter on top.
Bake in hot oven until rhubarb is done and crust is brown. Serve with cream.—Margaret Lamb, Route 1, Harrisburg.

H. C. Calhoun and J. W. Lewis, Portland men, new owners of a shingle mill established about a year ago on the North Fork, took over operation of the mill Thursday. These men just closed the deal for the purchase of the mill from Roy Schroeder, the man who established it. Cedar in abundance is close at hand to this mill and furnished as needed by H. M. Peterson, who has a contract to do this work. A fine stand of alder is also available which is ready for the cutting, but which would mean the installation of another and different type of mill. The shingle mill as it is now employs some 12 men at the plant and in the timber, who it is pointed out should have steady work under proper management.

There has been news this week in projects of importance which are taking place in Florence and which are soon to take place. For example, Gus Carlson of the army engineers' office at Portland was here this week seeking data on development of the local harbor. His visit was part of a setup to get traffic between the interior and a real harbor. A maze of wires which cross over the street at this point will be no more, and an underground cable will be installed to care for them when the new Coast highway \$470,000 bridge swoops over the street at this point.
