The service is based on the seven last words of Christ as he suffered on the Cross.

Rev. Clay E. Palmer of the First Presbyterian church will have charge of the service in the first section, and Rev. Errol B. Sloan of the Fairmount Christian on the meditation, on "Father, forgive them, for they know not what they do."

Rev. Bryant Wilson of the First Baptist church is to give the scripture for the second part and Rev. Cecil F. Ristow of the First Methodist Episcopal church will have the meditation on "Today shalt thou be with me in paradise." Scripture for the third section will be given by Rev. Harry R. Neat of the Lighthouse Temple and Mrs. C. K. Chapman of the Church of God will give the meditation on the words "Behold thy son... behold thy mother."

For the fourth part, Rev. J. C. Templeton of the Presbyterian ministry will have the scripture and Rev. R. E. Clark of the Fairmount Presbyterian church will give the meditation on the words, "My God, my God, why hast thou forsaken me?"

In the fifth part, Rev. C. Ford will give the scripture and Rev. C. S. Borgstrom of the Bethany Evangelical church will give the meditation on "I thirst."

Part six will have Rev. Frank Cook of the Christian ministry giving the scripture and Rev. Milton S. Weber of Central Presbyterian church the meditation on "It is finished." For the seventh part, Rev. D. C. Ponder of the Springfield Methodist Episcopal church is to present the scripture and Rev. S. Earl Childers of the First Christian church will give the meditation on "Father, into thy hands I commend my spirit."

will be the exposition and discussion of views from outside the educational field on current social movements. Representatives of business, industry, government and relief and recovery agencies such as the PWA, the NRA and EIRA will appear before the sessions, both as speakers and to conduct open forum meetings.

Evaluate College Efforts

The second phase will be consideration of significance for education, and particularly for higher education of social changes as presented by men selected from educational and other fields, while the third phase will be a thorough study and evaluation of efforts now being made in colleges to meet the needs of the present.

"Far reaching and apparently fundamental changes are taking place in society and civilization today," Dr. Royer points out in the announcement of the conference. "The functions of government, specifically central government, are being greatly extended. Governmental regulation of business and industry approaches systematic control, limiting significantly the meaning of freedom for the individual. Population growth is slowing down and will soon be stationary with a mean age centered, not on youth as in the past, but on maturity. Technology has made possible for the first time in history a true economy of plenty, with unlimited implications of social well-being or social ill arising from the liberation of mankind from oppressive labor."

Meet of Wide Importance

"Ideas of human values seem to be shifting from predominantly material bases to others which are more concerned with finer qualities of living and greater appreciation of beauty. Few people, with the exception of professional social scientists, seem to be fully aware of these changing conditions and their significance to the established institutions of society."

"The higher education conference is planned to bring about an interchange of ideas and information by bringing together faculty members and administrators from institutions of higher learning, outstanding social thinkers, representatives of business and of other professions, and of general supporters of education."

Enthusiastic support for the conference has been forthcoming from all persons contacted so far, Dr. Royer states, and a meeting of national importance is anticipated.

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HOLMAN ASSAILS UTILITIES; SILENT ON MAKING RACE

of plenty. This fact is most apparent in the operations of the private power, telephone and other public utility companies and in the tremendous unemployment situation which is the result of the concentration of wealth through special privilege laws and unfair and dubious regulation.

"Moreover, so powerful and insolent have these utility companies become and so dependent and helpless is the condition of the workers that not long since the employees of the local power company were compelled to buy, and induce their families and friends to buy, what has since proved to be worthless securities under the veiled threat of discharge from their jobs unless they 'co-operated.'"

Poor Buy Securities

"Among countless others I have personal knowledge of one laborer's family—a family where the little girls worked in a factory after school hours endeavoring to keep the home fires burning—was stripped of over \$1000 so that the father would not lose his small job with the power company, while the exalted president of that company was and still is drawing utility salaries derived from such and other unconscionable sources of approximately \$34,000 a year!"

"Before our eyes we see these same utilities scheming with the apparent aid of the Portland chamber of commerce to capitalize the power resources of Bonneville dam for their private profit to further impoverishment of the people. Their plan apparently is to have the government be a Santa Claus to them and to all intents and purposes make the local power companies a present of the dam."

"In this connection I would like to know before it is too late for true progressives yet to unite upon one candidate for governor to enter a campaign with some hope of success, just what is the significance of the following reported direct quotation of General Martin in the Oregon Journal of October 15 last: 'This power which the government will develop at Bonneville dam is not intended to force down the rates of the existing power companies...'

"I sincerely hope the Oregon Journal and General Martin can divorce that statement from any servility to power company interest."

BEDE ACTION EYED

Lane county political observers were eyeing with interest the race for the democratic and republican nominations for secretary of state this week, with two Lane county men definitely in the running and another expected to make some announcement in the near future.

S. S. George of Eugene has come out for the republican nomination and J. E. Shelton, long prominent in Lane county affairs and still connected here in business affairs, is seeking the democratic nomination.

Elbert Bede, Cottage Grove publisher, left his southern Lane county metropolis Saturday for a trip down state to Salem and Portland, ostensibly to confer with party leaders regarding his proposed candidacy for the republican nomination. Of course, it was generally understood that the matter of financial support would be an important consideration in the ultimate decision and another item would be the position of Earl Snell of Arlington.

Support Divided Here

Bede was expected to announce his decision within a few days, possibly Sunday. Late Saturday night he could not be reached for a statement.

There is considerable local support for Bede and George in the republican party, the support appearing to be divided, with the old line republicans inclined to back Bede and the Meier republicans and veterans more in George's camp. A fever for local support for Bede's candidacy is said to have resulted in a pledge of around \$100 for a campaign fund here.

Shelton is expected to get most of the democratic support around Lane county in spite of the recent statement that a "drafting" movement to get H. E. Walter, Corvallis, former HOLC executive in this state, into the race for the democratic nomination held local support.

That Walter "Draft"

The inside of that situation appeared to be that when the "draft" was first mentioned, local democrats were willing enough to pitch their tents in his camp because democrats are, above all, anxious to have candidates out for every office this year and at that time this particular race seemed devoid of Bourbon possibilities. That was before Shelton's position was generally understood.

Following the gathering of democrats here Saturday, it became generally known that Shelton would become a candidate and, in fact, he filed early this week. Meanwhile, the Walter movement was publicized, car-

rying the indication of Lane county support but had local democrats known in time, it is thought it would have been made clear they favored Shelton.

At any rate, it is generally expected among democrats that Shelton will receive the support of Lane county Bourbons.

Mussolini Agast Over Decline of U. S. Birth Rate

ROME, March 24.—(AP)—Premier Mussolini's newspaper today characterized as "alarms" the "diminution of births in the United States," and asked, "are we to see within a century a negro in the White House?"

"The diminution of births in the United States is assuming alarming proportions," said Il Popolo d'Italia editorially.

"If it continues at this rate the number of births will surpass the number of cradles."

"Some might say it is the effect of the crisis. This observation mirrors one of the most eloquent aspects of that materialist sale of its own strength and position which, in a land of all comforts and mechanical marvels, willingly sacrifices its power of tomorrow to the comfortable life and illusory wellbeing of today."

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MRS. RASMUSSEN IS DEAD AT AGE OF 92

Mrs. Margaret Rasmussen died Saturday evening at the home of her daughter, Mrs. W. W. Calkins, at the age of 92 years.

Mrs. Rasmussen was born in Wales, December 18, 1842, coming to this country when nine years of age. She lived at Waukesha, Wis., and later at Randolph, Wis. Her maiden name was Margaret Davis.

She was married October 26, 1868 to the late J. N. Rasmussen at Randolph where they lived for nearly 50 years. About 30 years ago Mrs. Rasmussen came west to Spokane and has lived too in Eugene off and on the past several years.

Mrs. Rasmussen is survived by two daughters, Mrs. Calkins of Eugene and Mrs. W. H. Matthews of Spokane; and six grandchildren, one of whom is Miss Jeannette Calkins, editor of the Oregon Clubwoman. Mrs. Rasmussen was a member of the Methodist Episcopal church.

Funeral arrangements will be made later from the Foote-Gray-Bartholomew chapel.

Head of League Of Nations Dead

PARIS, March 24.—(AP)—Dr. Raoul A. Amador, president of the League of Nations council and Panama minister to Paris, died last night at the age of 59 after a brief illness.

At his bedside were his mother, Maria Amador, his wife, and friends. The illness of Dr. Amador, son of the first president of Panama, became grave only a few days ago when double pneumonia developed.

His death was the occasion of widespread expressions of sorrow in social and diplomatic circles, especially in League of Nations quarters where he had made many friends through his official league contacts.

Dr. Amador was an officer in the Legion of Honor and as such he will be accorded special French official honors in addition to the customary official attendance at his funeral because of his diplomatic status.

Vets' Benefits Meet Deadlock

WASHINGTON, March 24.—(AP)—Opposing factions in the senate fight on veterans' benefits failed to reach a common ground today after a day-long series of conferences.

Majority Leader Joseph T. Robinson said the effort would be resumed over the week-end with the prospect that the veterans' provisions would be returned to conference with the house Monday. He said he expected that the controversy could be settled satisfactorily in that manner.

Senate Finishes Airmail Bill Work

WASHINGTON, March 24.—(AP)—The senate late today approved a conference report on the temporary air mail bill, and sent the measure to the house for final action.

The bill authorizes the postoffice department to transfer funds to the war department to carry the mail.
