

INTERPRETATION OF NRA RULINGS GIVEN BY FIELD ADJUSTER

Explanation of recent rulings of NRA were given here Tuesday by E. Nygren, field adjuster for NRA in this state, who is in Eugene to confer with NRA officials and straighten out details of NRA compliance. Mr. Nygren will be located in the office of Donald Husband, attorney, all day Wednesday and employees who wish to see him may make evening appointments Wednesday.

According to a recent ruling, cost of trading stamps must be added to the purchase price of merchandise, according to Nygren. This means that merchants selling articles at exactly their cost price and giving trading stamps to the value of the price charged, are violating the code.

Effective March 31, the sale price of merchandise must be at least six percent over the cost price. This is to prevent so-called "loss-leaders" in merchandising. Nygren said he pointed out it did not necessarily mean that the retail price of all merchandise would go up six percent on March 31, but did mean that no merchandise could be sold at cost or less as an inducement to buy.

Another order of NRA, not generally understood, according to Nygren, is that all trades and industries covered by codes must post conspicuously the labor and hour provisions of the code in their establishments.

Some meat dealers here thought they did not come under the retail food and grocery code, but they do and must adhere to its provisions, Nygren declared.

LABOR TROUBLES STORY

Industry would quell unrest within its ranks by announcement of a 10 per cent wage increase focused nationwide interest on Pittsburgh, Cleveland and other steel centers today. Action of the Corliss-McKinney Steel company in raising wages in its Cleveland plants was confidently expected to be duplicated by action of United States Steel's finance committee at New York.

Railroads: Although stubbornness persisted in the railway wage cut dispute with both carriers and employees adamant in their refusal to adjust their differences, conferences continued between representatives and Railroad Co-ordinator Eastman. The administration, encouraged by the week-end settlement of the threatened tie-up in the automobile industry, continued its mediation efforts.

Textiles: Rioting accompanied the walkout of 1600 workers of the Cleveland Worsted Mills and brought numerous arrests and spread of the strike to 385 workers of the mill's cleaning and dyeing plant at Ravens. O. In Connecticut, three textile plants remained closed as state labor department mediators attempted to settle wage disputes which brought 1,000 workers away from their looms.

Shipbuilding: Construction of two cruisers and four destroyers for the United States navy and two Standard Oil tankers was suspended at Camden yards of the New York Shipbuilding Corporation as 3200 workers struck against open shop, present wages and the company union.

Airplanes: Two thousand employees of the Consolidated and Curtiss airplane plants struck for higher wages today. Consolidated was forced to close its doors but Curtiss remained in operation.

Shops: Approximately 6,000 Haverhill, Mass. shoe workers entered the fourth week of their strike today, with little sign that either employers or workers would retreat from their stands on increased wages.

WEATHER DELAYS RESCUERS FAIRBANKS, Alaska, March 27.—(AP)—Fog and rain over bleak Alaskan wilds today delayed the departure by airplane of the rescue expedition organized to aid 91 Russians stranded on perilous ice floes in Bering Sea. Three daring Russians awaited more favorable weather conditions to fly to Nome, base of their rescue operations. They purchased two Fleetster planes for the expedition to the ice floes.

APPLY FOR LICENSE Rams A. Cox of Eugene and Rachel Edna Neighbors of Newburg, Tuesday applied for a marriage license at the office of County Clerk Dillard.

Rhubarb Custard Pie

1 cupful cut rhubarb.
1 cupful sugar.
1 tablespoon flour.
1 tablespoon melted butter.
2 eggs.

1/2 teaspoon ginger extract.
1 cup milk.

Cut rhubarb in small pieces and mix with sugar and flour. Beat egg yolks, add milk, ginger extract, and melted butter. Line pie plate with pastry, and fill with rhubarb mixture. Pour custard over and bake in moderate oven until firm. Cover with meringue made with stiffly beaten whites of eggs to which two table-spoons powdered sugar have been added. Sufficient for one pie.—Mrs. Amanda Libke, 1943 Onyx street, Eugene.

Rhubarb and Pineapple Marmalade

Boil together until the mixture is thick:
2 qt. pineapple, 4 qts. rhubarb, juice of 2 oranges; add 2 qts. sugar.

Then add a cupful nut meats chopped fine. A little spice may be added if desired.

This marmalade is especially good for preparing the lunches for children. Put in jelly glasses and seal with paraffin. Caution: The marmalade must be stirred constantly while it is boiling to prevent burning.—Mrs. P. J. Strunk, 381 E. 3rd street, Eugene.

Strawberry and Rhubarb Jam

1 quart ripe strawberries.
1 pound red rhubarb.
3 pounds sugar.
1/2 cup fruit pectin.

Crush strawberries thoroughly. Cut rhubarb into very small pieces. Combine and measure the two fruits—there should be four cups.

Put into a large preserving kettle, add sugar, and bring to a vigorous boil over hot fire, stirring constantly. Cook rapidly for three minutes, remove from fire, add pectin, skim quickly. Pour into glasses and seal with paraffin.—Mrs. C. L. Huffaker, 1819 Fairmount, Eugene.

Rhubarb Gelatine

1 envelope granulated gelatin.
1/2 cup cold water.
6 cupfuls of raw pink rhubarb—(about 2 pounds).

2 cups hot water.
1/2 cup sugar.
1/2 teaspoon salt.

1/2 cup nuts chopped (almonds or walnuts).

Soak the gelatin in the cold water, while you wash and cut the unpeeled rhubarb into about one-inch lengths. Add the hot water and cook until barely tender—do not overcook. Add the sugar and salt and cook two or three minutes longer, until well blended. Remove from fire, add the soft-cooked gelatin, and stir until dissolved.

When it begins to stiffen, add nuts and turn into wet mold. If desired, coloring may be added. If desired, Serve with whipped cream.—Mrs. M. Johnson, 501 W. Broadway, Eugene.

sending the ministerial council and some of the churches, appeared at the council meeting and nearly a dozen speakers held forth on the undesirable liquor on the campus. Speakers told of "degradation" of youths drinking alcoholic liquors, drew word pictures of staggering students, mentioned "filthy beer vats infested with rats and slime," and pointed to "parents who would send their children to other schools if the zone were not established."

Two petitions, one from the men's Bible class of the Methodist Episcopal church, and one from the Press Forward class of the Central Presbyterian church, were read, urging the establishment of the restricted zone. Councilman E. W. Zumwalt also made a talk urging the zone. His remarks that he personally would favor extending the zone to the "city limits or to the state limits" drew rounds of applause from the audience.

An original drawn, the proposed ordinance prohibited sale of liquor above five per cent, but this clause was stricken out at the last meeting and the bone dry ordinance was given two readings. When the ordinance came up for the final reading, Councilman Fred Lamb moved that the ordinance be amended to allow the five per cent beverages.

This amendment passed, Mayor Elmer Large casting the deciding vote in favor of the ordinance, explaining that he felt the limits of the proposed district achieved no good purpose as the students would walk the few blocks necessary to reach the establishments where liquors could be sold.

This then brought forth discussion on the matter of extending the limits of the district, which as proposed was bounded by Patterson on the west, city limits on the north, Agate on the east and Nineteenth on the south. The police committee asked a recess of five minutes to discuss this matter which was granted.

Upon their return, it was moved that the ordinance just passed be repealed. This carried by a unanimous vote. Councilman Simon then explained that the action of the council really gained nothing insofar as it was but a recommendation to the state liquor control board which could approve or disapprove of the action as it saw fit.

"Since the matter properly rests with the state liquor board anyway, their action in requesting our recommendation is merely passing the buck," he said, "I don't see why the council should take this responsibility which is properly theirs."

E. O. Immel, attorney representing bail and pin machine operators, appeared before the council asking a reconsideration of the ban placed on these machines. The council refused to rescind its action, however.

Upon the recommendation of the police committee, the application of W. R. Wallace for a state liquor license was approved. His application was turned down by the council at the last meeting but following a special meeting, it was decided to re-submit the matter to the council.

Following a report that milk license fees were not being paid, the city milk inspector was authorized to "bear down" on those who had not paid the fees. Houses at 1076 Garden, 92 Madison and 236 Monroe were ordered condemned.

In order to prevent speeding in Hendricks park, dogs running loose and shooting, the council ordered attention to the fact that these items were violations of city ordinances.

NEBRASKA ARRESTED SALEM, Ore., March 27.—(AP)—James Elmer Weston, 25, of Lincoln, Nebraska, was arrested near Canby by state police yesterday after allegedly stealing an automobile from a used car lot here. Weston was also said to have admitted entering the McKay motor company plant during the night and attempting to force open the office safe. The safe was badly damaged.
