

LANE CANDIDATES SPUR ACTIVITIES AS FILING NEARS

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tions bearing 246 names the candidate avoids paying the filing fee.

C. A. "Shy" Huntington and Emmett Howard took out blanks to file with the secretary of state, seeking the republican nomination for Lane representatives in the state legislature Thursday. Shy Huntington is seeking his second term in the house while Howard, who has been out of the house for some time, is seeking a new term. Earl Hill, Cushman, already has filed for the republican nomination and Howard Merriam, Goshen apple grower, has petitions out and expects to file them soon.

With Hill, Huntington and Howard ready to, and Merriam circulating petitions, the republican list for the state legislature appears to be about closed. Hill, Huntington and Merriam are considered to have the support of the old line republicans and many others in this race, but there is some opposition to this trio among some farmers. It is believed Howard is banking on this alleged opposition in seeking the republican nomination.

Nielsen Doubtful
There was some talk that Kenneth Nielsen, Oak Hill farmer, would again seek the republican nomination for state representative, but Nielsen himself is doubtful about running. In the city Wednesday, he said he had not yet made up his mind, but felt doubtful if he would run.

In the senate race, the republicans so far are represented by H. G. Wheeler of Pleasant Hill and E. A. McCormack, who left the house race to seek the joint senatorship of Lane and Lane counties. Neither has filed as yet, but expect to do so within a few days.

On the democratic side of the fence, C. A. Schooling, Junction City farmer, has filed his declaration of candidacy, seeking the democratic nomination for the state senate, representing Lane and Lane counties. Helle Lydick and Dr. Frank Carl are expected to run for the state legislature and democrats are looking for a couple more people to complete their ticket in time for the deadline on filings next Tuesday.

Rhubarb-Marshmallow Dessert
1 pound pink rhubarb
1½ cups sugar
2 cups coconut
2 cups quartered marshmallows.
Cut unpeeled rhubarb into small pieces, add sugar and cook until thick. Stir in marshmallows, add half of the coconut. Pile in sherbet glasses and sprinkle with rest of coconut and serve. Serves eight.—Mrs. C. L. Huffaker, 1819 Fairmount, Eugene.

Rhubarb Puffs
Cream together 1 cup of sugar and 2 tablespoons of butter. Add 2 well beaten eggs, ¼ of a cup of milk, 1 teaspoon of baking powder and flour enough to make a stiff batter; then

stir in 1 cup of finely chopped rhubarb; half fill well buttered molds and steam for half an hour; serve with cream or any preferred pudding sauce. Fresh currants, gooseberries or blackberries may be used in place of the rhubarb.—Mrs. Herman Schmitt, Horton.

Mock Lemon Pie
Using rhubarb, this positively can't be told from one made with lemon juice. Just try it.
1 cup sugar
2 tablespoons cornstarch, level
2 egg yolks
2-3 cup boiling water
2-3 cup rhubarb juice, unsweetened
1 teaspoon lemon extract.
Mix sugar, cornstarch and beaten egg yolks and lemon extract, then the hot water and rhubarb juice. Cook until thick and pour into baked pastry shells. Cover top with a meringue made from the egg whites and a tablespoon of sugar and brown in oven.—Mrs. W. F. Marks, Eugene.

clared he would file for the democratic nomination for county commissioner, seeking the position held by O. E. Crowe, republican, who will be a candidate for the nomination also.

JUDGE BRAND DECLARES
Circuit Court Judge James T. Brand, Thursday formally announced he would be a candidate for re-election to the post which he has held for the past seven years. He sent his filing to the secretary of state's office this afternoon.

Judge Brand is expected to be the only candidate eligible to serve the court portion of the second judicial district. Oregon laws 28-803 specifically provide that one of the three judges in the district must reside south of the Umpqua river and west of the coast range.

The judge was appointed to his present post by Governor Patterson in 1927 and was elected to a six-year term in 1928. The election in which he is held in the district was shown by the record vote he polled in this area in his campaign for the supreme court in 1932.

HOWARD FILES
SALEM, March 29.—(AP)—Charles A. Howard, state superintendent of public instruction for the past eight years, today filed for the republican nomination for re-election. He is the only republican to date to file for the office.

Howard's slogan reads, "Present state school superintendent. Continued faithful and efficient service to Oregon schools."

son, who has been busy getting out the new tax bill, has given no indication when the committee might take up the bonus proposal.

The \$228,000,000 voted by congress will be felt by the treasury most heavily in the next fiscal year and the year after.

In the current fiscal year which ends June 30, Mr. Roosevelt has estimated a deficit exceeding \$7,000,000,000. A slackening rate of emergency spending however, indicates a deficit below estimates.

The administration's effort has been to hold routine government expenditures within ordinary receipts. For the fiscal year through March 27 this had been accomplished.

Receipts were \$2,204,874,000 and general expenditures \$1,980,882,000 as compared with year-end estimates for these respective figures of \$3,239,938,000 and \$2,530,720,000.

1935 To Bear Brunt
If the salary increase and veterans payment boost would throw routine expenditures above receipts, it apparently would be by a narrow margin but would operate to unbalance the routine government budget.

The decline in emergency spending, however, would more than offset the difference. Estimates to exceed \$7,000,000,000 during this fiscal year, emergency expenditures have reached only \$2,785,029,000 and just a little over three months remain in the fiscal period.

In the 1935 fiscal year, when most of the \$288,000,000 will be spent, the president estimated a deficit of \$1,986,133,000. In the 1936 fiscal year, he said, "we should plan to have a definitely balanced budget."

Treasury officials explained emergency spending is being directed on a two-year basis and that any unexpected portion of the \$7,000,000,000 estimates for the current fiscal year would be used in the new fiscal year.

Will Increase Debt
Regardless of how far actual outlays fall below estimates this year, this policy still would drive the public debt from today's figure of \$26,138,137,000 to \$31,834,000,000 on June 30, 1935.

Another element in the treasury picture is taxes. Budget estimates took no account of additional revenue which might be obtained from the increase in liquor taxes which became effective in January or the income tax tightening measure now pending.

Senators estimate this bill will add \$330,000,000 annually to revenues. Treasury estimates were believed to be somewhat lower, but the bill still might absorb some of the new veterans' and salary costs. Revenue estimates for 1935 were

given in the budget as \$3,074,065,000. Increased liquor revenues and the new income tax measure were expected to push this figure well over \$4,000,000,000.

the big moon. How many often see the full moon in the west? It will set at almost the same time that the sun rises. Close to and a little north of it the largest of the planets, Jupiter, gives its steady light. Its diameter is 11 times the earth's and it is attended by a splendid retinue of telescopic moons.

Turning toward the dawn we see low in the haze near the horizon the smallest of the planets, Mercury. It will appear south of each and about as bright as a first magnitude star but dimmer than the other planets. It is the nearest of any to the sun and is never identified by many star students. Contrary to the general rule for planets, it twinkles when near the horizon.

The most gorgeous sight in the morning and one that attracts instant attention is a group of two bright objects higher in the sky than Mercury. They are only about three degrees apart and will be closer during the day as this is the date of conjunction. The one appearing the smaller is Saturn. It is the most beautiful telescopic object in the sky; a bright yellow globe encircled by a separate, wide, flat ring of light. The other member of the pair is never excelled in glory by any star or planet. It is Venus, the twin sister of the earth. It almost reminds one of a little moon; in fact at present it is telescopically a beautiful crescent. It is now at about its most brilliant stage.

Under the full dawn the assembled worshippers may still see the brightest sky objects gleaming faintly. Venus may even be seen after sunrise, if one knows just where to look. The words of the ancient poet have taken on a new meaning this Easter morning.

"The morning stars sang together
And the sons of God shouted for joy."

tion in the United States were called today by Wirt "the usual move to distract attention from the real issue."

At the same time Wirt quoted two more incidents which he said supported his claim that "we are actually in the process of a deliberately planned American revolution."

Wirt's comments, made in a formal statement, were coincident with the hope expressed by Rep. Byrns, democratic leader, in Washington that congress would "force" Wirt to talk.

Wirt was quoted as saying that a "brain trust" member had described President Roosevelt as playing only the part of Kerensky in the plotted overthrow of the government, to be replaced with a Stalin later.

Will Give Names If—
"One of the five men foremost in the democratic party," said Wirt's statement, "is reported to have said recently in a private conversation: 'O, yes, I know we are on a course which will lead first to a period of fascism, followed after a brief interval, with communism, but—'"

"The sentence was completed with a shrug of the shoulders."

As the second incident, Wirt recalled that last December "about 100 intellectual radicals publicly threatened President Roosevelt with their group resignations unless he accepted their viewpoints as his."

With respect to the congressional investigation, Wirt said: "When in my estimation the welfare of the country demands that the

In addition to his mother, who is on the verge of prostration, young Kutch is survived by a brother, Kenneth Kutch of Medford, and by two sisters, Mrs. Don McGregor of Los Angeles, and Mrs. C. J. Hurd of Albany.

The inquest was set for 3 p. m. today. Veale's father was expected to leave the plane at Eugene and come to Corvallis by automobile.
