

# MANY NEW MODELS ARRIVE AT LOCAL AUTOMOBILE SHOPS

All Terraplane and Hudson cars in 1934 have the heavy-duty generator that was used only in Terraplane De-Luxe models in 1933, according to Chet Good at Monroe Motors, local Hudson and Terraplane dealer. This improvement with fan-forced ventilation permits the generator's being set at a much higher charging rate than at a lower one before. This keeps the battery fully charged, regardless of the amount of use of the car's radio, starter, lights or other electrical units. An automatic voltage regulator prevents overcharging, with consequent damage to the battery, and also incites the generator charging when the battery charge falls to a designated point.

To what extent does the weight of a motor car affect the safety? An interesting viewpoint on this question was expressed last night by L. E. Simmons, local Ford dealer. "For many years the minimum weight limit at the Indianapolis speedway races has been 1750 pounds," he said, "and the fastest cars rarely have exceeded this limit by more than 40 to 50 pounds. Since they carry engines that develop around 175 horsepower, their weight per horsepower has been about 10 pounds. The Ford V-8 for 1934 is one of the lightest of the modern passenger automobiles, and it weighs approximately 80 pounds per horsepower."

More and more persons are coming in for rides in the new Airflow De-Soto, on display at the Lane Auto company. Walter and Claude Bearstro, managers, expect early delivery on a carload of the machines, and they'll soon be available here. All comment to date has been favorable, with prospects enthusiastic over the speed, comfort and performance of the cars. The unusual stream-line design not only cuts down gasoline usage, but results in greatly improved visibility and speed.

Julio Silva at the Valley Chevrolet company has little to report this week other than increased interest in all models and several sales. According to Silva, demand still exceeds supply, and sales should break all records for depression years when the cars come in in sufficient quantities. General satisfaction has been expressed by all patrons over the fine performance of the new Chevrolet.

More interest has been shown in the past week in the new Graham than at any time previous this season, according to Fred Manville at the Motor Sales and Service. "The many fine features embodied in the Graham and not found in other machines is the reason for this," he says. "The Graham gives an entirely different ride. This is accounted for by the 61 inch wheel base, widest on the market, resulting in unusual smoothness and ability to hold to the road on the curves."

Reid and Sawyer, local Dodge dealers, wish to clear up any misunderstanding among Eugene people with regard to the introduction in 1934 models of independent front wheel springs. Several queries have come in asking whether this arrangement necessitates changes in wheel servicing, such as adjustments for toe-in, camber, caster, and so forth. The owners of the local agency state that this new springing method entails no new service problems, whatever. All the different details of wheel adjustment and service, the adjustment of bearings, of toe-in, camber, caster, etc., remain the same operations they used to be, and the service and brake testing devices with which shops are now provided are fully adequate.

After weeks of waiting, Eugene motor car fans were rewarded late Saturday by the arrival of the new Chrysler Airflow at the Brown Motor company. Beautiful in line, with fine construction both within and without, the Airflow is something to see. Walter Brown, manager, expects a carload of the cars within the next week. Many Eugeneans gathered at the company showrooms Saturday evening, with word of the car's arrival going out over the "grapevine." All expressed delight at its flowing smoothness, beautiful construction and unlimited power.

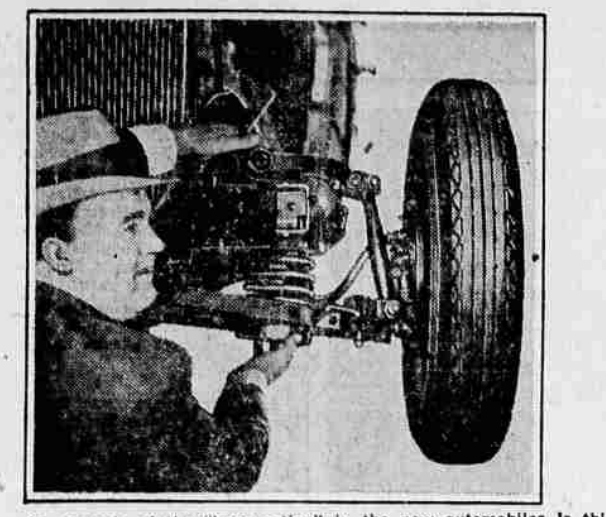
