

M'ALEXANDER TO MAKE DECISION ON CANDIDACY SOON

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era have been combing the state in an effort to find a man that could carry through to victory next fall.

Of the present crops of candidates, Rufus Holman is generally given the inside track to win the nomination with the field as split as it is and most republicans feel he could not win enough party support to be elected in November. In fact, it has been quite generally talked that should Holman and General Martin be the nominees, there would be an independent candidate in the field for the general elections.

In their attempt to find a man that could hold the republican vote in his list, party leaders have been busy of recent weeks trying to get a logical man, Leslie M. Scott, state highway commission head, was considered and it was understood he would be willing to make the race, but feeling sent out into the state apparently revealed insufficient support to warrant the move.

Support Doubtful

To some extent, old line republicans have gathered to the standard of Senator Joe E. Dunne, of Portland. Lane county representatives of this group are expected to support Dunne, but there is little chance of Dunne getting very much support from the so-called Meier republicans.

While the word from Portland indicates that General McAlexander is being urged by old line and Meier republicans, so far as Lane county is concerned there seems little support for the noted war hero in any camp. Old line republicans here won't have him and support in the other camp is not strong.

It also is indicated that veterans are in favor of the general's candidacy, but locally this could not be confirmed. Veterans here pointed out that their group as a rule did not favor army officers as candidates as they saw enough of them in the army. It was pointed out that if a candidate appeared to support the things they were interested in, he might seek their support, army men or not, but they made it clear that no candidate could expect veteran support just because he happened to be an army man himself.

The Newport war hero, known by all the allies of the World War as the "Rock of the Marne" as a result of his valiant stand at the Marne during the second great battle there, is well-known in this vicinity, having made several appearances here in the past few months.

Grace Schika, present county treasurer, Monday filed her declaration of candidacy seeking the republican nomination to succeed herself in this office. Placed after her name on the ballot will be the slogan "Service with experience."

THOMAS SHUNS RACE

SALEM, April 2.—(AP)—Charles M. Thomas, public utilities commissioner, today definitely eliminated himself from the race for governor, when he issued a statement to the press that he was interested in the task of establishing regulation in the state and not in holding the office of governor.

His statement, released simultaneously with the platform of Rufus C. Holman, state treasurer, upon which Holman would seek the republican nomination for governor, tends to indicate Thomas would lend support to Holman in the present campaign, although Thomas declared he was not interested in any candidate.

While Rufus Holman was not expected to file for governor until tomorrow, the last day, he issued his platform and slogan today. His statement to appear on the ballot will be "Protect the people from predatory interests. Permit no waste of public funds."

His platform is:

"Favor public development and distribution of cheap electric power for benefit of all, rather than permit its manipulation by power trust with resultant evils in finance and government. Development of maximum facilities at Bonneville to insure most economical marketing of eastern Oregon products."

"Strict accountability of corporations for securities issued and effective punishment of all swindlers and other law violators. Use of Oregon products and of Oregon labor with living wages under wholesome conditions to stimulate industry and relieve unemployment. Fair regulations of truck traffic to permit use of highways without unjust discriminations. Administrative economies. Opposition to sales tax."

FILINGS SPEED UP

SALEM, April 2.—(AP)—Willis Mahoney of Klamath Falls, democrat, and Charles Hall, Portland, republican, today filed for the nomination of their parties for governor. Mahoney was the first democrat to file while Hall added his name to Sam H. Brown for the republican nomination.

Mahoney's slogan on the ballot after his name will read: "A new deal for the masses. Standing one hundred percent with Roosevelt." The words to appear after Hall's name are "ex-Senator Charles Hall of Cook and Curry—always republican—always progressive."

The race for congressmen from the third district to succeed Charles Martin, who will seek election as governor, was enlarged today with the filing of Walter B. Gleason and Ralph M. Erwin, both democrats of Portland; while David F. Graham of Vale filed for the republican nomination for congress from the second district

Chief of Detectives Luke R. May, Seattle criminologist, placed his hope of solution of the crimes in laboratory tests he will make of blood-stained garments and fingerprints. Glass doorknobs, books, dishes and other articles were removed for scientific investigation.

Bodies of victims were removed to undertaking parlors last night after a crowd of curious persons milled about the home Easter Sunday. Autopsies will be performed.

Mrs. Flieder—one of the victims—was reportedly a woman of means. A report that she recently removed considerable money from a Seattle bank was found to be untrue. It was learned, however, that she had refused to make a loan to her husband, who was also slain.

Two of Mrs. Flieder's diamond rings were reported missing.

Mrs. Flieder's body was found lying on a bed. It was believed she had been carefully laid out after she had been killed. Her eyes were taped, her hands tied in front and her mouth gagged.

It was thought she, Mrs. Chenevert and Jordan were slain in cold blood and bound and gagged afterward. Jordan and Mrs. Chenevert had been shot.

Flieder, Chenevert and Balam had succeeded in breaking their bonds in a desperate fight for life.

don, despite his protest, to the house of detention.

Kenan Bey, attorney-general, stated that if an examination showed the 74 year old former utilities czar to be ill, he would eventually be transferred to the prison infirmary to await disposition of his case.

Taken From Ship

A battery of Greek legal talent was reported enroute from Athens to fight in his behalf—an apparent last ditch effort to save Insull from trial in Chicago on the charges which arose from the overthrow of his one-time empire of middle western utilities.

With his removal to the house of detention, Insull had lived in four different places in Istanbul since he arrived here last week.

His first place of residence was the Greek tramp freighter, the S. S. Malotis, which bore him here from Athens; he was removed from the Malotis for yesterday and placed in the Hotel Aydin. Then he was taken to the Hotel London in the suburb of Pera.

At the Hotel London he ate lunch and followed the meal with a short nap.

Although surrounded by policemen, he was permitted a nominal liberty and, awakening from his nap, started out for a walk.

Lawyer Seeks Delay

The walk lasted only about 100 paces, for he found himself to be followed by a squad of spectators. He went back to the hotel, changed some American dollars into Turkish money, picked up some newspapers and settled himself down in the hotel lounge to read.

Insull was still in the hotel when the police, acting on instructions from the Turkish government, placed him formally under arrest.

A Turkish lawyer immediately went into action for Insull, filing an appeal against the decision of the penal court which yesterday ruled that, as Insull had committed neither a military nor political crime and was not a citizen of Turkey, he was eligible to extradition.

Judicial authorities said, however, that the right of appeal was not operative as the penal court's decision was final.

Court Acts Quickly

Five detectives surrounded him as if he were a desperate gunman—not a discouraged and apparently beaten figure.

A three-judge Istanbul court made a black day of Easter Sunday for the care-worn Chicagoan. In proceedings he could not even understand it ruled that he could legally be handed over to the United States.

Instantly from the dingy, crowded little court room the word was flashed to the cabinet at Ankara. That body promptly decided that Insull would be delivered up.

Insull was on his way to the Hotel Aydin through a downpour of rain before he learned from the police accompanying him that he apparently had lost his last fight.

MAY RUSH RETURN

WASHINGTON, April 2.—(AP)—To expedite the return of Samuel Insull to the United States, President Roosevelt may depulize an American citizen in Turkey to act as a special police officer and bring him home.

state police and county officers regarding the shooting.

Kleppey was appointed by Sheriff C. A. Swarts as special deputy some time last winter and is one of numerous special having a commission to make arrests or investigate crimes at any time occasion might arise. A month ago he was in the sheriff's office and recognized the picture of Wilcox on file in the office as a man he had seen frequently. When he saw Wilcox and Hartley drive up to the house next door to Kleppey's home the officer recognized him and requested that he drive to the county jail to be identified.

Wilcox had never been arrested in Lane county, according to Sheriff Swarts' records but was convicted in Portland in 1931 of possession of liquor, the sheriff said. He was indicted by the Lane county grand jury recently on a charge of possessing a moonshine still. Officers on March 3 made a raid on a house on Chambers street and found two stills, finding evidence that led to the belief that Wilcox was the operator of the stills.

Wilcox was a native of Ohio and leaves several relatives in Toledo. He was married in Washington in February, 1931, to Miss Reta Debeau of Bend, who survives. He lived in Bend for about five years, being a member of Percy A. Stevens post No. 4 of the American Legion there. He played in the drum and bugle corps of that post and was also a member of the band of the Shevlin-Hixon Lumber company of Bend.

Wilcox served two enlistments with the U. S. marine corps, having been stationed at Guam.

Funeral arrangements have not been made yet, and are pending word from relatives.

A. G. McMillan, manager and D. R. Shambrook, clerk, were released. Dale Ruebush, who has been employed as cashier, will take over the management of the store. George Trapalis was retained as clerk.

Pension Checks to 329 Are Sent Out

Checks to the 329 persons in Lane county who have been awarded old age pensions were mailed out Monday by the county pension commission.

These checks are for the April pensions and are being sent out only to those receiving the March payments but to the new ones as well. County Judge Fred Fisk said.

TEXAS KILLINGS LAID AT DOOR OF BARROW, PARKER

FORT WORTH, Tex., April 2.—

(AP)—Tooth prints on a cigar stub led authorities today to attribute the slaying of two Texas highway patrolmen by Clyde Barrow, notorious southwest killer, and his woman companion, Bonnie Parker.

The officers, E. B. Wheeler, 26, and H. D. Murphy, 23, were shot down without warning late yesterday when they dismantled from their motorcycles to question a man and a woman seated in a parked motor car near Grapevine, 18 miles northeast of here. Witnesses said neither officer had a chance to draw his weapon.

A. C. Horvort, Fort Worth detective, said he was convinced the slayers were Barrow and the Parker woman. Near the scene of the shooting he said he found a cigar butt bearing the imprint of small teeth, Bonnie Parker's liking for big black cigars is well known.

Officers expressed the belief the two had been waiting for Raymond Hamilton, escaped convict, identified as the man who robbed the State National Bank of West, Tex., of \$1895 Saturday and kidnapped Mrs. Cam Gunter, near Mexico, after commandeering her motor car. After being kept prisoner all night he released her Sunday morning at Houston.

BROWNWOOD, Tex., April 2.—(AP)—Two persons, one of whom said he was Clyde Barrow, held up Howard Strickland, night watchman at Blanket, Tex., early today, stole about ten gallons of gasoline for their light sedan and headed east. Strickland fired at the couple four times, but said he believed none of the shots took effect.

Frank J. Blake, department of justice agent, said he had been informed by Houston police that the automobile used in the holdup had been stolen from Houston yesterday by Raymond Hamilton, Barrow's aide.

At Austin, L. G. Phares, chief of the state highway patrol, today guaranteed a \$1000 reward for the capture of the killer of two of his force, E. B. Wheeler and H. D. Murphy, whom he believed to be Barrow. The patrolmen were slain near Grapevine.

Shawe Appointed AAA Assistant Here

Appointment of H. Bruce Shawe as emergency agricultural assistant for Lane county was announced here Monday. The appointment was effective April 1. Salary and expenses of the office will be paid from Agricultural Adjustment Administration funds, it was said.

Mr. Shawe, a graduate in agriculture from the Oregon State college, has been assisting O. S. Fletcher, county agent, in handling details of the wheat and corn-hog programs in Lane county and will continue to assist in this work under the new appointment. After graduation, Mr. Shawe was engaged in Smith-Hughes farm for several years in Nevada.
