

LIGHTHOUSE PLAY SAILORS IN NEED OF "GOB" OUTFIT

With dress rehearsals under way for the Very Little Theater's fifth anniversary production of "What The Gulls Knew," accurate costume for the two sailors in the cast has become the final worry of the director.

Ernest Knollin (weight about 150, height medium) and Wallace Hebe (weight about 130, height medium) play the two sailors from the stranded yacht of the scoundrelly Harry Leroy, and simple though their costume requirements may seem, they have not proved so simple—in the matter of dark blue, bell-bottomed, tight hipped sailor trousers.

Likewise the matter of dark blue sailor jerseys, white caps (or dark knitted stocking caps) has not been so simple. A few years ago, after the World War "gob outfit" was plentiful everywhere, but apparently, according to Wardrobe Mistress Gretchen Parker, all gobs and ex-gobs have gone into hiding.

If anybody in Lane county has "gob" pants or sweaters for the two sailors the loan or the donation of them will be gratefully remembered by the Very Little Theater, according to Lance Hart, the new president. Operating on "a shoestring" in order to keep down the price of seats, the Very Little Theater has built most of its permanent wardrobe out of gifts from interested people.

Wardrobe Mistress Parker who has designed and built all kinds of costumes from the grand robes of kings to the flaring hoopskirts of the Victorian period is worried for the first time over the problem of having to build "gob" trousers. "I can probably do it," said she, "but it's not in my line, distinctly." Offers of "gob clothing" may be left with the ticket sellers or with Mrs. Parker, phone 1577—W, or at the Little Theater.

Tickets for the public performances which begin Monday evening went on sale Thursday morning and the Co-op store and they are also being sold by members of Phi Beta, national honorary music organization which will get a share of the net proceeds for its scholarship fund.

At the opening of ticket sales, there were demands for seats for the opening night, and while the performances are scheduled to run an entire week, early purchases of tickets is recommended by the management because of the extremely limited seating capacity of the house.

"The house seats only a little over 100 for any performance," said Karl P. Thunemann, in charge of the ticket sales. "When the tickets for one night have been sold it will be impossible to get seats for that evening. Those who intend to see the prize play should decide what evening they want to save for it and get tickets for that evening without delay, because even with a six-night public run, the maximum number that can see the show will be only a little over 600 which is about half-a-house for even one night in a large theater."

The smallness of the playhouse on E 13th street however, will add much to the effectiveness of the lighthouse play, because the action all takes place inside a light-house tower and spectators get the feeling of actually being in the lighthouse.

dated April 12, 1932, Wilcox had left that county prior to the indictment and had never been arrested on that charge. This crime was classed as a felony under the old state liquor law, while it is only a misdemeanor under the Knox law now in force. The coroner's jury returned its verdict at the inquest to the effect that Kleppey was not justified in killing Wilcox, upon the instructions read to him by the coroner and prepared by the district attorney, that the shooting of a prisoner accused merely of a misdemeanor was not justified.

two jobs on "Route F" of the Eugene to Siuslaw highway. The first of the Eugene projects called for 2.98 miles highway roadbed widening, gravel topping and bituminous macadam on the Danebo road. Eugene section of Eugene-Veneta highway, also known as "Route F." E. C. Hall of Eugene was low bidder of three at \$38,875.

Graveling Bids High
The second project called for construction of four small bridges over Amazon slough on the highway near Eugene. E. C. Hall of Eugene was also low at \$8030, with Barham Bros., Salem, bidding \$8215 and Big Ash, Medford, \$8722.

Chairman Leslie M. Scott of the commission declared the bids opened today on furnishing rock and gravel for different road jobs were very high and that most of them would be thrown out and readvertised. Code requirements were declared to have sent these bids far over the estimates of the state.

Low bidders on these jobs included: Low Pass-Cheshire rock project on Siuslaw highway in Lane county—Intercity Sand & Gravel company, Portland, low at \$9120. Eugene Sand and Gravel company bid \$9440.

The job of moving 26 buildings off the right of way of the Oregon Coast highway in Newport was bid in nine contractors, but some of the bids were not listed because of specification discrepancies. It was believed all bids would be thrown out and the job readvertised.

struction of four bridges on the same highway.

"That," Mr. Washburne said, "is the best answer the commission can give to the charge that there is discrimination against route F."

Money Unavailable
"We have nine roads to the coast now in western Oregon and are trying to build two more, the Wilson river and the Wolf creek cut-offs," said Chairman Leslie M. Scott, commenting on the board's action. "These two extra roads, costing in the neighborhood of \$10,000,000 would bring the total to 11. It appears to me that ought to be enough."

The highway commission chairman said the proposed route is a \$3,000,000 project and that the commission wants to build it, just as it wants to build the two roads from Portland. However, he pointed out, until money is available little can be done.

The purpose of sending the letter to the president was to assure the ultimate construction of the water grade road to the coast, according to Robert Prescott, who assisted in preparing the presentation.

Slidestopping Charged
"We can't let that road if we present our case properly to the proper authorities," Mr. Prescott said. "For more than 20 years, the main issues in the matter have been sidestepped, the effect being that we have not had the road where it should have been placed and we have suffered under excessive freight rates."

"We understand it is a privilege for a people to pay freight rates. But when rates are so excessive as to absorb the profits of industry and the fruits of labor, as they are in western and southern Oregon, then the payment of rates is no longer a privilege but an evidence of tyranny that should be fought as wars and plagues and fires—by united peoples, because excesses in rates are unproductive taxes, impoverishing, blighting and crushing."

In a telegram dispatched to the state highway commission Thursday afternoon, the Realty Board "regretted misleading headlines" on the story and urged removal of the entire petition by the state. Following is their telegram:

Sales Tax Given Support in Brief Filed For Voters

SALEM, Ore., April 5.—(AP)—Affirmative argument on the sales tax for the voters' pamphlet was filed at the secretary of state's office today.

The tax, 1½ per cent on all retail sales and utility services, will be voted on May 18. The argument was filed by the Yamhill School Savings Tax league, Douglas County Property Tax Reduction league, Jackson County Farmers and Home Owners association, Benton County Sales Tax league and School Relief and Property Tax Reduction League of Portland.

The argument declared that more than 900 elementary school districts are without funds and that hundreds of others have no prospects of securing adequate funds unless the sales tax is passed. Passage of the levy, it was claimed, would reduce property taxes \$4,000,000.

The brief asserted that the legislature passed the sales tax as a last resort after all other plans for saving the schools were found impractical. Alternate proposals of Ray W. Gill, Ben Osborne and Representatives Frank Hilton and O. Henry Olsen were ridiculed by the affirmative argument.

Gas Tax Receipts Over \$1,600,000

SALEM, Ore., April 5.—(AP)—Gasoline tax receipts for the first quarter of 1934 were \$1,614,511.12, the secretary of state's office reported today.

Refunds amounted to \$131,303, with \$906,588 turned over to the state highway commission.

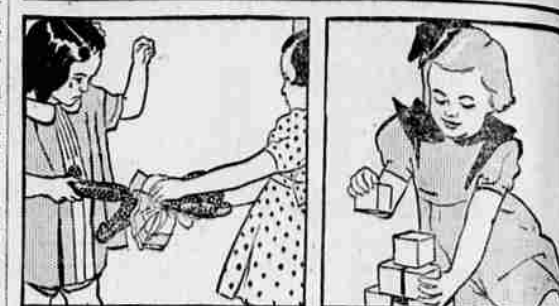

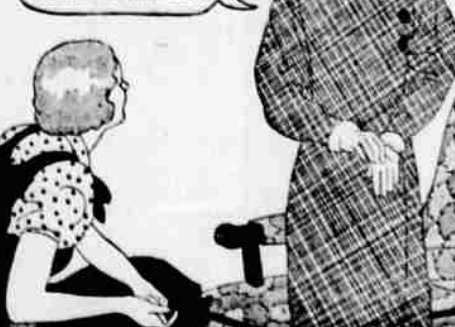
