

New Local Spinach In; Stock Market Sluggish

LOCAL BEETS AND CARROTS SCARCE; SOME SHIPPED IN

This spring's spinach was brought to the local vegetable market Saturday morning for the first time. The price generally is 3 cents a pound, although some buyers were paying a cent more.

There seems to be considerable confusion in the local spinach market. Some growers claim to be selling for as low as 2½ cents, and threaten to go even lower, while others are attempting to get as high as 4 cents a pound for last year's stuff.

Local beets and carrots are getting extremely scarce, and several vegetable dealers report buying shipped-in stuff from California. It will be at least a month before new carrots and beets are ready for sale locally.

Butter and egg prices were unchanged Saturday, as were poultry quotations. Wheat and other grains have held steady throughout the week. Current prices in Eugene are as follows:

Rye Advances Two Cents in Chicago

CHICAGO, April 7.—(AP)—Rye took the star role in the grain markets today, and went skyward a maximum of exactly two cents a bushel.

Souring of rye values aided other cereals to score price gains, and was attributed chiefly to action at Washington calling a halt on an extraordinary influx of foreign rye into the United States. There was also a private crop squaring plying the present condition of the new domestic rye crop at 65.1, the lowest point ever known.

Rye closed unsettled 1-8@1-5-8 above yesterday's finish, wheat unchanged to 1-2 higher, May 86 1-2@5-8, corn 1-8@1-2 up, oats 1-8@1-4 advanced, and provisions varying from 20 cents decline to a rise of 2 cents.

PRICE OF BUTTER
SHOWS BIG SPREAD
PORTLAND, Ore., April 7.—(AP)—There was today a greater spread in butter prices than for a very extended period in Portland with a further loss in the lower score value. Firsts were down ½¢ lb. for cubes during the week-end session of the produce exchange. With the make somewhat greater and with a considerable poor stuff being offered, the undertone of the lower scores has not been so good for several days.

Today there was a spread of 2½¢ lb. between top and bottom scores while for a time the differential was but 1¢.

Holdings of top scores were quickly moved from dealers' floors at the week-end, suggesting a demand increasing about as fast as the churn. Butterfat remained steady.

Market for eggs continued to show a generally steady tone for buying, but there was still a mixture of values on resales to retailers with the same old grading tactics, or lack of them, shown.

Demand for chickens at the end of the week continued strong with prices well maintained and a further fractional advance offered in spots for light and medium weight hens.

Rather easy trading tone was suggested at the week-end for country killed calves with late receipts liberal and demand not quite so good generally. Other meats were unchanged.

Trading in potatoes was being recorded here as a result of the peddling tactics of many growers who refused to sell when demand was good and prices materially higher than at present.

Demand for old crop onions continued to gain locally with prices a trifle steadier all around. Country holdings were being rushed to market with as much speed as possible around 30¢ per net.

While more local asparagus was being offered, the supply was still more or less limited and with Californian scarce and higher here, values were holding up rather well at the moment.

Hothouse cucumbers have dropped to 10 cents apiece, instead of 13 cents or two for 25 cents.

All hope for any more morel mushrooms seems to have gone, for the lack of rain has cut short their growth.

Beets have disappeared from the market. A few carrots are still being sold at from 3 to 6 pounds for 10 cents, depending on the quality.
