

LEADERS OF STATE TO CONFER AT PORTLAND MEET

PORTLAND, April 7.—(AP)—Provisional leaders of Oregon will under an accounting here Sunday and Monday of the effects of the repeal of the state's liquor laws, and of the state's monopoly on liquor distribution and sale.

The sponsorship of the Oregon anti-liquor league more than 100 persons are expected to attend the Portland meeting. Many will come from all sections of the state, in addition to considering the new law administration program to which some serious objections have been voiced by the prohibitionists, and to advance a program of their own. This is to be a continuation of a report of a committee on findings.

Charles Haffke, superintendent of Oregon anti-liquor league, said that incomplete tabulations from the state indicate liquor is being sold in increasing amount by individuals in the home; that drunkenness is growing rapidly, and drunk driving is increasing.

Haffke said the questionnaires distributed to superintendents of schools, leading business men, standing women, leaders in young people's activities and ministers, in respect of their position on the subject of dry question.

Bishop Titus Lowe of the Oregon Methodist Episcopal church, and U. G. DuBuck of Oregon college will be the principal speakers at the Sunday and Monday sessions which opens at 2:30 p. m. in the Benson polytechnic hall. Three sessions will be held on the first and second days.
