"I Am Suzanne" Musical Hit, Opens Show Week on State Theatre Screen

When Lillian Harvey comes to the State theatre today in the featured part of Jesse L. Lasky's "I Am Suzanne," she will be introduced in her third role for Fox along with three other hits.
