

FORMER EUGENEAN NAMED BY WIRT IN "RED PLOT" PROBE

opinion Wirt's allegations "have been shown to be silly, but if we call these additional persons, his statements will get sillier and sillier."

Representative Lehigh (R., N.J.) a member of the committee, disagreed with the "silly" judgment, and told reporters:

"I think Dr. Wirt got off to a very good start. His testimony at least shows the necessity of making a thorough investigation."

Toward the close of today's session, Wirt suggested that the committee summon Lewis W. Douglas, budget director, and W. L. Westervelt, Chicago business man formerly with the farm administration. They, Wirt asserted, could throw more light on the alleged plotting to bring communism.

Minor "Trusts" Involved

Speaker Rainey's name figured, too, Wirt quoting Westervelt as having said "he had asked Rainey what congress was going to do, and Rainey replied that congress would assemble, pass certain laws, stay in session until May or June, and within a month or six weeks the government would take over some industries 'and then I don't know what will happen.'"

Those cited as present at the September dinner were:

Robert Bruere, chairman of the textile code advisory committee; David C. Coyle, of the public works administration; Hildegard Kneeland and Mary Taylor, department of agriculture economist; Alice Barrows, of the education bureau of the interior department; and Lawrence Todd, representative of the Soviet News agency.

The dinner was in the Barrows home in Virginia.

Wirt said Miss Kneeland had quoted Tugwell as having said he "would have closed the grain and stock exchange if he had the power" and that he termed last summer's business improvement "a speculative spree."

Claims Tugwell Quoted

"Miss Kneeland said," he went on, "that Tugwell said: 'If we begin to plan nationally we must change once and for all four statutes and constitution.'"

He also testified Miss Kneeland had quoted the assistant secretary of agriculture to the effect that "it was impossible to have a planned economy and have big business operating industry."

Representative Bulwinkle (D., N. C.), wanted to know who had talked of President Roosevelt as a "Kerensky," later to be replaced by a "Stalin."

"Lawrence Todd," Wirt replied, "As to Westervelt, the schoolmaster testified the Chicagoan had said 'Dr. Frederic C. Howe (head of the AAA Consumers Council) had told him that if there was a way to stop feeding people on federal relief that quicker progress could be made toward what we are after.'"

"Easy to Inoculate"

Westervelt also was quoted as having said Tugwell asserted he could get \$1,000,000 for a special school for "recent college graduates," and that it would be "easy to inoculate them with ideas about the new planned economy."

Wirt also assailed the "subsistence homestead" plan of the administration.

"Do you consider it part of a plan to overthrow the established order?" he was asked, and replied he "certainly did."

Asked by Representative O'Connor (D., N. Y.), if he discriminated between overthrowing the social order and changing the government, Wirt said that he spoke of revolution such as the "Roosevelt Revolution" referred to in a book by Ernest K. Lindley. He said some people thought of revolution as throwing out the president and "blowing off the top of the capitol."

"The president is not to blame," he said, "but the real friends of the constitution have not come forward."

Asked by Representative Arnold (D., Ill.), who made the statement in his remarks that "We are on the inside and had controlling influence which made the president think he was making decisions," Wirt replied: "Todd, Kneeland and Taylor."

Suggested modification and amendments for the production control plan was embodied in the form of a committee report submitted by a group of nine men appointed yesterday, representing the three states.

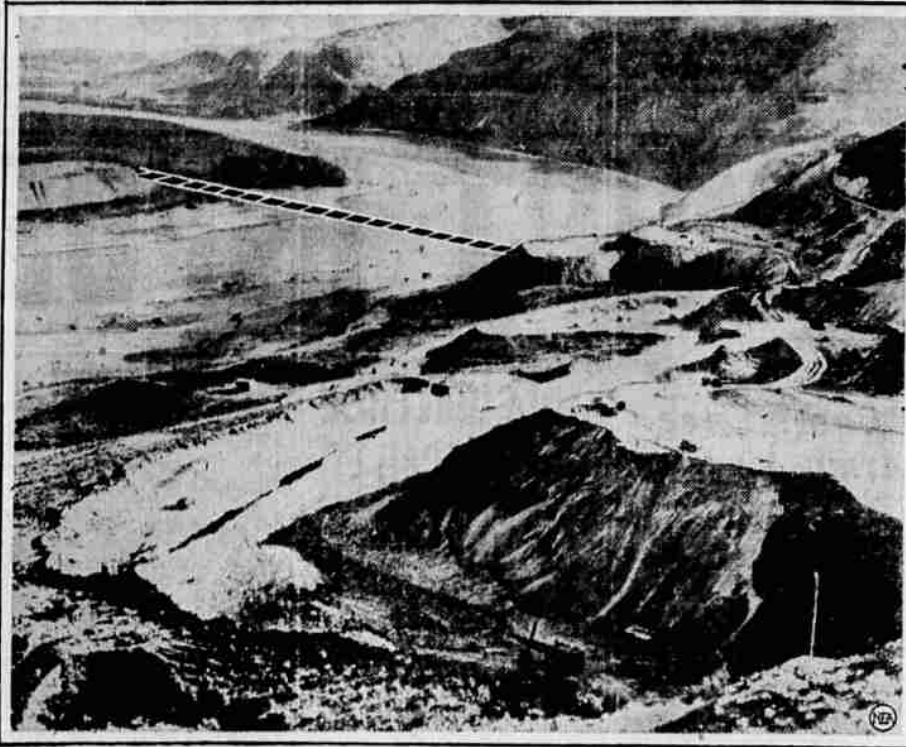

Dissolve one package raspberry gelatin in 1 1/2 cups boiling water. Pour 1/4 inch layer of gelatin into heart shaped molds. Chill remainder. Beat 2 egg whites stiff, then add gradually 4 tablespoons raspberry jam and chilled gelatin and continue beating. Fold in 1/2 cup heavy cream beaten stiff. Fill heart molds and chill. Serve with heart shaped cookies.

Banana Grape Ring

Dainty and unusual is this gelatin dessert which you will like for parties for spring.

Prepare package grape gelatin as directed on package and mold in individual molds. Mash 2 bananas with a fork, add 2 tablespoons of lemon juice and 1/4 cup powdered sugar. Add slowly, two stiffly beaten egg whites. Serve in center of grape ring.—Mrs. T. C. Swindall, 1075 Emerald St., Eugene.

Power District, School Unit Plan Will Be Voted On

Orders for special elections to vote on the question of forming the Lorane-Central people's utility district and that of whether or not to adopt the county school unit plan were made by the county court Monday afternoon. Both elections will be held on the same day as the primary elections—May 18—and the judges and clerks at the primaries will act in the special elections.

The election on the power plan will be in the grange halls at Crose and Lorane, it is announced. There are five directors of the district to be elected and the names of eight candidates will appear on the ballot. The candidates are Gustaf Swanson, John Snellstrom, F. D. Pezold, Walter S. Anderson, Roy V. Foster, V. Fleck, E. B. Doane and A. C. Forney.

The county school unit plan was inaugurated by the Mapleton grange. This plan, under the state law, if adopted by any county, provides that the entire county shall be one district instead of being divided into many and all schools outside the cities are to be administered by one board.

ning till Dec. 31. The status of these licenses was uncertain Tuesday, although George Neuner, attorney for the state liquor commission, expressed the opinion the matter was dealt with satisfactorily in the Knox liquor control law.

In section 18, dealing with cancellation or suspension of licenses by the commission, he explained, paragraph 11 provides that, in addition to a number of reasons, licenses may be cancelled "if there is any other reasons which, in the opinion of the commission, based on public convenience or necessity, warrants cancelling or suspending such licenses."

Neuner said, however, he was not familiar with the Eugene situation and could give no definite opinion on what might be the final settlement of the case. George Sammis, administrator for the commission, was not available Tuesday for a statement. Geo. McMorran, chairman of the commission, also was not available in Eugene for a statement Tuesday.

Up to State Now

Members of the council pointed out that their action constituted nothing more than a recommendation of action to the state liquor control board. The state board may accept or reject the recommendation and in the event they accept the proposal, it is expected they will take steps to cancel licenses issued to vendors within the restricted area.

The city plans to take no steps to enforce their ordinance, it was declared by Dr. George Simon, chairman of the police committee, it being the council's opinion that the matter now rests entirely with the state board.

Dealers in the restricted area are expected to meet in the near future to decide on a course of action, it was said Tuesday. No date for this meeting has been set as yet and no indication of what action they may take has been made yet.

Highway Plant Talked

The council considered an application for the establishment of a highway maintenance plant at Eighteenth and High streets, vacant lots owned by the city, and decided to withhold final approval on the matter pending an attempt to secure a site near the state highway and away from the city residential sections. Members of the council expressed disapproval of the location at Eighteenth and High, pointing out this was a residential district and that moving heavy machinery through this part of the city was not desirable.

The city plans to negotiate an exchange of property so that a more desirable location, from the standpoint of the city, can be offered the highway commission for the establishment of its maintenance plant here. Rental of the city asphalt paving plant to the Mountain States Construction company at the rate of \$3.50 an hour was authorized. The company has the contract for widening and improving the Pacific highway through the city.

Lot Exchange Referred

A proposal to exchange vacant property on south Willamette street, owned by heirs of the H. L. Studley estate, for city property on north Madison street was referred to the finance committee. The Studley property would be suitable for park purposes, it was said.

Unsanitary conditions of the river, asserted by several transients occupying quarters on the property of the Eugene Sand and Gravel company at the end of High street, were mentioned in a complaint from the city health board and the council decided to ask the company to clear its premises of the transients by May 1. The following three houses were ordered razed as unsanitary: 1870 Garden, 231 1/2 Monroe, 92 Madison.

A definite rate of \$5 as fee for cutting pavement three feet by three feet was ordered. Recommendations for state liquor licenses were granted for Bray and Bonney and Stella L. Lybarger.
