

OFFICIAL NOTICES OF MAY PRIMARIES BEING SENT OUT

Official notices of the primary election May 18, to be posted in the vicinity of the different polling places throughout the county as required by law, are being sent out by County Clerk Walter B. Dillard. The notices are being sent to the judges and clerks of election who are required to post the notices in public places.

The notices give a list of offices to be voted on, the measures referred to the people by the legislature, one measure referred on petition of the voters, that of the sales tax, and the one county measure, that of creating a county school unit of all territory outside of Eugene school district. The list of offices for which the republicans and democrats have named candidates for nomination are as follows:

State offices—One Representative in Congress, first congressional district, one governor, one secretary of state, one superintendent of public instruction, one commissioner of the bureau of labor, one state senator, third senatorial district, Lane county; one state senator, fourth senatorial district, Lane and Linn counties; three representatives in the legislative assembly, fourteenth representative district, Lane county.

County offices—One county commissioner; one county treasurer; two commissioners of the peace; one justice of the peace for Creswell district; one justice of the peace for upper Willamette district; one constable for each of the following districts: Eugene, Springfield, Junction, Cottage Grove, Creswell, Florence, Upper Willamette, Upper McKenzie, Mohawk and Mapleton.

Candidates for the following non-partisan judiciary offices will also be voted on: One judge of the supreme court, position No. 4; one judge of the supreme court, position No. 5; three judges of the circuit court, second judicial district. There will also be elected at that time a precinct committee in each precinct for the republican and democratic parties.

The measures to be voted on are as follows: Referred to the people by the legislative assembly: county indebtedness and funding bond, constitutional amendment; criminal trial without jury and non-unanimous verdict; constitutional amendment; bill authorizing a state tuberculosis hospital in Multnomah county; bill authorizing a state insane hospital in Multnomah county.

Referendum ordered by petition of the people: school relief sales tax bill. The county court has called a special election for the same day at which the following measure will be voted on: The question of creating a county school unit out of all territory outside of Eugene school district No. 4.

Taylor Grazing Bill Is Passed

WASHINGTON, April 11.—(AP)—The Taylor grazing bill to give the interior department control over 175,000,000 acres of public domain in 11 western states was passed today by the house.

Debate on the administration supported measure was concluded yesterday and only the roll call vote forced by republican opponents was necessary for action today.

The measure gives the secretary of the interior power to collect fees for grazing. A part of the money collected is to be returned to the states in which the lands are located. Other funds collected are to be extended to protect the vast area from destruction through erosion, floods and over-grazing.

The vote was 235 to 92.

Tax Returns Are Below Estimates

SALEM, April 11.—(AP)—Income and intangibles tax returns on 1933 incomes totaled about \$1,450,000 to date, the state tax commission reported at noon. The taxes were due April 1, but returns with interest payments have been coming in daily.

The total payments as indicated for the year would bring the figure to \$1,750,000 or about \$300,000 below the estimated returns, the commission reported.

Green Salad

- 1 tablespoon gelatin
- 1/2 cup cold water
- 1/2 cup hot water
- 1/2 cup vinegar
- 1/2 cup sugar
- 1/2 cup blanched almonds or other nuts
- 1/2 cup stuffed, sliced olives
- 1/2 cup sliced canned pineapple
- 1/2 cup small sweet pickles
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- Green coloring

Add gelatin to cold water. Stir until dissolved. Add vinegar, coloring, and cool. When it stiffens, add remaining ingredients. Slice pickles thin, chop nuts and cut pineapple in small pieces. Rinse individual molds in cold water, turn salad into them. Chill, unmold on lettuce. Very attractive and pleasing.—Mrs. A. L. Klimas, Rte. 2, Eugene.

Perfection Salad

- 1/2 cup mild vinegar
- 1/2 package of Knox gelatin
- Soak gelatin in 1/2 cup water
- 2 cups boiling water
- 2 T. lemon juice
- 2-3 cup sugar
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 2 cups chopped celery
- 1 cup finely chopped cabbage
- 1 green pepper (cut fine)
- 2 pieces of pimiento (cut fine)

After soaking gelatin in cold water add other ingredients except vegetables and let cool. When mixture begins to set add cabbage, celery, pepper and pimiento and when firm cut into squares and serve on lettuce leaves.—Mrs. Lester D. Bowers, Eugene.

Star Salad

- 2 T. gelatin
- 2 T. cold water
- 1/2 cup cream
- 1/4 t. salt
- 1 t. paprika
- 5 green peppers
- 4 tomatoes

Soften gelatin in cold water and dissolve over hot water. Cool. Add cheese that has been worked smooth with cream. Add salt and paprika. Stuff green peppers with mixture and chill until set. Slice in rings, arrange on lettuce leaves and garnish with tomato slices and French dressing.—Beryl Deford, 1272 Willamette, Eugene.

all power for regulation, the council has no power to enforce such an ordinance," stated Mayor Large. "The state liquor commission is not an enforcing body," said Chairman McMorran. "The state liquor law places that in the hands of municipal, county and state authorities. Any ordinance they adopt they will have to enforce themselves."

Ordinance Leaves Loophole The liquor commission meets next Monday, but in all probability will ignore the action of the council, Mr. McMorran said.

Campus restaurant dealers, at a meeting late Tuesday, decided that there was no need for any action on their part since the zone ordinance had accomplished nothing, and therefore decided to do nothing about the matter for the present. Licenses issued dealers in the district are valid

till next December 31 and no change in the situation is indicated until the present licenses expire. What will happen then is a matter of conjecture.

In establishing their zone, the framers of the ordinance starting at Tenth and Pearl, running east to the mill-race, and along the mill-race to the east city limits, south to the south city limits, west to Pearl and north to Tenth. It was pointed out Wednesday that the city limits actually are marked on the north side of the campus by the river and the mill-race so in fact it would be possible for someone to set up a dozen or more beer parlors within a stone's throw of the campus and still not violate the ordinance.

JUSTICE DISTRICT LINES CHANGED BY ORDER OF COURT

Because of the creation of four new voting precincts in the county last year the boundaries of 11 justice court districts have had to be changed and an order was signed by members of the county court Wednesday readjusting the boundaries and including these four new precincts—Goldson, Wolf Creek, Culp Creek and Waltherville—in the several justice districts.

The 11 justice districts are now made of the following precincts: Eugene—Eugene city, Bailey, Bethel, Blanton, Coburg, College Creek, Crook, Davis, Elmira, Glenora, Glenwood, Goshen, Irving, Noti, Pleasant Hill, Santa Clara, Veneta, Walton, Westmoreland, Willakennie, Wolf Creek and Zumwalt.

Mapleton district—Five Rivers, Herman, Lake Creek and Mapleton. Florence district—Canary, Cushman, Florence, Glenda, Heceta and Minerva. Springfield district—City of Springfield, Armitage, Camp Creek, Gate Creek, Jasper, Leaburg, Thurston and Waltherville.

Creswell district—Creswell city and Cloverdale. Cottage Grove district—Cottage Grove city, Brumbaugh, Culp Creek, Dorena, Latham, London, Lorne, Row River, Saginaw and Silk Creek.

Upper Willamette district—Oakridge and Westfir.

Lower Willamette district—Fall Creek, Lost Valley and Lowell.

Upper McKenzie district—Blue River and McKenzie Bridge.

Mohawk district—Mabel, Mohawk, Marcola and Weedling.

Junction City district—Junction City, Alvadore, Blachly, Goldson, Lancaster, Lone Pine, Long Tom, Prairie and Richardson.

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Realty Board Has Meeting Wednesday

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AYRES RECITAL PLEASES EUGENE

Harold Ayres, talented young Eugene pianist, whose recent out of town recitals have been attracting wide attention of late, presented his musical wares, a performance of memorable and delectable minutes, before one of the largest and most enthusiastic audiences to grace the school of music auditorium this year.

Ayres' program was solidly built, representing the music of twelve composers, ranging chronologically from John Bill to Prokofiev, with an added number of Tchaikowsky-Grainger. His programmed numbers included such diverse and significant masters as Lully, Paradiel, Bach, Mozart, Schubert, Schumann, Chopin, Ibert, Poulenc and Liszt.

In his first number he immediately claimed the attention of his audience through the thoroughly legitimate use of clear clean cut phrasing, strict attention of rhythms and the treatment of tone as an absolute thing in itself. To project his message, he sits at the piano and discourses music. The Lully "Air Tender" was a delicate bit of melody, haunting in its appeal and came like in his presentation of this neglected old master. In Ayres' performance of Bach he convinces one of the reverence, exaltation and dignified simplicity, no matter how involved, of the grand old man, the bug-bear of all students, the fugue was executed with precision, profound intelligence, an interpretation distinguished by thought, minute workmanship, sanity without pedantry, a treatment which never degenerated into affectation or exaggeration.

An actor at each performance should speak his lines as though for the first time they were being delivered by the character enacted, with similar illusion Ayres played his Mozart. Between almost every pianist and Mozart some idiosyncrasy intrudes. He played the Sonata with consummate taste, captivating grace and delicacy and a patriotic style. He has been given the faculty of letting nothing inject itself between the listener and the composer. He does not depend upon novelty, affectation or sensationalisms.

In his Romantic group, Schubert, Schumann and Chopin he demonstrated a beautiful cantabile, wide resources in tone coloring, deep musical knowledge and an unusual "lift" or commonly called "release" of phrase line. In short a complete technique. Mr. Ayres presented three decidedly different and different modern numbers, in the Suggestion Diabolique of Prokofiev, Le Petit Ave Blind of Ibert and En Automne of Poulenc. These numbers are fraught with difficulties which he overcame with apparent ease and into which he injected a great deal of atmosphere. In his final programmed number, the "Campanella" of Liszt he demonstrated great ease, facility, accuracy and finish, convincing his audience that they had heard an uncommonly competent, poised and interesting player.

Harold Ayres has been a student of Louis Arnan at the University of Oregon school of music some five years and in each succeeding recital has demonstrated a consistent development, and sound musicianship. The success with which he has recently

met throughout the state and California is certainly a tribute to credit to Mr. Arnan, Mr. Arnan, the University school of music.

Lostine Typists Win Championships

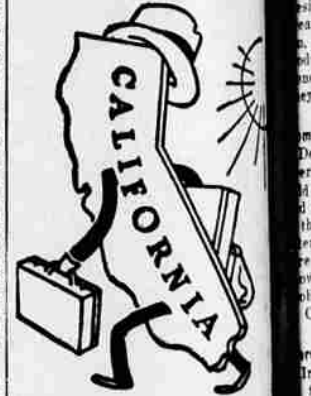
