

EUGENE MILK POOL OPERATION IS DOING WELL SAYS HARLAN

The Eugene surplus milk pool established by the Oregon milk control board is functioning satisfactorily, though the 90-day period for this pool has not been completed, according to E. G. Harlan, state board chairman, who was through Eugene Thursday on his way to Roseburg.

While here, Mr. Harlan stated another pool will be started at Corvallis, probably Monday, and that Earl Perry, manager for the Eugene pool, will supervise the Corvallis pool also.

Mr. Harlan was to meet in Roseburg at 1 p. m. Thursday with milk producers and to leave for Corvallis Thursday evening, and to be in Corvallis Friday morning at 11 o'clock.

Letters and resolutions are coming in steadily from interested communities protesting the Portland's Commercial committee activities. Mr. Harlan stated, "Communities are expressing satisfaction over the stabilizing of the prices for the milk industry. Ten cents a quart for milk is coming to be uniform over the state and consumers are not protesting a fair price for the farmers," he said.

The surplus milk established by the Oregon milk control board has announced the price for the Portland pool as \$1.75, the highest that has been paid in many months. This is despite the large surplus that has been coming into the Portland market, due to favorable climatic conditions, the mild winter and excellent condition of the pasture. The result of the first pool has earned favorable comment among dairymen in the Portland milk shed, as the situation has been close to watched by all interested in marketing milk in Portland. Mr. Harlan said.

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cold water, add 1 cup boiling water. Add fruit mixture to gelatin. When it begins to set fold in the cheese and cream. Serve on lettuce with mayonnaise or boiled dressing with a strawberry cherry on top. Makes 9 or 10 individual molds.—Mrs. E. L. Toller, 41 W. 18th, Eugene.

Fiesta Salad (Tower Style)
To mold use a set of 5 round layer cake pans, each one inch deep, and 5 inches, 6 inches and 4 inches, respectively, in diameter. Colors of layers—yellow, red and green.

First layer—Yellow, mold in 5-inch pan. Wash 1 cup dried apricots and boil in 2 1/2 cups of water until tender, about 20 minutes. Add 1/2 cup sugar, a speck of salt, and 2 1/2 tablespoons gelatin which has been softened in 3-4 cup cold water; a few drops of yellow coloring may be added, if desired. Chill till syrupy, then add 3-4 cup shredded carrots and 1/2 cup chopped green pepper. Pour into round 5-inch pan. Chill till firm.

Second layer—Red, mold in 6-inch pan. Drain liquid from a No. 2 can of beans. To the liquid add enough vinegar to make one cup, with the addition of the juice of 1 lemon. To this liquid add another cup of water. Take one package lemon jello using the above liquid (beaten) to dissolve it in. Puree the beans through a coarse strainer, add 1 small onion, grated; and 1 tablespoon minced celery. Season with 1 teaspoon horseradish, salt and pepper to taste, and stir in 2 tablespoons mayonnaise. Combine with jello mixture and pour into round 6-inch pan. Chill till firm.

Third layer—Green, mold in 4-inch pan. Take 1/2 package lime jello, dissolve in 1 cup warm water and add to this 1/2 cup prepared horseradish. That is to say—grated horseradish that has been mixed with vinegar. Turn into round 4-inch pan (first laying slices of cucumbers in bottom of pan to form a design). Chill till firm.

When ready to serve, unmold yellow layer onto a flat glass plate, then on top unmold the red layer and place the green layer on top of the red (tower fashion). Decorate top with rosettes of stiff mayonnaise. Around the edge of salad place quarters of ripe tomatoes (peeled) that have been marinated a few minutes in French dressing. To serve cut in wedges and serve with cucumber cream dressing.

Cucumber cream dressing—Cut 1 cucumber fine and crisp in ice water. Then dry well and add this cucumber to a cup of cream, whipped stiff, add speck salt and a little grated horseradish.

This is a very attractive as well as tasty salad and makes a lovely display.

Jellied Plum Pudding
2 T. gelatin
1 cup milk
1 pint strong coffee
1 cup granulated sugar
1 inch stick cinnamon
6 whole cloves
1/2 cup orange juice
1/4 t. salt
Grated rind 1/2 lemon
1 1/2 cups seeded raisins, quartered
2-3 cup stoned dates, quartered
1/2 cup blanched shredded almonds
6 egg whites
1 t. vanilla.

Soften gelatin in milk. Soak together coffee, sugar, cinnamon and cloves, strain onto gelatin and stir until thoroughly dissolved. Add orange juice, salt and orange and lemon rind. Cool and when almost beginning to set, add raisins, dates, nuts, vanilla and stiffly beaten egg whites. Blend all thoroughly, turn into a mold, previously dipped into cold water, chill, unmold and serve with boiled custard made with yolks of eggs.—May High, Oakridge.

Pickled Pineapple Salad
Cook 1 cup vinegar and 2 cups sugar until it threads, then cool. Soak 2 tablespoons gelatin in 1 cup cold water and dissolve over hot water. Add gelatin, 1 cup crushed Hawaiian pineapple, 1 dozen sweet pickles and 1 dozen stuffed olives cut in small pieces, then 1 cup broken nut meats (walnuts are best), pour into 12 small molds, set in cold place to harden. Remove from molds and serve on bed of lettuce, garnishing with mayonnaise dressing.—Mrs. Roger B. Hall, Wendling.

Salad Supreme
Dissolve 1 envelope of gelatin in 1/2 cup of cold water. Let stand 5 minutes then add 2 cups boiling water, 1/2 cup vinegar, 1/2 cup sugar, 1 teaspoon salt, and juice of 1 lemon. When cool and starting to set add the following: 1 cup chopped cabbage, 1 small can of pineapples cut in strips, a couple of stalks of celery cut in small pieces, 2 hard boiled eggs sliced, 1 small bottle of bottled olives cut in slices crosswise, 1 green pepper previously boiled a few minutes cut in cubes, 1/2 cup blanched almonds. Pour into large mold or small individual ones. Serve on lettuce leaf with mayonnaise. Will serve 12 people.—Mrs. Anna Gurney, 560 Madison St., Eugene.

local bond set up agent members of a past session of the house pre-arranging to set the machinery in motion for the election of the speaker, many declaring that that property is a matter that should be entirely in the hands of the newly elected members.

As a result of this talk and as a result of the dead certainty there will be several new faces in the legislature next time, the possibility of a dead lock over Hill and Winslow looms with increasing dimensions and in the event of this deadlock a compromise candidate is considered likely.

Shy attracted no little attention in the legislature in his first sitting. Many believed he displayed much common sense in his stand on various subjects concerning legislation and organization policies. The reputation Huntington earned was expressed in a paragraph in the Voter recently, describing Lane county's junior representative as "an able legislator, with the ability to clearly express himself on the floor."

It is generally understood that Huntington supports Hill's candidacy for the speakership and would work earnestly for his selection. However, local observers say, in the event of the possible deadlock with Hill definitely out, it is likely Huntington would have much support from this section of the state.

Huntington was in Salem Thursday, conferring with the state tax commission on matters of tax legislation and presumably discussing the speakership matters with party leaders.

The race for the republican nomination for representatives in Lane county looms as one of the most contested political races in this section this May. There are seven candidates announced, Hill and Huntington, Howard S. Merriam, Emmett Howard, Kenneth Nielsen, F. C. Heffron, and James K. King.

Union automobile-trailer carrying General Hugh S. Johnson, national recovery administrator, and other party members, as they were en route to the docks to greet the president as he arrived on the yacht Nourmahal

from the rift stream fishing grounds. The trailer cleared the tracks by inches as the train coasted by at a crossing in the residential district midway between the hotel headquarters and the docks.

Besides General Johnson, those in the machine included Donald Richberg, general counsel for the NRA; Marvin H. McIntyre, presidential secretary and a number of White House correspondents and their wives.

A police escort darted across the tracks in front of the on-coming train. The drive of the automobile followed, despite the shrieking whistle of the locomotive, and just managed to get the machine across the tracks in time to avoid a collision.

Arriving at the docks, the party greeted the president as he walked down the gangplank of the Nourmahal and entered a motor car to be driven to the railroad station.

The route to the train lay past Bay Front park where a year ago the assassin, Giuseppe Zangara, fatally wounded Mayor Anton Cermak of Chicago in an unsuccessful attempt on Mr. Roosevelt's life, on the day the then president-elect landed here for another fishing trip. Zangara later was electrocuted.

murder victims; Roy Dugan, John (Spud) Murphy and his wife, Geraldine; Elmer Mortenson, George Shepherd and Mrs. Beatrice O'Malley. No charge was placed against Babe Reid, who was arrested with the group.

It was also revealed that federal agents have been working quietly on the case and were convinced that the murders followed a robbery plot, engineered by a "tipoff" man.

Investigation of the "tipoff" man's past revealed he worked from Montana to Seattle in restaurants and saloons.

Very soon after he got a job a big robbery would be committed in that town and the man would move on to another town, an investigator said. "Shortly after he went to Bremerton he played around with two ex-convicts. He knew Frank Flinder and Eugene Chenevert, two of the victims. True to form, something happened. This time it wasn't merely robbery—but wholesale slaughter as well."

receiving higher wages than in other cities and to meet the demands would be turning competitive business over to outside manufacturers.

Matthew Smith, general secretary of Meas, replied that wages was not the only issue involved; that many plants are paying the higher scale already and that "It is just another attempt of automobile manufacturers and their affiliates to uphold company unions."

More Trouble Brews
The Meas also is handling wage and hour demands of workers in the Teranet Manufacturing company, the Fisher Body Corp., and the Midland Steel Products company. A strike of 800 men at the Detroit-Michigan Stove company which was called by the society, and a few minor strikes in other industries have served to add to the city's labor problems.

Meanwhile the recently-created automobile labor board is concerned with settling charges that 241 men employed in the Chevrolet and Fisher plants at St. Louis have been discriminated against by their employers.

John G. Bostwick, president of the Federated Automobile Workers of America, an independent union, who

presented the case of the St. Louis workers said that a strike vote of 2,500 workers would be held in the Missouri city tonight unless the board acts on the charges at once.
