

### HONOR SOCIETIES PLAN STATE MEET HERE ON SATURDAY

The Oregon State conference of National Honor societies of secondary schools will be held in Eugene Saturday under the auspices of the Oregon High School Principals' association.

Sessions will begin at 1:30 p. m. Saturday and will be in the Guild hall (Administration building) university campus. Harry B. Johnson, principal of the Eugene high school, and chairman of the committee on Honor societies, Principals' association, will call the meeting to order.

Paul Plank, president of the Alpha chapter of the Honor societies, Eugene high school, is to give the opening remarks. Billy Curry, Eugene high school, will give a French horn solo. Dr. Victor P. Initiation ceremonies will be held at 8 p. m. in Guild theater. Mr. Tavennar, Salem high school, member of committee on Honor societies, will preside. #### Dressing Without Oil

An especially good salad dressing for those not caring for oil dressings. 3 tablespoons sugar, 3 T. cream (whipping cream), 3 T. lemon juice, 2 eggs, 1-8 teaspoon salt, Pinch mustard, 2 teaspoons cornstarch.

Mix all together in double boiler and boil. When cold whip in 3-4 cup whipping cream beaten stiff. The excellent flavor of this dressing is in right with mild-tasting, woTewinglasso, amount of mustard used which can be found by tasting dressing as the mustard is used. #### Inexpensive Mayonnaise

Yolk of one egg, 1 tablespoon boiling water, 1/2 cup olive oil, 1/2 lemon, Dash of paprika and cayenne pepper, Salt to taste. Beat egg yolk and boiling water until they foam. Gradually add the oil and lemon juice. Season.—Elda Lohke, 1943 Onyx St., Eugene.

#### German Salad Dressing

Fry three slices of bacon very crisp and cut in small cubes. Mix one level teaspoon of flour in the hot fat until smooth and then add one-half cup of diluted vinegar. This is especially good for potato salad, lettuce or cabbage.—Marie Baranum, R. F. D. 1, Creswell.

#### Fruit Salad Dressing

1/2 cup syrup from canned peaches, 1 teaspoon sugar, 2 egg yolks well beaten, 1-8 teaspoon salt, 1 1/2 teaspoons lemon juice, 1-8 teaspoon paprika. Heat peach syrup; combine egg yolks, sugar, salt and paprika. Add peach syrup slowly, stirring constantly. Cook over hot water until thick and smooth. Remove from stove and add lemon juice; mix thoroughly and chill; sweeten to taste.—Kathleen Handr, 20 N. J street, Cottage Grove.

#### Something New in a French Dressing

(Very quickly and easily made) Into a quart fruit jar put the following:

- 1 can tomato soup, 1/4 cup sugar, 3-4 cup vinegar, 1/2 cup Wesson oil, 1 T. Worcestershire sauce, 3 T. onion sauce (or minced onion), Dash tobacco sauce, 1 tsp. salt, 1 tsp. dry mustard, 1 tsp. paprika. Shake well; pour over shredded lettuce. Keep jar in a cool place.—Mrs. Gilbert Cays, 651 Alder, Eugene.

#### Hot Mayonnaise

- 2 tablespoons butter, 2 1/2 tablespoons flour, 1/4 teaspoon salt, 1/2 cup thin cream, 1 egg, slightly beaten, 1-3 cup mayonnaise, 2 teaspoons lemon juice

1/2 teaspoon vinegar, Dash of paprika. Melt butter in double boiler, add flour and salt and mix until smooth. Add cream gradually and cook until thickened, stirring constantly. Add egg and cook 1 minute longer. Add mayonnaise, then lemon juice and vinegar, a few drops at a time, mixing thoroughly after each addition, add paprika and beat well. Makes 1 1/2 cups hot mayonnaise for fish or cooked vegetables, asparagus cauliflower, etc.—Mrs. R. G. Lamson, 291 Blair Blvd., Eugene.

#### Cooked Cream Dressing

- 4 eggs, 1 cup sour cream, 1/2 cup hot vinegar, 2 tablespoons sugar, 1/2 teaspoon dry mustard, 1/4 teaspoon salt. Beat well the eggs, cream, sugar, salt and mustard, then add hot vinegar. Cook in double boiler until thick, stirring constantly.—Mrs. W. R. Elliott, R. F. D. 1, Creswell.

#### Cooked Honey Dressing

- 3-4 cup water, 1-3 cup honey, 1 teaspoon mustard, 1/2 teaspoon salt, 1 tablespoon flour, 2 tablespoons vinegar, 2 tablespoons lemon juice, 2 egg yolks, 1-3 cup sour cream. Heat honey and water in a double boiler. Mix the dry ingredients with the vinegar and lemon juice and add to first mixture. Pour a small amount of the hot mixture over the beaten egg yolks and add this to the mixture in double boiler. Cook all together until a clear color. Just before serving add sour cream.—Mrs. F. M. Brittain, Monroe.

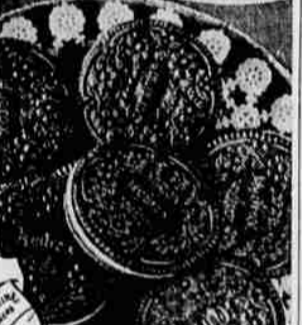
### Lane's Quota of CCC Men Is Filed

Enrolling of young men for the CCC camps occupied a greater part of the time of O. E. Crowe, county commissioner and members of the county relief committee Friday. Lane county's quota of men for these camps is 51 and it has been entirely filled, Mr. Crowe said.

After being enrolled at the courthouse the men are given a physical examination by army men and then assigned to different camps. Men for these camps must be between the ages of 18 and 25 inclusive and usually those in whose families there are five children are selected.
