Government Jobs Are Open to Exams

The United States civil service commission has announced open competitive examinations as follows:

Storekeeper-gauger, bureau of industrial alcohol, treasury department, \$2,000 to \$2,500 a year. Applicants will be rated on the subject of mental tests, including questions in elementary physics.

Junior forester, \$2,000 to \$2,600 a year. Junior range examiner, \$2,000 to \$2,600 a year, forest service, department of agriculture.

Rubber stamp maker, \$1,650 a year, office of national parks, buildings, and reservations, department of the interior, Washington, D. C. Applicants must have had at least two years of experience in making and mounting rubber stamps.

All salaries named above are subject to a 10 per cent deduction until June 30, 1934, and to a deduction of not to exceed 5 per cent thereafter, as a measure of economy, in addition to a deduction of 2 1/2 per cent toward a retirement annuity.

Seventy-five Plan To Go to Summer School From Lane

Seventy-five four-II club members in Lane county have so far expressed their intention of attending the annual club summer school sessions at the state college at Corvallis June 11 to 23, inclusive according to R. H. Kuehner, county club agent.

The cost of the summer school for the members attending will be \$12 for the two weeks, which includes board and room and registration. Members are quartered in the dormitories at the college and the instructions in different forms of agriculture and home economics are given by the regular staff.

Many of the Lane county club members are attending the summer school on scholarships either provided by outstanding work in their community, the Parent-Teachers' association or granges, or won at competition at the county fair or at the state fair. In addition, to this, many of the members of the clubs are raising money in various ways to send representatives from their group.

Livestock and crops club members especially will be interested in knowing the dates of the Pacific International Livestock exposition which is now set for October 9 to 13. This will mean that livestock club members will change their plans materially in preparing their crops for exhibit at that time.
