

HARRISBURG GRADE TEACHERS ELECTED

HARRISBURG, April 13.—(Special)—Four of the five grade school teachers have been elected by the voters for another year. The fifth will be chosen soon. F. S. McEldowney was principal again, Miss Wilma Owen and Miss Veri Burkhardt and Miss Hazel Houston. The term will be nine months instead of six.

The candidates for the Harrisburg school have received their standing and the three highest, from which selection will be made, are Clyde Spitz, Albert Windell and Harold W. The examination was held last night but for some reason the returns did not arrive until this morning. Kizer has served as act-upmaster for the greater part of a year. Five men and four women are eligible for the place in the race.

Trout fishing is good this spring in the locality, although the Willamette river has been a little muddy since the season opened. Several limit catches have been made lately. Dale will catch two trout at one cast, weighed two pounds and the other one and one-half pounds. Prior to the trout season fishing for bullheads was popular.

The Harrisburg ball team will play its first game of the season here on Monday, resplendent in new suits. The members of the town have each contributed freely for the suits and at a meeting last night the fund was raised materially by the proceeds of a country league including teams from Albany, Oak Creek, Tangent, Halsey, Brownsville, Harrisburg, Sweet Home. The first plan is to include towns from another county but it was decided later to limit it to Lincoln county affairs.

Plans are nearly complete for the commencement of the local high school on May 11 this year. The commencement program will be Friday night, May 25. Baccalaureate service has been set for May 20. The speaker for

commencement has not been chosen but for baccalaureate Rev. K. K. Clarke, former Methodist minister of this church, will officiate.
