

## CAMP WALKER CCC REDUCED TO 113 MEN

CAMP WALKER, CCC, REEDS-PORT, April 13.—(Special).—The strength of the camp has been reduced to 113 men as a result of the discharge of more than 50 men, who had concluded their enlistment. The majority of the men left for their homes in Salem, Prineville, Portland and Eugene. The company is expected to be recruited to full strength by April 15, when about 100 men will be enrolled for a period of six months.

During the favorable construction weather rapid progress is being made in the construction of the highway through the state forest at Camp Walker. C. F. Beaslee, camp superintendent, is pushing the work, the recent acquisition of new machinery greatly facilitating the construction. Capt. Gregory and Lieut. ## Missionary Society Of Halsey Meets

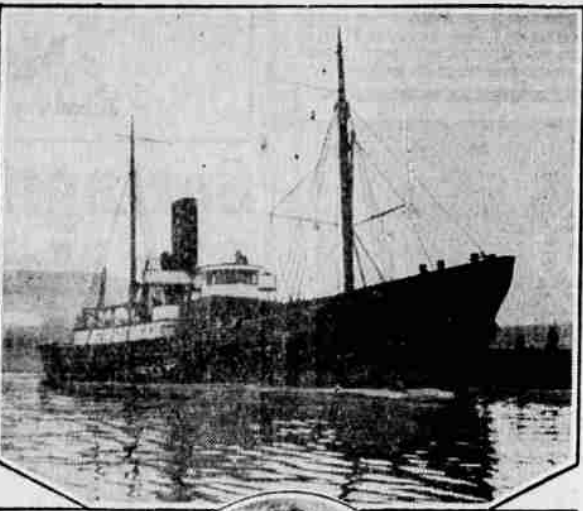
