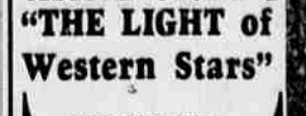

American Airmen Missing in China

SHANGHAI, April 13.—(AP)—Nine planes roared in and out of the murky enveloping Haugchow bay today in a frantic search for three Americans lost since early Tuesday in the hazardous flying area.

A cold, northerly wind of gale-like proportions blew up along the China coast to increase fears for the three—James Finck of Miami, Fla.; Robert Gast of Louisville, Ky., and Ivan Carlson of Duane, Texas.

Frank Hawks, American speed pilot, took off in his big bomber this forenoon, but reported by radio that after driving the great craft into the teeth of the winds, combing the island-studded bay, he had seen no trace of the missing men.

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Steam Explosion Takes Three Lives

SEDALIA, Mo., April 13.—The death toll in an explosion of an improvised steam table over a group of women were preparing a railroad celebration mounted to three today.

Mrs. John T. Abney, the wife of a blacksmith, died in a hospital today from burns suffered scalding water and steam from a church workers who were preparing the feast for the 30th anniversary of the Missouri Pacific railroad here.

Previously two other women, Mary Kahrs and Mrs. A. G. Hays had died. Twenty-five other were in hospitals.

SEAMAN WINS \$50,000 PORTLAND, April 13.—(AP)—Personal injury damages of \$50,000 were awarded in circuit court here today to Henry Nash, a seaman, in his suit against the States Steamship company. He sued for \$75,000. Nash complained that he was permanently injured two years ago when he fell on an ice-covered ladder on the freighter Michigan when it was about three weeks out of Portland, bound for the Orient.

BANK CLEARINGS GROW NEW YORK, April 13.—(AP)—Bank clearings in the principal cities of the United States during the week ending April 11 totaled \$5,719,649,000, a gain of 74.1 per cent over last year, according to Dun and Bradstreet. Clearings in New York city totaled \$4,255,594,000 against \$2,278,178,000 in the corresponding week in 1933, an increase of 80.7 per cent.
