

BUDGET APPROVED BY HIGHER BOARD; CHANGES AFFECTED

university budget since it receives only a small amount from "restricted funds."

Medical School Cut
Oregon State college is allotted \$865,843.42 from unrestricted funds and \$192,801.74 from the "restricted funds" (mainly state and federal appropriations in aid of agriculture). This represents a \$2,440 increase (0.28 per cent) in unrestricted fund allotment and a \$46,120.03 decrease (8.6 per cent in restricted funds).

The medical school gets \$257,598.10 a cut of \$135.95 or 0.05 per cent.

Rest of press centralized activities (mainly extension and general research) will get \$150,210.36, an increase of \$13,853.09 or 10.18 per cent.

Monmouth Normal gets \$146,742.54, a cut of \$4,897.42 or 3.25 per cent.

Ashland Normal gets \$69,893.41, an increase of \$3,286.08 or 4.94 per cent.

LaGrande Normal gets \$59,789.11, an increase of \$1,820.78 or 3.16 per cent.

Though there is little change in the relative allotments which the university has long contended are badly out of balance in relation to actual teaching done, the increases for the university will help materially to improve the situation. Actually all of the schools during the coming year will be living off of small earnings of surpluses accumulated in the recent past. E. C. Sammons, chairman of the finance committee pointed out in making his report.

Revenue Lower
The estimated revenue from millage and student fees is only \$2,074,512.45 as compared with the \$2,628,387 budget put through.

Balancing was accomplished by throwing into the pot a \$296,880 expense expected at the end of the present fiscal year in July. \$14,000 accumulated earnings of the printing plants, reductions of \$100,980.97 in the budgets as first presented and by reducing the emergency fund set up from \$7,000 to \$41,402.40 to accommodate the difference.

A solemn warning to the people of Oregon of the plight of higher education accompanied Mr. Sammons' report.

"The people of Oregon," said he, "do not appreciate the tremendous sacrifices being made by the faculties of these schools in order to keep them functioning at a high degree of efficiency during these times. It is a shame that we are forced to pay such salaries as we are paying in many cases."

Last Savings Used

He pointed out that budgets for higher education in Oregon are now nearly \$2,000,000 a year less than in 1929, a reduction of nearly 50 per cent and that many teachers have not only taken pay cuts which range from 5 to 30 per cent but in many cases a reduction of their working time which brings their actual income down by half.

"We are living right now on the last little bit of savings," he pointed out. "Next year, unless the legislature and the people see fit to recognize our plight it will be very serious and many activities may have to be dropped."

The library, the law school, the art school, and the social science divisions profit mostly from the increases allowed the university through the distribution of the extra funds is very wide—details will be carried in this paper Tuesday.

Several important and possibly significant actions were taken in connection with the budgets on recommendation of Chancellor W. J. Kerr and the presidents.

The department of music was restored to status as a school of music with John J. Landburg as the dean (a position which he occupied for years previous to the unification experiment).

Music Restored

The department of fine arts (with which music has recently been affiliated) becomes the department of architecture and allied arts under Dean Lawrence.

Lower division and "service courses" activities on each campus are given a new local grouping breaking down the old intercampus idea. Prof. O. F. Stafford is named dean of lower division on the university campus. M. Elwood Smith, hitherto dean of lower division on both campuses, becomes dean for the Oregon State campus only.

President C. V. Boyer, of the University of Oregon, and President George W. Peavy, of the state college receive full title as presidents, the term "acting president" being dropped permanently.

"These gentlemen have shown such admirable adaptability and cooperation that I think this change should be made in deference to their merit

and achievements," said the chancellor.

Late in the day, the board expected to come to the delicate problem of shaping a policy on student fees—a matter full of dynamite for all concerned.

The presidents planned to lay before the board a recommendation that student activities of all sorts including athletics be designated as "educational" so that fees (\$5 per term per student) may again be made compulsory instead of optional under the attorney general's recent ruling.

The board was expected to refer this recommendation to a committee for detailed study. The committee may also be asked to make a complete investigation for alleged "activity rackets" on the campuses.

A recommendation from the faculty of the University of Oregon asking that the university library be divorced from the present centralized control centering in Corvallis was reported to the board by Chancellor Kerr and referred to the library committee. On this committee, Chairman Marks was to name two new members to serve with Mrs. Walter Pierce now absent in Washington.

It was reported that his followers met recently for the purpose of forming the "fourth international," but that the delegates were few, failed to agree and broke up the conference without any definite decision as to organization moves.

Southern Pacific Dressing
1 cup mayonnaise,
1 cup catsup,
1/2 cup currant jelly,
1-8 cup vinegar,
1 heaping teaspoon English mustard.

1 level teaspoon salt.
Dissolve the mustard and salt in vinegar. Next add the jelly, beat until it is thoroughly mixed and then the mayonnaise. Finish with the catsup, and when serving cut in some chives. A good dressing to serve with lettuce.

Salad Dressing For Fruit
2 T sugar,
2 T flour,
Juice and rind of 1 lemon,
1 cup cold water,
2 T melted butter,
4 eggs well beaten.

Boil in double boiler, adding eggs slowly. Cook until thickens. Before serving add whipped cream.—Mrs. C. R. Clark, 2040 Agate street.

Spring Time French Dressing
4 sprigs sweet thyme,
2 tips tender asparagus,
12 chives,
3-4 teaspoon salt,
1 tablespoon sugar,
1/2 cup vinegar,
1 cup oil,
1 clove of garlic.

Chop thyme and spearmint fine, rub into sugar until well mixed, add salt and garlic clove peeled and cut in two, heat vinegar to boiling point pour over sugar and herbs and stir until dissolved. Set aside to cool, closely covered. Chill thoroughly.

When ready to serve remove garlic carefully and pour vinegar slowly into the oil, beating with fork until creamy. For the salad use what you wish but let the foundation be cool crisp lettuce leaves to which add 3-4 cup tender sweet green peas (uncooked) and finely sliced tender raw asparagus tips or radishes for added crispness.—Mrs. Guy B. Ravigote Dressing
Mash two cooked egg yolks smooth and blend with two tablespoons of salad oil, then add two tablespoons of cream one and one-half tablespoons of vinegar and seasoning of salt, paprika and onion jelly. Now add one tablespoon of minced chives, one tablespoon of minced, hard-cooked egg whites. Beat vigorously.—Mrs. W. W. Hantke, 1445 Twenty-first avenue east, Eugene.

defense counsel for Manning, questioned Goeller on his acquaintance with both Horan and the accused. The garageman, member of a prominent pioneer family, said he knew both. He said he was hesitant to serve for this reason.

Later, however, he amended his remarks and said he believed himself qualified to give an impartial verdict in the merits of evidence presented.

Roberts directed his remarks to the self defense theory. Apparently he was satisfied when Goeller said he would abide by the court instructions if it were held that self defense applied to the case.

Helmer Fears
Manning has claimed he shot Horan in self defense ever since the unprovoked shooting occurred in the attorney's private office.

The possible testimony of Oscar E. Heinrich, Berkeley criminologist who aided the state investigation, appeared a chief concern of the defense. Both Goeller and Pyles, who were questioned along similar lines, indicated they would only accept the expert's testimony "for what it was worth."

Theodore Gillenwaters, district attorney, pointed out that the state would present physical facts and asked Goeller if he would be governed by circumstantial evidence in accordance with the court's instructions. The garageman answered affirmatively.
